





Executives came to me for decisions. My judgment was law. It seemed that every major and minor problem filtered through my desk: I was key-man. The next morning I was nothing. I had to admit to myself that vast organization could that run without me, that I had no power, that nobody would care a tinkers darn for my advice, and that, were I to return to the business scene. I would merely be a sort of amusing and pathetic nuisance. For all my financial security, our fine home, the hunting lodge in the mountains, and

the house at the shore, I began to feel lost, empty, dull, silly, and sorry for myself. Believe me, the read-justment has been troublesome."
