### Rep. Lester Clemm Named To Advisory Committee On Weed Control

Representative Lester Clemm of Troy (D-Dist. 7) was appointed by Governor Evans to an advisory committee on noxious weed control. The organizational meeting was held last Tuesday, Aug. 22. At this meeting Clemm was elected as chairman of the committee. This preliminary meeting was devoted to a general discussion of the noxious weed situation confronting the State. Advisory members from the Idaho State Department of Agriculture Eugene Ross and Gary Lee, weed specialist from the U. of I., gave a color slide presentation of all noxious weeds within the State of Idaho and their location. It became obvious to all 16 committee members that weeds are the greatest single pollutant within our State. The impact upon the wildlife, cattlemen, and farmers is costing the State of Idaho many millions of dollars of gross income annually. It is imperative that a solution be found to eradicate all new weeds entering the State immediately before they take over until millions of acres as skeleton weed has done. In the past ten years the skeleton weed has spread from less than a hundred acres to in excess of 2.5 million acres. The Yellowstar thistle is another prime example facing the State and the people of Latah, Nez Perce and surrounding counties. The committee hopes to have a sound recommendation to present to the Governor of the State and the Legislature this January, 1979. Other members appointed by the Governor from this area are Ellis Anderson, Troy and Homer Futter of Moscow.

### Lowell Mason, 69, Former Kendrick Teacher, Passed Away Aug. 27

Lowell W. Mason, 69, a former Kendrick school teacher, died Sunday, August 27 at Seattle following open heart surgery. Death was attributed to a brain hemorrhage. Born near Kamiah, Idaho, December 17, 1908, Mason was a University of Idaho graduate. He lived in Seattle, where he ended his teaching career. He is survived by his wife, the former Velma Hofmann of Moscow; and two sons, Jim of Portland and Dick of the Spokane Valley. A memorial service was held at Burien, a Seattle suburb Tuesday evening.

### Tigers Fall Short In Opening Game, Lose to Prairie 12-6; Lewiston JV's Here Friday

Kendrick's football team opened the 1978 gridiron season last Friday night at Prairie and came home with the short end of a 12-6 score. "It was the mistakes that killed us," said Coach Darin Munden Tuesday morning. The Pirates outplayed the Tigers in every department but the one that counted—the scoring department.

Both the Prairie's scores came in the second quarter on pass plays from Ken Reiner and Jeff Williams. On the first score, Kendrick had pushed Prairie back and had them on the Pirate 15 with a third and 25 situation. Kendrick believed a running attempt that was really a pass play and the Pirates went all the way. The next Pirate touchdown was on another pass from Reiner to Williams covering 35 yards.

"We had to pass more than I wanted," said Coach Munden. While Kendrick did pick up 150 yards passing, it was a draw play in the final quarter of the game that sent Tony Snyder 25 yards for the Tiger tally. Kendrick had one touchdown called back and suffered 75 yards of penalties in the game—fifty yards in the first half.

The outstanding play of senior Jeff Lohman won him the "Defensive Player of the Week" award. Jeff plays guard on offense and nose guard on defense. Munden also had high praise for the defensive work of Guy VonBargen and Duane Howerton.

"Offensive Player of the Week" is Tony Snyder who picked up 110 yards for the Tigers including their only touchdown. Tony runs out of the tailback slot, but can also switch places with his brother, Rex and quarterback the squad.

The Tigers open at home this Friday night at 7:30 as they host the Lewiston J. V. team. The Lewiston youngsters were trounced 38-0 at Grangeville last Friday.

Later in the fourth quarter Kanikkeberg scored again, this time on a 2 yard run. Again the extra point kicked but Genesee had it's 19-7 win.

The Bulldogs in control of the game most of the second half, were hurt by penalties. Seventeen infractions were called against Genesee totaling 175 yards.

## Family Affair—

### FRIENDSHIPS AND FAMILY

Some families are on very good terms with each other—including after marriage. They see each other frequently and approve of each other—including brothers, sisters, fathers and mothers. Other families meet only out of a sense of duty, on the rarest of holidays, and when they do meet it is to discuss each other's success and accomplishments with envy, to regard each other's material acquisitions jealousy, and to criticize the behavior of each other's children. Often, family gatherings are continued out of habit and tradition only, and all parties would be happier to have the time to themselves. Other families meet to gratify the emotional needs of a mother, a father, or in-laws.

Finally, there are other families, who by common consent just never get together. One family of eight adult brothers and sisters lived within a 50-mile radius for ten years and never visited each other. It is not hard to guess that this family did not have a happy childhood together. The best preventive of family alienation is to promote happy living when the children are young. A family of children who have enjoyed themselves while young will probably continue friendly relations later in life.

Some families find it very difficult to accept a son-or-daughter-in-law. Parents take great pride in their child and are prone to feel that no outsider is quite good enough for him to marry.

In some families, it would doubtless be more mentally healthy if they did not try to meet. Some courageous member of the family group needs to suggest that the gathering

be less frequent and if this suggestion can be accepted, each member could gradually feel free to go his own way and spend his time in ways that are more profitable and enjoyable to him.

Other families, however, have no real animosity toward each other, and merely meet some member of the family to make the effort of periodic reunion. Thus, one family member may put forth more than his share of consistent effort toward unity and socialability but it is a worthy project and an important one for him to shoulder.

There is no ideal solution for the "in-law" problem whether a family lives together or is separated. A family relationship, if it can be maintained, demands the greatest understanding and patience on both sides.

Young people have moaned, "I did not know that when I married I married my spouse's relatives also." A young person always marries his spouse's relatives along with the spouse, whether they live near or far away. They too, have to take each other for better or for worse!

Parents should do all they can to enjoy their children when they are young and in their teens so that when marriage comes, they can relinquish them to their mates. Parents-in-law should, as far as possible, live their own lives and make themselves notably unavailable to their married children unless needed. The tremendous number of misguided efforts at helpfulness which turn out to be a burden to young married people should make it plain to parents-in-law that they should redouble their efforts to stay out of the lives of their youngsters.

But they mistake their own need for attention as being in need of their children. Only by keeping this im-

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important message before adults, however, and helping them to be more self-sufficient in later years, will we create a wholesome freedom for young parents so that they can live their own lives independent of impositions from parents-in-law.

This may appear to be a callous recommendation that will spoil a beautiful family relationship by advocating too much independence—even aloofness—between family members. Actually, it is a plea for better timing of the life cycle in order to enable parents to enjoy their own children when the children are young and help the children to enjoy their childhood; and it advocates that once childhood and parenthood are gone, adults should step back and relax and leave the young alone.

If people can do that—and probably only when they can—will their children welcome them and find them useful in their lives. This timing desideratum poses a real problem in personality flexibility for the person growing older. But it is a problem that must be faced and dealt with.
