Hunter Success Looks Favorable For Deer and Elk

Prospects for hunter success looks favorable for the general deer and elk season opening September 27 and others that follow in early October.

Jerry Theissen, State Big Game manager with the Department of Fish and Game, makes the prediction and has cause for optimism.

Last winter was kind to the game animals, he says, and survival rates are good. Habitat improved following the 1976 drought.

"Those scientific" coupled with management techniques that continue to lean toward the conservative side, appear to be bringing the herds back from declines that set in following 1969 for deer and mid-60's for elk, Theissen says.

Management goals for 1980, he believes are in sight. Those goals add up to 243,000 mule deer and 60,900 elk in Idaho.

"Conditions are improving and the trend can be maintained if we continue to be somewhat restrictive with allowable harvests," Theissen says.

But problems remain. Habitat continues to dwindle. Harsh winters or drought are always possibilities. Each year brings more hunters.

For example—just one check station at Enaville in northern Idaho recorded more than 5,000 hunters in 1975, compared to about 2,100 in '63.

To deal with these problems, Theissen says, the department will continue to follow the guidelines established by its Policy Plan.

The guidelines emphasize careful attention to harvest programs, such as consolidation of some opening dates or separation of deer and elk season openings, shortened seasons or antlered only hunts where the needs are indicated.

These programs, in turn, call for efficient measurement of population trends and continuing research to ensure adequate fawn and calf survival.

The Policy Plan calls for department participation in land and water use planning and programs to secure consideration for habitat preservation and protection.

To enhance the elk population, the plan advocates proper timing and duration of logging programs to minimize impact on the herds and controlled fire management programs to improve browse.

To get back to the 1978 season and some words of advice and encouragement from Theissen: "Instruct the weather bureau to avoid forecasts of heavy rain during the opening days, and hunt safely—and good luck."

Treatment Eases Pain Of Crippling Arthritis

Arthritis Is Many Ills
Arthritis is a general word that includes several different but related illnesses. It comes from "arthros" meaning joint and "itis" meaning inflammation.

The American Medical Association reminds that the most common forms are rheumatoid arthritis and osteoarthritis. They are different ailments but each produces painful, deformed joints.

Rheumatoid arthritis is a disease of the whole body. Three times more common in women than in men, it usually begins between the years of 20 and 35. Early symptoms may include weakness, fever, loss of appetite, and loss of weight. The skin, especially the hands, may be cold and clammy. Mental depression is common, and the patient both feels and looks below par. One or more joints become inflamed and swollen.

An attack may begin with a gradually increasing discomfort, or a sudden, dramatic, confining illness. Or anything in between. Attacks may come and go for no apparent reason.

Treatment reduces the pain of an acute attack and usually increases the range of motion. But treatment does not cure. There is no cure. Often an attack of pain in the joint will subside by itself. It usually returns. The quack capitalizes on this tendency of the disease to fluctuate. He claims credit for the treatment being used at the time of natural remission.

Osteoarthritis is a quieter, less dramatic illness. However, when it does develop in a joint it is less likely to go away. Eventually the joint is injured, the smooth lining membrane and the cartilage pads are damaged and permanent changes within the joint limit its motion and make any motion painful.

Everyone will develop osteoarthritis if he or she lives long enough. It begins in middle age, usually in a hip, knee, shoulder or in the back. Often it is first noticed after an injury to a joint.

Management of arthritis involves skilled medical supervision over a lifetime. The physician individualizes the treatment. Drugs may be prescribed to reduce pain and inflammation. Exercise and physical therapy may be recommended. Weight control may be necessary. An arthritic patient often must learn new ways to do common daily tasks. Rest is essential at all times.

Commission Approves

Fall Steelhead Catch-and-Release Season

The Fish and Game Commission has approved a fall steelhead season, but it is limited to catch-and-release because relatively few fish are expected in the run.

