Julietta Mill Fire Saturday Morning Threatened Town

Embers and sparks from a wind-whipped fire at Gem State Lumber Co. in Julietta early Saturday morning threatened to cause wide-spread damage before it was brought under control by several volunteer fire departments and dozens of local citizens plus mill employees. Despite the threat the fire was contained to mill property which lost an estimated million board feet of logs, about a quarter of the mill's log supply.

The fire was contained in about a fifteen-acre log deck beside the Potlatch River on the other side of the railroad tracks, which fortunately served as a fire break against the intense flames. Also lost in the fire was the old NP railroad depot, some corrals and a hay pile. The depot was property of Neal Holsington, Julietta, who leases the land to the mill.

The fire had apparently started in a smoldering pile of saw dust and other mill debris which had been buried routinely by workers, who had no idea, as no one else did that a violent wind storm would sweep across the area a short time later.

Shortly after 2:30 unforecast winds gusting to over 50 miles per hour on the hills and almost that sweeping down into the valley fanned the smoldering saw dust and refuse back into open flames which soon worked their way to the nearby log decks before the blaze was noticed and the alarm sounded shortly after 3 a. m.

With the wind feeding the flames the fire burned furiously, lighting the valley and the sky with a brightness that could be seen for miles. Nearby homeowners were aroused from their sleep and those who were not down at the scene of the fire stayed close to home with hoses to wet down the falling sparks and blowing debris. Fear for the entire town was felt at one point, but valiant effort and some luck prevented the fire from crossing the tracks and into the larger piles and decks of logs and stacked lumber. It was approximately 5:30 a. m. when the fire was considered under control.

Two Genesee Men Win In Tuesday Vote; 1% Carries State

Idahoans in general went along all of the 1% initiative Tuesday, but Latah County and District 5 turned with the tax-revolt and voted approximately down on the proposal. In other results at the county level Genesee farmer Tom Boyd was returned to the House of Representatives when he received more votes than Moscow architect John Berg. Jay Nelson, another Genesee area farmer defeated Latah County Commissioner Donna Bray in his first bid for an elective office. Another incumbent Democrat Robert Hosack was defeated by new-comer Joe Walker for a District 5 House seat.

In District 7, Troy farmer Lester Clemm was on his way to winning a seat in the State Senate over Leroy Carlson, a Troy businessman. Marguerite McLaughlin, an Orofino homemaker and member of the Orofino school board turned back the strong bid of Mike Blewett, a Culesac farmer for the District 7 House seat vacated by Clemm, who picked up the seat vacated by retiring Claud Judd.

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State Grange Master Gives Annual Report

The annual Master's Address officially opened the 70th Annual Session of the Idaho State Grange in Payette, Idaho. Mr. Gordon Tate, Master of the Idaho State Grange, Coeur d'Alene praised the various programs and activities of the State Grange including those involving Women's Activities, Youth and Junior Departments. The Grange recognized as

the oldest Farm organization in America has remained a family fraternal organization for over 100 years. Tate took the opportunity to inform the members and delegates of the legislative policy positions of the Grange in several governmental areas.

Rare II: the Grange put forth a great effort and emphasis on the Roadless-Wilderness issue. The main purpose stated Tate was the involvement of people on the issue, some 180,000 responses were received by the Forest Service from parts of Idaho.

Legislative Progress: Tate saluted

Grange-Legislator Claude Judd from Orofino for his efforts in implementing revisions of the Idaho Driver's license test.

Tate reported the support of the Grange for President Carter to sign the Beef Import bill passed by Congress.

Energy: Whereas agriculture remains to be a major user of energy, studies show only about 3 percent of the total consumption goes for the production of food. This efficient production resulted in the crop production nearly doubling between '67-'76. We presently export nearly 1/3 of this total production, offsetting the nation's trade deficit from the oil imports.

