Mary E. Edwards, 80, a Genesee native and resident there most of her life, passed away Saturday morning August 12 at Gritman Memorial Hospital. Death was attributed to a heart attack.



She was born September 30, 1897, one of 10 children to Robert and Eliza Gray. Her brothers were athletes in high school and at least one at the University of Idaho.

She was married to Raymond E. Edwards at Tacoma, Wa., November 17, 1918. The couple returned to Genesee where Edwards owned and operated the Pastime Tavern until retiring about 1957. He died January 18, 1975.

She was a member of the Order of Eastern Star, the Genesee Community church and several social clubs. Two years ago she moved to Good Samaritan Village.

Survivors include: one son, Lavern E. Edwards of Arcadia, Ca., three brothers, Robert Gray, of Genesee, Cecil Gray of Lewiston, and Charles Gray, of Mesa, Ca. Besides her husband, she was also preceded in death by an infant son, two sisters and four brothers.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2:30 p. m. at the Genesee Community Church with the Rev. Don Hammond officiating. Mrs. Betty Hampton, organist, accompanied Mrs. Joan Stout, soloist, who sang, "Prayer Perfect," and "How Great Thou Art."

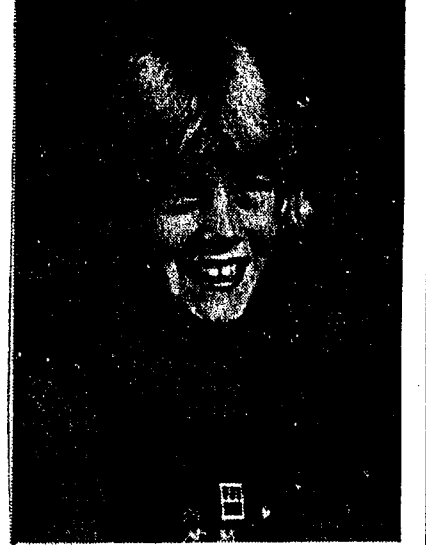
Genesee Medical Building Getting Remodeling Work

Herman Mayer and his crew are doing the work.

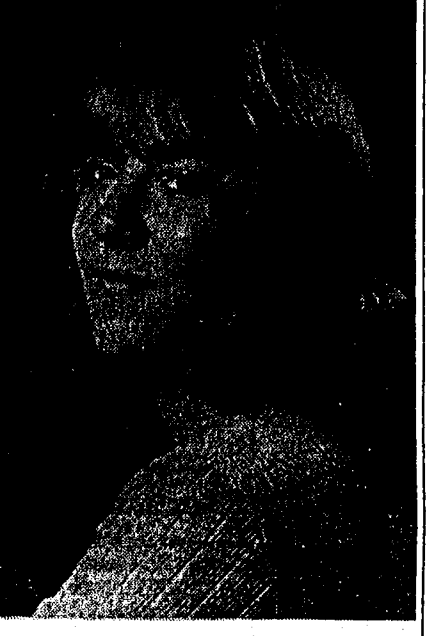
Wendy Chosen Princess

Heavy Rains Half Harvest

Heavy rains Saturday night and again Monday midget brought the harvest of 1978 small grain crops to an abrupt halt this week. This was the first stoppage of harvest the farmers had experienced this season. After almost two weeks of near perfect conditions the high pressure system which had been holding off the Pacific and Canadian air masses shifted eastward and allowed the first rain to come into the area Saturday afternoon. Heavy rains fell Saturday night and early Sunday morning. Although the skies stayed overcast Monday there was no rain but another heavy rain began falling Tuesday about midday and apparently intended to continue on through the rest of the day.

George Brocke of Brocke & Sons in Kendrick said Tuesday afternoon that the small sieve and Alaska peas were about 90 percent complete when the Saturday rain forced the first stoppage. Rape seed was almost complete, too, Brocke said. He estimated that the harvesting of Austrian and Yellow peas grown under contract to his plant was about 20 percent complete. A few truckloads of grain came into Brocke's Monday afternoon but the Tuesday rains "probably shot the rest of the week," George said.

Howard Hoffman, manager of the Lewiston Grain Growers in Kendrick estimated their expected total of grain was about two-thirds in when the rain came. Hoffman said he didn't think this rain would hurt the wheat if it didn't last too long. "If we just get a good rain, then it stops, warms up and dries out, we'll be okay," he said, but added that if the weather stays wet and warm for too long, then the danger of sprouting may be present.