Dates are September 30 through December 31 on stretches of the Salmon, Snake and Clearwater rivers.

With about 30 percent of the run past Ice Harbor Dam and into the Lower Snake, the Department of Fish and Game projects a final count of not more than 25,000 fish.

Dave Ortmann, anadromous fisheries supervisor, says historical guidelines call for a minimum count of 40,000 to allow catch-and-keep fishing.

The estimated count of 25,000 is just enough for a catch-and-release season, he adds. It compares to about 55,000 in the 1977 upstream river, according to department records.

Ortmann says the reduced numbers this fall are attributed largely to last year's drought, which reduced stream flow and failed to produce enough current to assist the steelhead in their downstream migration.

"Had the fish even made it down to the first two dams in larger numbers, screening and transportation facilities could have been better utilized to get more of them to the

ocean," he explains.

Regulations specify that the steelhead must be immediately released unharmed and only artificial flies or lures with a single, barbless hook will be allowed. On the Salmon and Clearwater Rivers, the Commission has ruled that the same gear restrictions will apply to all other species for which there is an open season.

A permit is required for catch-and-release steelhead fishing, but anglers are not required to record the catch on the permit.

Here are the open waters:

Clearwater River, including the Clearwater River arm of Lower Granite Reservoir upstream to the Clearwater River bridge at Orofino, except that the shoreline along the perimeter of Dworshak National Fish Hatchery is closed to steelhead fishing.

Clearwater River North Fork, from Ahsahka Highway bridge upstream to 300 feet below Dworshak Dam and for shore anglers only on the west shore from the mouth of the North Fork to Ahsahka Highway bridge.

Snake River, including the Snake River arm of Lower Granite Reservoir upstream to 400 feet below Hells Canyon Dam.

Salmon River from its mouth upstream to the U. S. Highway 93 bridge within the Salmon city limits.

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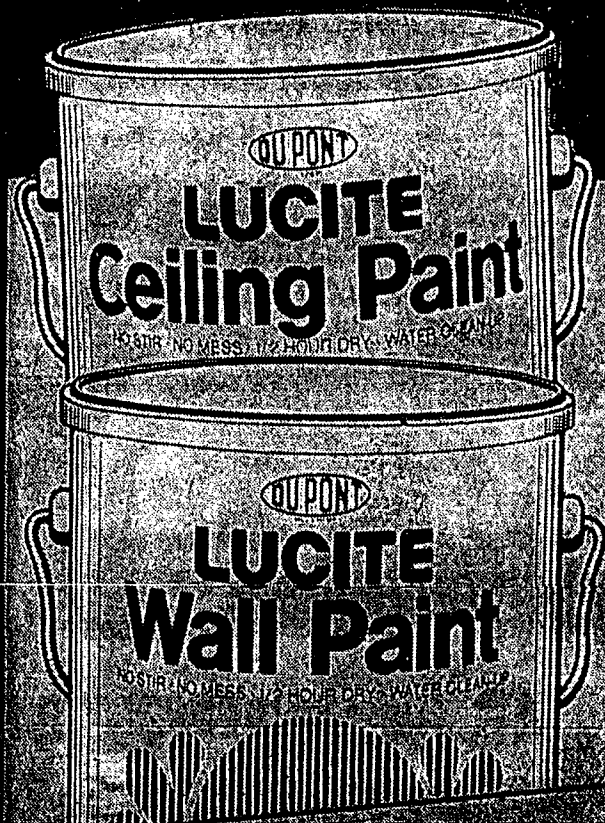
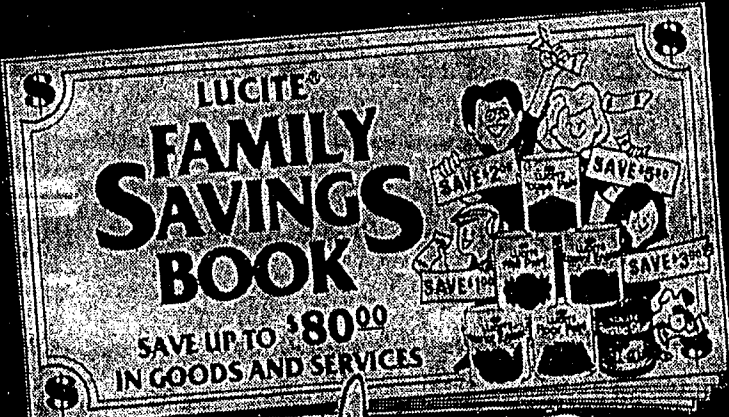
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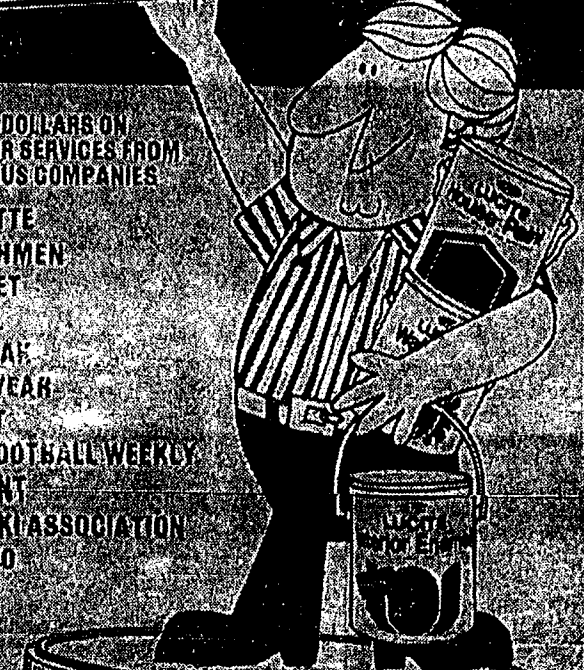

