## Hill and Valley Garden Club First Fall Meeting Sept. 27

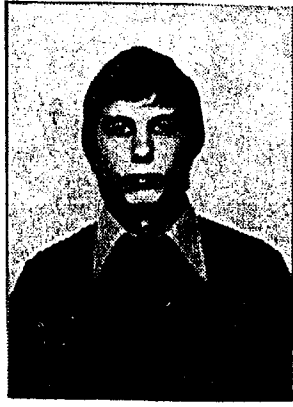
The Hill and Valley Garden Club will open its new program Wednesday, Sept. 27 at a 1:30 meeting in the Garden Center located at the back of the Temple building.

## Kendrick JVs Blank GHS Squad 24-0

Kendrick High's young Junior Varsity football team shook off a case of first game jitters and after a slow start went on to score in every quarter but the first to blank the visiting Genesee JVs 24-0 Monday night.

"The guys got off to a slow start, but I'm happy with the way they played," said Coach Brent Monroe Tuesday. Kendrick scored for the first time in the second quarter when Terry Hudson, who was to end up with over 150 yards rushing and three of the Tigers four touchdowns, went 17 yards on a sweep.

In the third quarter Carl Ware blocked a Genesee punt and Tony Moran scooped up the free ball and scored from 10 yards out.

In the final period Hudson intercepted a Genesee pass and took it 35 yards for another 6 points. Later in the same quarter Terry ran the sweep again and went 55 yards for the score on what Coach Monroe called a "beautiful run."

Monroe had words of praise for the defensive work of Carl Ware and Dale Wolf, who played line backers. "They kept Genesee in the hole all night," Monroe said.

Kendrick has three more games this season, all away from home. Next Monday the team will go to Potlatch.

## Volleyball Team Tops Lewiston; JV's Lose

The Kendrick High girls volleyball team took a two-game match from Lewiston Tuesday evening, stretching its winning streak to 4-0 on the season, but the Junior Varsity squad found its win record snapped at three games.

## Conversion Count; Tigers Drop Deary 14-12 for Second Win

For the second time in as many games, the Kendrick Tigers saw the difference between winning and losing as they edged out the Deary Mustangs 14-12 at Deary Saturday night. A successful run conversion of the first Tiger touchdown by Rex Snyder made the difference in the game.

Deary drew first blood in the opening quarter when Deary quarterback Nelson passed to Andy Thompson in forty-yard play.

In the second quarter Kendrick evened the score and went ahead as Rex Snyder, who made 11 of 19 passings, threw to Bret Gertje for 35 yards and a score and then ran over the conversion worth 2 more points.

Eddie Pea set up the next Tiger touchdown, going 14 yards on a crucial third down and long-yardage play, to bring the ball to the Deary five-yard line in the fourth quarter. Tony Snyder ran it in from there. Kendrick failed to convert.

Again the Nelson to Thompson pass play worked for Deary and they scored from 18 yards out. A passing attempt at the conversion was knocked down by Kendrick. Deary wasn't out of the game though and with 4 minutes left, regained possession of the ball and drove to the Kendrick 11 yard line where only a tackle by Duane Howerton saved a sure Mustang touchdown, breaking up a 30-yard pass play. With 2 minutes left in the game, Deary picked up two yards on a sweep, down to the Tiger 9. Nelson dropped back to pass but was sacked by Mike Brocke on the 18. With a 4th and goal facing them, the Deary team tried to pass again but this time Tony Snyder picked off the pass in the end zone and ran it back out to 40, ending the Mustang threat. This was Tony's second interception of the game.

Kendrick collected 302 offensive yards, 137 passing. Deary had 282 total yards, 187 passing as Nelson was 9 for 16. So effective was the Tiger defense in the second half that Deary gained only 23 yards rushing in the last two quarters, only three in the final period.

Jeff and Rex Players of Week. The Snyder boys continued to keep player of the week honors in the family, as Rex Snyder was named by the coaches as "Offensive Player of the Week" for his excellent passing attack and his point-after-touchdown run.

Once again it was Jeff Lohman's outstanding play on the line that earned him defensive player of the week award. Jeff made four tackles behind the lines and played steady ball all night. Coach Darin Munden also pointed with pride to Mike Courtright, Guy VonBergen, Scott Lohman, Duane Howerton and Mike Brocke for outstanding defensive work.

Kendrick draws a bye this week and is idle. The next opponent will be Clearwater Valley at CV.

## Kendrick To Auction City Property Oct. 10; \$20,000 Minimum Set

The City of Kendrick has set Tuesday, October 10 as the date of a public auction to sell a parcel of land in West Kendrick. The land, roughly encompassing what was once the old riding arena, was the subject of considerable discussion when the city first announced its intentions to sell the property as surplus to its needs. The issue of whether it should be sold was finally decided by the voters at an election last April when the sale was approved.