The rain stopped harvesting in the Genesee area, too, as a drenching, soaking downpour hit the Genesee fields shortly before noon Tuesday and rain Saturday. Manager Bill Woods of Genesee Union Warehouse said Tuesday afternoon that he estimated about one-third of the expected wheat was in and that 2/3rds of the expected peas had been delivered. Some reduction in the test weight of wheat might result from these rains, Woods said. He reported testing some wheat that was running about 17 percent moisture content this week and he did notice a reduction of weight. The danger of pea bleaching is also present if the rain doesn't stop.

Rubella Dangerous for Expectant Mothers

Rebulla is a common, usually mild disease of childhood.

But when contracted by a woman in the early stages of pregnancy, it's a different story.

A pregnant woman who gets rebella also called German measles or 3-day measles, stands a 20 to 25% chance of giving birth to a deformed baby. The possibility she will have a miscarriage is even greater.

Because of that danger, the 1978 Idaho Legislature passed a law requiring women to be tested for immunity to rubella before receiving a marriage license. The bill was initiated by the Idaho Medical Assoc.

"We feel a woman has to know her immunity status," says Bob Medlin, immunization program coordinator for the Department of Health and Welfare (DHW), which set up the test procedures. "We want to insure that every woman has the information she needs to safeguard her health and the health of her unborn children."

Medlin says studies in states which require rubella testing show between 15 and 18 percent of prospective brides are susceptible to the disease. Idaho's law, which went into effect July 1, requires a woman to file a certificate from a licensed physician indicating she has been tested for immunity to rubella.

If the blood test is positive, Medlin says, it means the woman is protected against rubella. If it's negative, there is no immunity. The physician must certify that he has explained the dangers of non-immunity to the woman, who can then decide whether to be vaccinated against the disease. Vaccination is entirely voluntary.

Medlin emphasizes that the vaccine should not be given to a pregnant woman or one who does not intend to take precautions against pregnancy for 3 months after vaccination.

He explains the vaccine might cause the same kinds of problems for a pregnant as rubella does.

The test is not required when the physician certifies that the woman is not capable of bearing children or has been previously tested for rubella immunity.

Medlin says the same blood sample used in syphilis testing can be utilized for the rubella immunity test.

Although not required by law, the DHW official recommends that men take a blood test to determine their immunity to rubella, and, if found susceptible, they can be vaccinated. This will help reduce the chances of pregnant women contracting the disease.

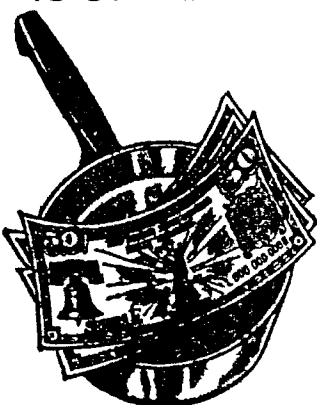

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First Whooping Crane Defends Territory

GRAYS LAKE—Last fall at Grays Lake National Wildlife Refuge, whooping cranes raised by foster-parent sandhill cranes seemed to recognize their own kind for the first time. This spring, a large aggressive male whooper, hatched at the refuge three years earlier, returned to his natal marsh and established a breeding territory.

"Although he remained unmated this year, he aggressively defended a territory of about 160 acres against the sandhill cranes until mid-May," said Elwood Bizeau, assistant leader of the University of Idaho Cooperative Wildlife Research Unit in the College of Forestry, Wildlife and Range Sciences.

This is the first time territorial behavior has been exhibited by the sub-adult whoopers at Grays Lake in southeastern Idaho, Bizeau said. A foster-parent program using Greater Sandhill Cranes was begun there in 1975 to help reestablish the seriously endangered species in the Western United States.

Fewer than 90 wild whoopers exist in the world today, with most nesting at Wood Buffalo National Park in the Northwest Territories of Canada and wintering at Aransas National Wildlife Refuge on the Gulf Coast. Another two dozen whooping cranes live in captivity at Patuxent Wildlife Research Center in Laurel, Md.

The purpose of the Grays Lake project is to develop another wild flock to safeguard against possible extinction of the species should disaster strike the Canadian-based birds. This, the male whoopers' territorial display this spring was an encouraging sign for the future of the Idaho flock.

"The establishment of a breeding territory is a vital link in the chain of behavior which leads to pairing and nesting," Bizeau said. He pointed out, however, that the process is slow. Whoopers generally establish their territory one year, pair and "go through the motions" of nesting for another year or so, and then finally mate and produce young. By that time they may be 5 or more years old.

