KHS Girls Open Basketball Season with Two Wins

Controlling the backboards and using excellent defense Kendrick's girls basketball team opened its season over the weekend and took two victories Friday and Saturday in home games. Friday night the KHS squad handed Prairie a rare loss 32-27 and then bombed Timberline 51-20 Saturday evening.

The rebounding of Lisa Boe and Shelley Bowers was a big factor in both wins as the two girls swept the boards clean and effectively sealed up the inside from Prairie and Timberline.

Friday night the Tigers served notice that Prairie's reign was over as the power of the girls' basketball league. Glenda Lohman dropped in the first field goal of the evening 30 seconds after the game had started and the KHS squad ran up a 12-0 lead before Prairie finally got on the score board. Kendrick had run up the score to 20-6 at the half time.

Prairie finally got its offense untracked in the second half and up the pressure on the Tigers in the final minutes of play, but the KHS team withstood the final rally to come away with the 32-27 win.

Glenda Lohman's 12 points led all scorers. Ferris Cuddy scored 4 points, Lisa Boe 6, Shelley Bowers 7 and Bonnie Lawrence 3.

The young JV team didn't fare as well going down to a 39-13 defeat at the hands of a taller, well-drilled Prairie squad.

Christmas Trees Available Free on Clearwater National Forest

Families can cut their own Christmas tree free of charge on most of the forest land administered by the Clearwater National Forest according to Supervisor Ken Norman.

Norman said that no permit is required for cutting a single tree. Idaho state law requires, however, that persons hauling more than two trees must carry a permit or bill of sale from the landowner. With the exception of camp or picnic areas, administrative sites and experimental tracts, trees may be cut anywhere within 5 of the 6 ranger districts on the Clearwater.

On the Plouise District north and east of Moscow the ranger has set aside a specific cutting area, Norman said. Cutting outside of that area is prohibited on that district. The cutting area is located five miles north of Bovill on Highway 3. A large scale map and cutting information are posted at the highway turnout.

Norman said persons interested in cutting a tree on any of the other districts are invited to check with a district ranger's office for specific directions and land ownership information.

"Other public agencies and private landowners may have different policies regarding Christmas tree cutting, Norman said. Entering their lands could be trespassing, so care should be taken to determine where you're going to cut your tree."

Trees well back from main-traveled roads and highways should be selected. They should be cut as close to the ground as possible. Cutting the tops out of taller trees is prohibited.

Kendrick-Julietta Scouts Entering 30th Year

Despite Abrupt Increase Idaho Construction Still Below Normal Levels

Residential building permit construction in Idaho rose abruptly in October relative to the previous three months, but remained far below last year's pace said James Hoogland, Jr., Kendrick and Stan Merrill, managers, quoting the October Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A. The report, to be distributed this week is edited by Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, vice president and economist of First Security Corporation.

According to the publication, the number of permits issued in October for new dwelling units was the highest total recorded since May. During the month, the total value of authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations was \$59,078,647 up 14% from October 1977.

Compared to last October, new residential construction decreased both in number and value of construction. The October 1978 total of 986 new dwelling units valued at \$28,350,217 represented a 25.9% decrease in number and a 23.6% decrease in

GRANGE DELEGATES APPROVE RESOLUTIONS

Resolutions approved by delegates at the 70th Annual Session of the Idaho State Grange at Payette included those requesting that E. P. A grant permission to use DDT to control the Western Bean Cutworm, encouragement of the family farm by studying ways to prevent the loss of farm land to developments and to increase income to farm families; limiting the foreign ownership of U. S. farm lands and also requesting an inventory of sales of land to foreigners be compiled and made public.

Grange delegates approved revision or complete repeal of the 160-A limitation provisions of the 1902 Reclamation Act; abolishing riders to legislative bills; forbidding any taxpayer-supported organization (government) from offering services competitive with private enterprise; no undermining of the power and status of the U. S. D. A. be allowed.

Grangers voted in favor of calf-hood vaccination being made mandatory in order to prevent brucellosis; that standards for dairy imports be the same as our own domestic ones; that the Dairy Promotion fee be raised to 1%; and that dairy imports entering this country be charged a duty equal to 10c per hundred weight and that milk used in the schools be maintained at highest quality.

A resolution to request that control of gun registration be denied the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms was approved, Grangers agreed to continue asking for state and federal support of vocational education programs; and approved a resolution asking all food service industries to provide truth in menu so the consumer knows what is offered and ordered. A resolution that called discriminatory the practice of enforcing truck highway speed at 45 mph while cars be allowed to go 55 mph was approved and efforts to produce gas-ahol were also approved.

The Grange Session showed over 550 registered, with 76 Subordinate Granges and 19 Pomona Granges represented.

WOOD SELECTION IS INDIVIDUAL CHOICE

John R. Coziar, Assistant Agricultural Editor, Moscow—Even before you swing an axe or take delivery of a stick of firewood, you really should decide what you want from your fireplace or stove this winter, advises a University of Idaho extension forester.