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Family Affair—

Anxiety

Not the least of these problems will be anxieties that arise as a child grows up and goes through all of the developmental stages of life. Anxiety over the first day of school. Anxiety over a test, the first date, getting a job, getting married, having children—in short, meeting the demands of living. In all of these instances, anxiety provides the needed spark to bring the individual to a proper state of readiness to meet the task. But anxiety can get out of hand. It can overwhelm the person, and, instead of preparing him for a threat, can paralyze him with fear of the future. Thus, anxiety can become many different things, to different people.

Freud saw anxiety as a sense of being unable to cope with the situation and even being unable to identify the source of anxiety. Anxiety, in his view, became a clash of forces and drives within the individual, many of which were biologically caused and all of which were the product of the personality.

Today, psychologists have divided anxiety into two distinct classes—trait anxiety and state anxiety. State anxiety would be much likely to be elicited by objective events, situations of danger that most people would agree are real, present and threatening. Trait anxiety is something that is more permanent, less responsive to the external situation.

It is this trait anxiety that more closely fits the Freudian definition. It is the little, black cloud that people carry around with them wherever they go. It doesn't alter appreciably with changes in the external situation. It is something that is a personality characteristic, something that enables us to say that some peo-

ple are more anxious than others. Some people worry and some do not.

In the grip of anxiety, physical and psychological events take place that seem wholly out of proportion to the threat. The heart beats at a rapid rate. People may tremble or sweat profusely. They may struggle to breathe, and occasionally, in extreme cases that are frozen into temporary paralysis.

Psychologically, symptoms produced by anxiety are equally deep and pervasive in their effects on the personality. Emotional instability, irritability, endless fatigue and building of fantasies to replace or relieve the threatened danger are all part of the personality adjustments brought about by anxiety.

For most people, such anxiety "attacks" are of limited duration and produce only minimal discomfort. Most individuals have long since learned to cope with their anxieties by either seeking a word of reassurance or encouragement, from spouse a relative or friend, or by realizing that the situation is beyond their control, and the anxiety it has produced is simply not very useful. Others, do what is most rational and effective in overcoming their anxieties; they secure enough knowledge about the anxiety-producing situation to resolve it.

