Rep. Lester Clemm Named To Advisory Committee On Weed Control

Representative Lester Clemm of Troy (D-Dist. 7) was appointed by Governor Evans to an advisory committee on noxious weed control. The organizational meeting was held last Tuesday, Aug. 22.

At this meeting Clemm was elected as chairman of the committee. This preliminary meeting was devoted to a general discussion of the noxious weed situation confronting the State. Advisor members from the Idaho State Department of Agriculture Eutheir location.

It became obvious to all 16 committee members that weeds are the one that counted-the scoring degreatest single pollutant within our State. The impact upon the wildlife, cattlemen, and farmers is costing the State of Idaho many millions of dollars of gross income annually. It is imparative that a solution be found to eradicate all new weeds entering the State immediately before they take over until millions of acres as skeleton weed has done.

In the past ten years the skelton weed has spread from less than a hundred acres to in excess of 2:5 milion acres.

The Yellowstar thistle is another prime example facing the State and the people of Latah, Nez Perce and surrounding counties. The committee hopes to have a

sound recommendation to present to the Governor of the State and the Legislature this January, 1979.

Some families are on very good terms with each other-including after marriage. They see each other frequently and approve of each other—including brothers, sisters, fathers and mothers. Other families meet only out of a sense of duty, on the rarest of holidays, and when they do meet it is to discuss each other's success and accomplishments with envy, to regard each other's material acquisitions jealousy, and to criticize the behavior of each other's children. Often, family gatherings are continued out of habit and tradition only, and all parties would be happier to have the time to themselves. Other families meet to gratify the emotional needs of a mother, a father, or in-

Finally, there are other families, who by common consent just never get together. One family of eight adult brothers and sisters lived within a 50-mile radius for ten years and never visited each other. It is not hard to guess that this family did not have a happy childhood together. The best preventive of family alienation is to promote happy living when the children are young. A family of children who have enjoyed themselves while young will probably continue




