While walking is the oldest and still the most complete method, many choose one or more historical modes of transportation available for at least part of their tour of the past. Two vintage steam locomotives offer a panoramic view of the 240-acre Village. The 1873 "Torch Lake" and 1868 "Mason #1" each carry 210 passengers