Tate urged Grangers to conserve energy at every opportunity, including the elimination of wasteful planning construction practices. The State Master stressed the need for developing more energy sources instead of pondering methods of dividing the shortage. He also reported the support of the National Grange on the efforts of constructing the oil pipeline system as a source of addi-

tional oil for the United States.

Transportation: Tate encouraged the involvement of Idahoans in the proposed 70 mile stretch from Interstate 80 to Highway 95 south of Council to better link the highway system between North and South Idaho.

Tate concluded his remarks by thanking the affiliate organizations of the Grange including insurance companies, credit unions, cooperatives and mentioned the support the Idaho State Grange gives I-H, FFA and Vocational Agriculture teachers in the Gem State.

Tate closed his remarks by saying: "One of the aims of our Order is to build better manhood and womanhood. Keeping this in mind, I know that you have the ability and I have the confidence that working together in the Grange we will build better communities, a better Idaho and a better America."

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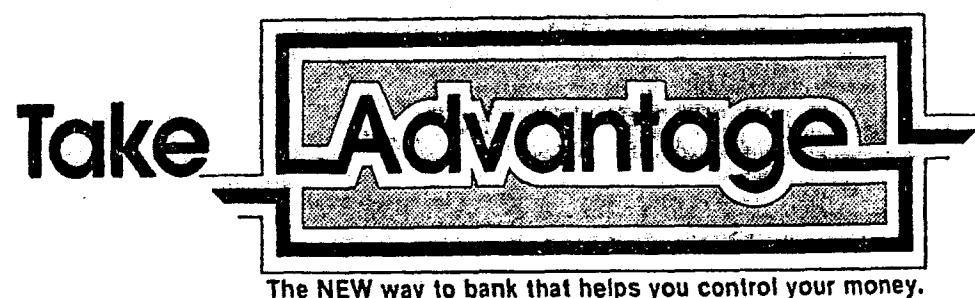

Right of Way Spraying Part of Weed Control

The basic responsibility of the county weed control program is the application of herbicides to public lands and enforcement of the State Noxious Weed Law. Each county has a sizable amount of public land in the form of road rights of way to inspect and spray. Right of way applications are seen as a preventative treatment designed to reduce the total amount of herbicides used in the production of food and fiber. Right of way spraying is perhaps the original and most useful of the Integrated Pest Management tools now available. Only when the numbers of plant species in an area are stabilized will biological or "natural" control methods become cost effective. It is a notable fact that good weed control practices will complement Integrated Pest Management programs for plant diseases and insect pests as well. New weeds can be eradicated before they are allowed to establish, spread and continue in their traditional role as host and vector. Even foreign weeds that at first appear to be a limited problem may prove to be the undoing of some valuable conservation measure of the future.

Aside from crop losses, rangeland can be debilitated as well. Of new weeds invading Idaho, only one in ten is a problem in cultivated land. The majority occur in range and are capable of our competing our native grasses causing financial losses to cattlemen and habitat loss to wildlife. Native bunch grasses are not capable of competing with heavy seeding and biennial weeds. A fine

example is the knapweeds which adjust to the climate to maximize their growth by occurring as a biennial or perennial. These plants may also continue to grow and set seed in the fall after the grass has matured and no longer offers competition.

Occasionally a plant will become established that not only causes one hundred percent loss of grazing capacity, but is poisonous as well. Yellow-star thistle which is a problem in Latah, NezPerce, Lewis, Clearwater and Idaho Counties is toxic to horses. Ingestion causes degeneration of the brain stem area of the horse and that results in paralysis of the tongue and lips. The degeneration effects are irreversible and eventually cause the animal's death from starvation.

Popular support of weed control programs is essential if we are to preserve our native plant communities and maintain the productivity of our croplands. Changes in the plant community can change the way people live and usually it is the small land owner or rancher who is most affected. By preserving the productivity of all our lands we will maintain a broad based economy and preserve our traditional lifestyles.