"Selecting firewood species is a very important first step if you are to be satisfied with the performance of your fireplace or stove," said Don Hanley, successor to Vern Burlison, who retired this summer after 32 years in the post. "While I can offer some guidelines, species preference is a value judgment that each individual must make."

Each species of tree produces wood with different fuel characteristics, some put out a lot of heat, while others produce fires that are simply nice to look at.

Even though heating with wood has been touted as a way to save

value compared to last year.

The report noted that the significant increase in nonresidential construction permits for commercial and industrial projects primarily reflected activity in 3 cities. Boise issued nonresidential permits totaling \$6.8 million, while nonresidential permits in Moscow reached \$5.5 million and \$2.1 million in Rexburg. All phases of building permit construction remained very slow in southeastern Idaho.



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fuel bills, people should realize it is not a "free" source of heat, he stressed.

"It takes energy whether you go into the forest yourself and cut, split and haul the wood home or you have someone else do it for you," Hanley stated. "The major advantage of using wood is aesthetic, not always economic."

He pointed out that wood must be readily accessible for it to be worthwhile to gather it.

"If you can't get it easily, it's going to cost you more into the long-run than if you relied on conventional heat sources such as electricity and oil," he remarked.

Some may seek a big, rapidly burning fire that crackles and smells good. For this, he said, a mixture of grand fire and white pine would fill the bill in northern Idaho, while lodgepole pine and Engelmann spruce would do best in the south.

For an average fire that combines aesthetics with heat production, he suggested a mixture of rapid and slow burning woods such as white pine and larch.

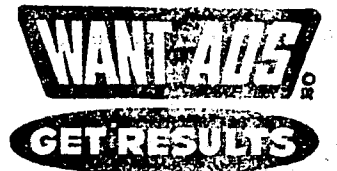
How much wood do you need? Obviously the UI forester noted, it depends on the heat value of the species you select and how often you plan to use your fireplace or stove.

Some woods, such as larch and ash, put out a lot of heat. Others, like grand fir and cottonwood, produce very little warmth.

"With a low efficiency device such as a fireplace that you'll use 3 or 4 nights a week, you'll require about 2 cords per winter," he estimated. "However, if you anticipate having a fire going all day everyday, you could burn up to 10 cords."

He noted that the more efficient, slow-combustion stoves now on the market could reduce this "appreciable, perhaps by 50 percent."

A cord of firewood is a stack—not a rounded pile—of split wood measuring four feet high, eight feet long and four feet deep that contains 128 cubic feet including the air spaces between the pieces of wood. Generally, 80 cubic feet of solid wood is contained in this traditional unit of measure for fuelwood.

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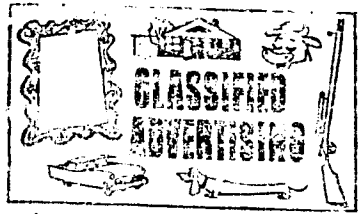

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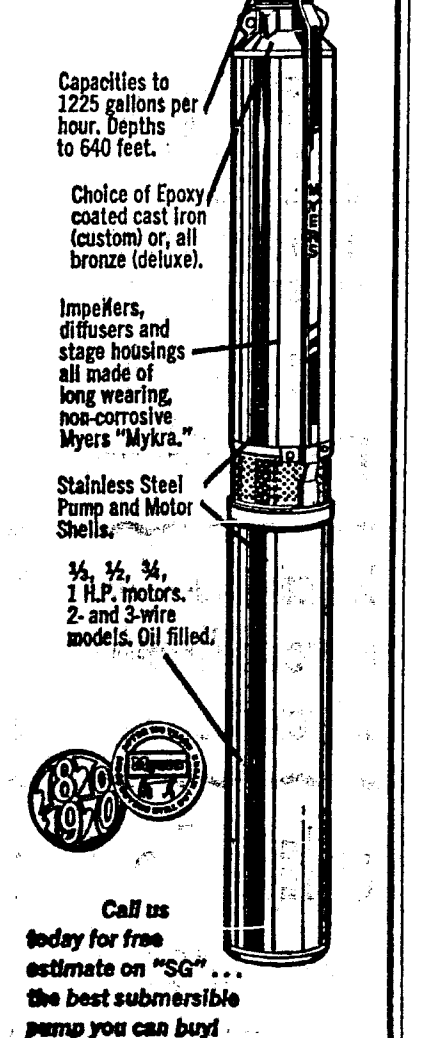

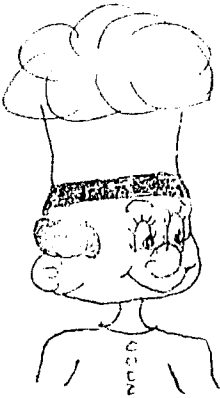