Still other experience anxiety as a condition far more perilous than the loss of a night's sleep or a day or two of uneasiness. Anxiety can carry them into a neurosis that is a chronic illness. The victim is seized by feelings of tension and apprehension, breathlessness and palpitation, nervousness, irritability, chest pain and discomfort, easy tiring, dizziness, numbness, trembling and faintness. These chronic feelings often spill over into acute anxiety attacks that produce abrupt spells of an intense fear of impending doom that comes on without any apparent cause.

September Genesee

Council Meeting

Was Lengthy

Mayor L. W. Sorensen presided over the regular September meeting of the City Council, which proved to be a lengthy session.

Zoning permit applications were reviewed. Approved a mobile home for Stan Merrill; refused a storage shed for both M. Bruegeman and L. E. Brown.

A Personnel Policy that had been tentatively approved several months ago was given final approval and will be printed soon.

The Appropriation Ordinance for the fiscal year Oct. 1, '78 to Sept. 30, '79 was approved and passed. This Ordinance calls for General Fund expenditures in the amount of \$92,393.00 and Water-Sewer Fund expenditures in the amount of \$56,568.00, a total of \$148,961.00.

The Solid Waste Contract with the Latah County Commissioners was read and approved. It will become effective on Oct. 1, 1978 and will be renewed after one year. The rates for pick up are decreased for this FY '78-'79, Households will be charged \$3.70, trailers in mobile home parks, \$2.65 and apartment dwellers also \$2.65. Commercial establishments rates will be lowered .30c per cubic yd. per month for each cubic yd. collected per week.

Street Commissioner Moden moved for a vote of appreciation for Mayor Sorensen for the time and effort put forth during the formulation of the contract and the Public Hearings that accompanied it. Motion was seconded and carried unanimously.

Carl Mark Petrie, newly hired part time assistant to Chief of Police Greg Ross, and also part-time assistant to Supervisor Grieser applied to the Council for admittance to the Genesee Volunteer Fire Department. Council accepted his request and it will be forwarded to the Fire Department.

Two bids were received on the 1942 International truck. Both were rejected and the city will plan to put the truck to use when a long bed is required such as hauling culverts and sewer pipes.

The Dept. of Housing and Urban Development in Seattle has been working with the Corps of Engineers to provide Genesee with a Flood Insurance Study. It has been presented to us in its preliminary stages along with two maps, one showing the flood insurance rate map, the other the flood boundary and floodway map. This study and the maps are available for perusal at the City Hall. A Public Hearing will be held on this matter shortly, but no date has been set. Since the purpose of the hearing is for an opportunity for public questioning it might be worth while to drop in to review this study and look at the maps before this hearing.

Water-Sewer Commissioner Singhose reports construction starting on a water line in the alley between Chestnut & Walnut from Laurel to Spruce. During the past month 300 feet of 6" water line has been installed in Hazel and Tamarack Street to replace an old line that ruptured. Singhose also discussed the possibility of billing on a quarterly basis for water, sewer and solid waste pick up rather than monthly. It was agreed to include a questionnaire with the next water bills to gather thoughts and feeling in regards to this change.

Parks & Recreation Commissioner Wilson reports a large evergreen tree in the Upper Park was struck by lightning and is seemingly dying. He is recommending it be removed before it becomes a real hazard.

Police Commissioner Merrill reports the patrol car will be given a tune-up as it will be several months before a new car will be available. Already we have had several offers to buy our 1969 patrol car. No decision will be made until a new car is delivered.

Street Commissioner Moden discussed a possible problem with an alley that is being used without having been opened throughout its length. We will erect a moveable barrier that can be put up and taken down at will by the user when it is necessary that the alley be utilized.
