Charlotte Brazier, 94, Passes August 24

Charlotte Ann "Lottie" Brazier, 94, a long-time Genesee resident, passed away Sunday, August 27 at Paradise Villa Convalescent Center, Moscow, where she had been a patient for the past 10 years.

Charlotte, daughter of Tannis and Annie Miller was born May, 8, 1884 on the family farm 2 miles east of Genesee, homesteaded in 1878. She attended the Summit School.

Charlotte Miller and James Fredrick Brazier were married June 24, 1908. They farmed with her brother, Leo Miller, the home place, the Vollmer place, and the farm at Pine Grove.

During World War I she attended meetings with neighbors and did sewing for the boys in service.

She was an active member of the Genesee Community Church and a member of the Womens Fellowship. She taught Sunday School for 30 years.

The Brazier's celebrated their Golden Wedding anniversary on June 24, 1958.

Although Mrs. Brazier's hearing and eye sight had faltered through the years, she remained cheerful and had a pleasant smile for everyone. She was the last of nine children.

Survivors include her son, Glen; a daughter-in-law, Nellie; two grandsons, Donald in the Army and Roger of Boise and two great grandchildren, Beau and Barbara Brazier, of Boise.

Funeral services were conducted Thursday, August 31 at 2:30 p. m. at the Genesee Community Church with Rev. Don Hammond officiating.

Tigers Face Prairie Friday In Football Opener

Coach Daren Munden hadn't even sent his 1978 version of the Kendrick Tigers football team out into a real game before he found himself in injury troubles. Veterans Scott Lohman and Mike Brocke were both lost to the team for an undetermined period of time following a Sunday afternoon two-car collision involving both young men. Injuries are a cause for concern for the Kendrick coach this year as he doesn't have the depth of reserves to handle such losses easily. The Tigers open the football season Friday night up at Prairie in a 7:30 game.

But if Coach Munden has worries he also has a blessing in a fast, strong back field of veterans. Rex Snyder will be the starting quarterback and his brother, Tony, can alternate with him, if need be, from his tailback position. Bret Gertje is a strong fullback, and Joe Mathews has been running strong and quick from the flanker position.

In all, Kendrick has 11 lettermen back from the 1977 squad which finished second in a league with a 3-2 record. Returning to the team this year will be Mike Brocke, Jeff Lohman, Tony Snyder, Bret Gertje, Ed Pea, Ted Rossiter, Rex Snyder, Guy VonBargen, Joe Mathews, Scot Lohman and Eric Souders.

Probable starters for the Prairie game will be: Bret Gertje, Fullback; Tony Snyder, Tailback; Rex Snyder, Quarterback; and Joe Mathews, flanker. Guy VonBargen, tight end; Duane Howerton, split end; Guards, Jeff Lohman and Gary Gertje; tackles, Ted Rossiter and Mike Courtwright; center, Eric Souders.

Ed Pea, another Tiger halfback will not be eligible for the Prairie game because of lack of a number of practices, but will be ready to go for the Lewiston JV game here Sept. 8.

Coach Munden said Gary Gertje at about 215 pounds will be the heaviest man on the line but the line would still average only about 100 pounds. Asked what he thought the season would be, the Kendrick coach thought for a while and then said, "interesting."

Harvest Time Again

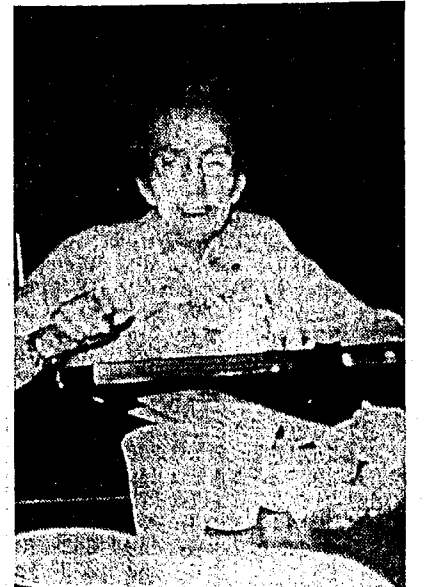
Like a horde of hungry locusts, Gobbling up the grain

District for Free, Reduced Price School Lunch, Milk

The Genesee School District today announced its policy for (free and reduced-price meals, free milk) for children unable to pay the full price of meals and milk served under the National School Lunch, and Special Milk Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for determining eligibility:

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals or free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the main office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal Funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable State and Federal criminal statutes.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy Lunch Supervisor will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis.

If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Marion Holben, Route 2, Genesee 285-1194, for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if the family size changes, the family should contact the school and file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color or national origin.

A copy of the complete policy is in the Superintendent's office and may be reviewed by any interested party.

For Karla and the other enrollees, it meant the end of something that can never happen again; because there are so many young people who want to be employed for a summer with the YCC no one is allowed to come back a second time.

Karla has returned for her Senior year at Genesee High School. She brings some new experiences and insights with her, along with some strong friendships and special memories. I can't help thinking that she'll also bring back some healthy attitudes about hard work and nature and her own capabilities.

It was a "good" summer for Karla, interesting work, new friends, good times and the chance to earn some pocket money. Equally important, she was involved in some necessary and important work.

"Many of the things that YCC did for us this summer were jobs that otherwise would have gone undone," noted Forest Service YCC Coordinator George Ward. "They were jobs that we couldn't afford, or couldn't find people to do. The YCC has done these jobs for us at a minimum of cost, and the work has always been of the very best quality. It's the kind of situation where everyone benefits—the kids, the Forest Service, and the public. That, I think, indicates an effective government program."

As the crow flies it's 20 miles north of Interstate 90 to the place where Karla Kanikkeberg spent her summer.

In a Forest Service pickup, it's a much longer and bumpier trip. Magee YCC Camp is tucked into a grassy valley in the Tee Pee Creek drainage, in the Coeur d'Alene Mountains north of Kellogg. By road it's a 40-mile trip to reach this scenic little valley, but after spending some time absorbing the beautiful vistas and the clean air and the quiet, the bumpy dust-ridden trip seems like a small price to pay. Magee is a nice place to be, even if only for a few hours; what a place it would be to spend the summer! Lucky Karla—she did just that!

Karla, along with some 30 other 15 to 18 year-olds from North Idaho, was selected from hundreds of applicants for summer employment with the Youth Conservation Corps this year. So, on June 19 she arrived in Magee.

"The first work I was here I hated it," the 17-year-old commented. "Now I love it."

Magee was not a luxury resort, nor was YCC a vacation. Karla's day began at 6 a. m. with a camp-wide re-

veille. After breakfast, Karla and the five other members of her crew would report to their work leader and the day's work began. Sometimes the work was physically demanding, but it was always somehow interesting. Karla and her crew cut down lodgepole pine trees and turned them into fence posts, thinned an overstocked stand of trees, cut trees for wildlife browse, maintained trails and built new hiking trails. Some of the work was so far from Magee that the crew camped out in a "spike" camp. Most of the time, they arrived back in camp—ready for dinner—around 5 p. m. Evenings and weekends were free time for the enrollees, who found plenty to do so far from juke boxes, TV's, and soda fountains. In addition to the Camp's recreation hall there was the Coeur d'Alene River to raft and fish, and meadow and nearby hills to hike, new friendships to be made, letters to be written, laundry to be done, and a hundred other things to do and see and say.

"I don't know how they did it," commented Karla's Work Leader, 25-year-old Dan Thompson. "Those kids worked a physically grueling day with axes and shovels. Yet when
