Activity Ticket Policy At Kendrick High Explained

This year at Kendrick High School, students will be required to have an activity card for admission to activities. The cost of the card is \$7.21 for grades 7 through 12, and \$4.21 for grades 1 through 6. Most of the revenue from these cards will go into the Student Body Fund for various activities throughout the year. If any student elects not to purchase a card they will then be charged admission as any other student would be charged.

In the past, students who have been participants haven't had to purchase these cards and this has caused some confusion this year. In effect, if a football player didn't purchase an activity card this year, then he would be charged \$1.00 for game admission. This would be the same for any student whether it's a player, cheerleader, band member, etc.

The school feels that with a majority of the funds accrued going back to the students for student activities, that the \$7.21 for every activity sponsored by Kendrick High School is certainly a good investment.

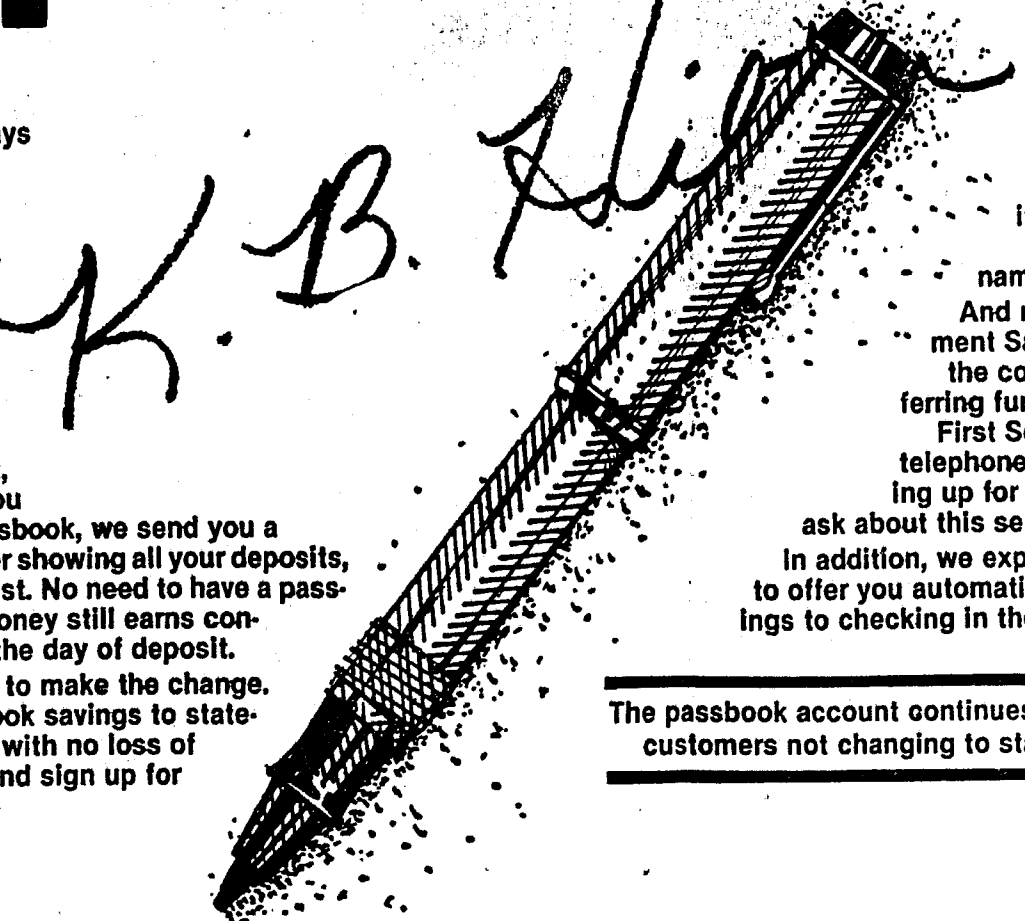

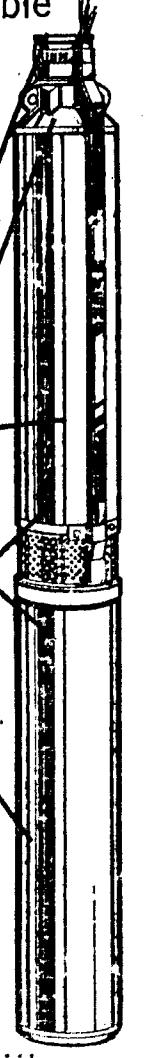

YACC JOBS STILL AVAILABLE

Jobs for unemployed 16-23 year olds are still available at the Orofino Young, Adult Conservation Corps (YACC) camp, according to Camp Director Ray Tate.

Tate said interested persons should apply to local Job Service offices. Qualified applicants are then referred to the Forest Service for selection. The Orofino camp now has 28 enrollees and is scheduled to eventually employ 100 persons.

Tate said that 14 of the enrollees are living and working at Powell, Pierce District. Enrollees live at field locations during the week and don't return home on the weekend.

Tate pointed out that three-fourths of the Orofino YACC enrollees are local youth, either from Clearwater Valley communities or from the Lewiston-Clarkston area. The remaining 25 percent, he said, come mainly from southern Idaho.

The Clearwater National Forest also operates a non-residential camp at Kooskia. Non-resident YACC enrollees live at home and commute to work each day.

Kooskia Camp Director, Ray Martin, reports 14 YACC enrollees at that camp. He said the camp has provided temporary employment to about 35 young people in its ten months of operation. He reported that enrollees at the Kooskia camp have worked for YACC an average of 3 to 4 months. Participants can be

employed by the program for a total of 12 months. Martin added that some of the Kooskia enrollees have been able to move into higher paying or more permanent positions with the Forest Service.

YACC enrollees at both camps work mainly on conservation projects in the national forest. They have pil-

ed brush, maintained trails and camp grounds and helped maintain the ranger station at the Powell and Kooskia Historical Ranger Station. Some YACC enrollees have also been assigned on a temporary basis to assist regular Forest Service work crews.

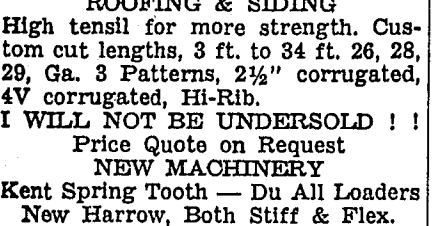

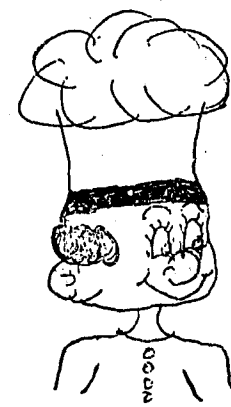