The Wood Buffalo and Patuxent flocks supply the eggs for the project at Grays Lake which is headed by Dr. Red Drewien and supported by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Canadian Wildlife Service. Drewien, a U.I. wildlife biologist and crane expert, has transplanted 89 whoopers eggs to Grays Lake since 1975—58 from Canada and 31 from Patuxent.

Out of 40 eggs which have hatched there between 1975 and 1977, only 5 sub-adult whoopers were still known to be alive by the end of July. Four of them are summering at the Idaho refuge this year, Drewien said, adding that 3 are from the 1975 hatch and 1 is from the "Class of '76."

The project leader also reported that the only survivor of last year's hatch is summering on the Green River in Wyoming. A 6th whooper, last seen during the spring migration at Monte Vista National Wildlife Refuge in Colorado, is yet to be located. Water and food conditions at Grays Lake were better this spring than last year, but, according to Drewien, June and July have been virtually moistureless and the marsh is drying out fast.

During the drought last year, much of the water dried up in the 22,000 acre marsh, making the whooper chicks easy prey for coyotes and other predators. Only four survived to migrate with the sandhills in their wintering ground at Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge in New Mexico last year.

This year, 28 whooper eggs were transplanted to Grays Lake, using a heat and humidity controlled suitcase incubator for the flights from Canada to Maryland.

Of the 13 eggs from Wood Buffalo 9 hatched and 5 of the chicks were still alive in late July, according to Desmond Call, a U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service employee at the refuge. Fifteen eggs were also transplanted from Maryland of which only five hatched and none survived. The hatchability of Patuxent eggs, obtained by artificial insemination, has been low and none of the young have survived to the flight stage. The reasons for this are unknown, but scientists at the Maryland center are examining possible causes.

All eggs in the transplant project have come from whooper nests with 2 eggs, allowing the real parents to raise 1 chicks and the sandhills to raise the other. Even naturally, most whoopers raise only one chick to the flight stage, Bizeau explained, because "sibling rivalry usually occurs and the dominant chick outcompetes its nestmate."

The decreased competition at Wood Buffalo may account for the increased survival of whooper chicks there since the egg-napping began in 1975. Prior to that time, an average of only one young per year from the whole flock survived and made it to the wintering grounds at Aransas. Since the Grays Lake project began, however, 8 to 12 young have shown up at the Texas refuge each fall, Bizeau reported.

Currently, the flightless brown and white whooper chicks are 2 months old, weigh close to 7 pounds and are 3½ feet tall, almost the same height as their foster parents.

As adults, the whoopers will be all white with black wing tips and reach 5 feet in height. Their wing spans will average 7 feet and, surprisingly for all that height, they will weigh only 20 pounds.

Banding is scheduled to begin at Grays Lake and Wood Buffalo the 2nd week of August using a helicopter to spot the young birds in the dense vegetation. At that time, Drewien will capture, weigh and band the 2-month-old juveniles.

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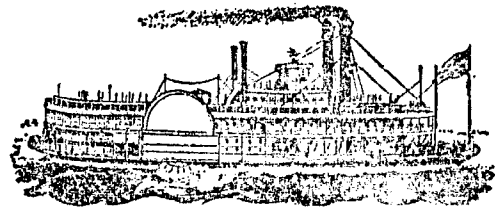

Tight Money Causes Construction Slow Down

An abrupt construction slowdown was evident in Idaho in July reflecting primarily the impact of the 10% usury ceiling on mortgage interest rates, said James Hoogland, Jr., manager of Kendrick's First Security Bank and Stan Merrell, manager of the Genesee Branch, quoting the Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A. The report to be distributed this week, is edited by Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, vice president and economist for First Security Corporation.

According to the report, basic sources of funds for mortgage-granting institutions from the secondary mortgage market have exceeded 10%. The high cost of this capital has effectively prohibited mortgagors from purchasing and using these funds to

finance new construction in the state. Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations in July was \$36,428,005, or 33.7% below the 1977 figure.

New residential construction for 733 dwelling units totaled \$22,231,725, a decrease of 42.8% in number and 35.3% in value compared with a year ago.

Nonresidential construction valued at \$5,896,578 was down 26.3% from last year, while alterations and repairs totaling \$8,299,702 were down 33.9%.

The report said that impact of such a sharp reduction in construction activity will have a noticeable adverse effect on Idaho's economy. In May, total employment in contract construction in Idaho was 400 jobs below last year.

This month's arts & crafts session will be held next Monday, Aug. 21 at 10 a. m. in the Juliaetta Community Park.