The sale will be at the site of the land at 10:00 a. m., October 10. The auction is open to the public.

The City has set a minimum bid of \$20,000.00 on the auction price. It will not be sold for less. In addition the City has written a considerable list of conditions for the sale. The property is not to be used for a trailer park or commercial or industrial purposes without the consent of the council. Further it is to be sold as one parcel and not divided for purpose of this auction.

Below is a complete copy of the restrictions and conditions for the sale of the land:

1. The property shall be used only for residential dwellings which shall be either single family or multi-family dwellings or a combination of both.

2. The purchaser shall be required to provide adequate and proper drainage for storm and surface water regardless of the source.

3. The property shall not be used for a trailer or mobile home park or for a commercial or industrial use of any nature without permission of the City of Kendrick in each instance.

4. All construction and use of said property shall be in conformance with the Uniform Building Code. Other applicable codes for construction and the County of Latah and other applicable zoning regulations.

5. The City reserves easement over, under and across said property for water drainage, and for water and sewer lines, mains and connections now located on and in said real property together with the right of ingress and egress to and from said property for the maintenance, repairs and installation of said lines, mains and connections.

6. For convenience in construction the purchaser with the agreement of the City may, at his expense, relocate said water, drainage and sewer lines, mains and connections on said property.

7. That the minimum bid for the purchase of said property shall be not less than \$20,000.00.

8. The real property will be sold as one tract or parcel and will not be divided for purpose of sale.

9. The City of Kendrick will furnish an owner's policy of title insurance in the standard policy forms in the amount of the bid insuring merchantable title to the premises.

10. Transfer of title will be by deed, without warranties of title.

11. The full amount of the purchase price shall be paid immediately after acceptance of bid or at such later date as the parties agree to in a written document, and if payment of the full price is to be deferred the purchaser shall deposit with the City as earnest money a cashier's check for the sum of \$5,000.00 which shall be forfeited to the City if the entire purchase price is not paid per said written document.

12. If within five (5) years after purchase, the purchaser, or his successors in title, has not developed the property by erecting thereon permitted structures or dwellings the entire tract of land shall revert to the City of Kendrick with all improvements placed thereon, and the City shall return to the purchaser the purchase price paid less 30% of the total purchase price which shall be retained by the City as compensation for rent and liquidated damages.

**Blewett Blasts I. E. A.**

Mike Blewett, district 7 Republican candidate for state representative leveled some heavy criticism at the Idaho Education Assn. via a press release late Wednesday.

Blewett's comments were triggered by the announced endorsement of legislative candidates by the I. E. A. He stated that "the I. E. A. has become a virtual arm of the democratic party in Idaho, that I believe is incapable of making fair, objective decisions about the qualifications of political candidates and the respective candidate's potential of being a supporter of quality education in the state. How can the I. E. A. be objective when only two people interview prospective candidates and one of those two people is Marla Sweeney the regional head of the I. E. A.—who just happens to be a democratic precinct committee woman in Lewiston Orchards Precinct No. 13?"

Blewett continued his criticism by saying, "I don't mind not being endorsed by the I. E. A. because my background in education speaks for itself, what I do mind, however, is the con-job the I. E. A. tries to put over on its members and the public." Blewett listed himself and Frank Clark, retired Lewiston High School Principal and now Republican Candidate for State Representative from District 6 as prime examples of the I. E. A. fooling the public with its endorsements. The outspoken young farmer continued by saying, "Frank Clark has been in education most of his life and knows education as a professional, yet the I. E. A. can endorse Joe Wagoner over Frank Clark. The same holds true with the I. E. A.'s endorsement of Marguerite McLaughlin, an Orofino housewife, over myself who has a masters degree in Education and 8 years college teaching experience.

"It's apparent," stated Blewett, "that the I. E. A. does not want knowledgeable education people who understand the learning process and educational psychology in the legislature because knowledgeable legislators can ask too many penetrating questions and require too much accountability. 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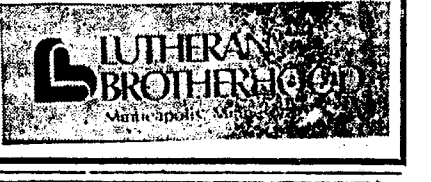
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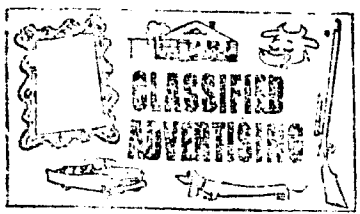
