Flood Control Meeting Held In Genesee

The public meeting held on Thurs., Nov. 9th at City Hall was attended by Virgil Cromer and Bill Hawkins, in addition to Clerk Roach and Mayor Sorenson. Carl Cook, a field officer for the Federal Insurance Administration (FIA) pointed out that 2 1/2 years have been spent identifying flood hazard areas around the nation. Maps have been produced showing the areas likely to be affected by the 100-year and 500-year floods. Ron Barrett, representing the Corp of Engineers was also present.

Although Genesee already has an ordinance regulating flood plain construction, that ordinance will have to be reviewed in order to be able to meet the federal requirements. If these mandatory laws are not enforced the owners risk the loss of bank loans for construction in the affected area. If the city fails to take action within approximately 9 months, the federal government can and will cut off all federally-insured loans for flood plain buildings.

Maps and information on this report are on file at City Hall and can be seen during office hours, Monday through Friday, 9 a. m. to 1 p. m. In addition, a copy will be at the office of the city treasurer and can be seen during regular office hours. A copy will be at the Genesee City Library and may be seen during their regular open days.

The City Council of Genesee met for their regular monthly meeting Nov. 8th at 7:30 p. m. at City Hall, with Mayor Sorenson presiding.

John Hickman attended and asked if the city had not already collected sufficient revenue through the monthly surcharge to pay off the bonds that were issued in 1958. Since the monies collected have been combined with the regular water and sewer fund monies it will be almost impossible to determine whether or not the amount of the bonds would have now been paid. The bonding attorney, the time of the issuance, set the monthly charge and the city was told to collect that charge until June of 1979. Attorney Barker, also in attendance at the meeting was asked to investigate. City records are on a retention schedule and other than a few permanent re-



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records, are routinely destroyed after one or five or ten years.

Also attending the meeting was Michael Johnson, who proposed a sewer line from his property with a pump he feels would handle the lift necessary to reach the nearest manhole. We will ask our engineers and also the Department of Health to approve this plan.

Gary Kislig discussed the Medical Service Bureau health insurance plan with the council.

Bills in the amount of \$16,045 were reviewed and approved. Water-Sewer accounts in the amount of \$10,271 and General Fund accounts amounted to \$5,774.

A letter to the City from Claude Williams was turned over to Barker.

Building permits approved by D. Mitchell, Building Inspector were reviewed by the council. They include a garage for Albert Walters, a patio for Lloyd Esser and installation of a stove for Les Whitbeck. Zoning permit was issued to Doug Ashburn for a residential lot. Robert Austin issued a permit to demolish the remains of a burned home.

A letter was received from Dept. of General Services of Moscow asking if the city would be interested in handling recreational maps of Latah County. It was agreed we would have a supply on hand for sale at 25c.

The bid received from Hoff Ford of Lewiston was the lowest and the car will be purchased from Hoff. The old car will be sold outright. Chief of Police Ross was given permission to purchase and use a tranquilizer gun to help catch sick animals and dogs at large. Attorney Barker will check the legal requirements.

FREE FIREWOOD AVAILABLE IN CLEARWATER FOREST

Area residents can cut and haul firewood free of charge almost anywhere in the Clearwater National Forest, according to Supervisor Ken Norman.

Norman said that persons interested in getting firewood for personal use from national forest land should contact the appropriate ranger station to secure a written permit. He said that Idaho state law requires vehicles hauling any forest product on public roads to carry the permit or a bill of sale for proof of ownership.

Firewood permits for the Clearwater National Forests are free, Norman said. "Two of our districts, Canyon and Lochsa, will specify on the permit one or two areas where firewood can be cut. The other districts allow cutting anywhere except within active timber sales, recreation areas, wilderness or administrative sites." He added that cutting of firewood is limited to standing dead or downed trees unless otherwise specified by the District Ranger.

He also pointed out that permits are issued for one season. On some of the districts the "wood cutting season" would last until heavy rains or snow make roads impassable. Some of the lower elevation districts are accessible into the winter.

Norman asked that firewood cutters make every effort to keep the national forest clean and to refrain from using backwoods roads that are wet and subject to damage. He also reminded forest users to drive defensively on narrow forest roads.
