Kendrick fans won't have a chance to see their team on the home court until Dec. 15 when the Tigers host Potlatch. Genesee will be at home against the visiting Deary Mustangs as Genesee renews a rivalry with that squad after several years of no-scheduling.

### Lots of Bulldog Veterans

While Genesee may lack in height, it will have a wealth of returning lettermen. At the present time Ozzie is carrying nine players on the varsity roster; eight of them lettermen from the 77-78 season.

Tim Stout, Mark Kanikkeberg, Mike Burt, Darrel Stout, Pete Becker, Bruce Haynes, Bob Chance, Dave Bennett and Howard Sims are the Bulldog varsity this year and all but Chance, a transfer from Lewiston, lettered on the team last year. Haynes, at 6-3, Sims at 6-2 and Burt at 6-1 are Kanikkeberg's tall men, but he has some excellent ball handlers and shooters to help make up for the lack of height. The Genesee coach hasn't picked any specific starting five and said, "Who we play will probably decide who we start." Asked about his predictions for the team during the coming season, Ozzie said, "It's hard to tell, we're shooting well and if we can get on the boards we'll do all right."

Genesee finished the season last year with a slightly under 50 percent record and Ozzie left no doubt that the Bulldogs will be out to better that average.

### Kendrick Has Height

Coach Brent Monroe's Tigers don't have the experience that the Bulldogs have, but they do have five lettermen back this year including 6-5 senior Doug Parks, one of the premier post men in the district. Also back for the Tigers are Tony Snyder, Ed Pea, Bret Gertje and Scott Manfull, all seniors and experienced players. Manfull is 6-4 and Mike Brocke, another senior is pushing up at 6-2.

Rounding out the Kendrick varsity rosters are Juniors Rex Snyder, Diane Howerton, Joe Mathews, Tom Rossiter and Guy VonBergen. VonBergen has the dubious honor to be the first casualty of the season for the Tigers as he suffered an ankle injury in practice and may be out for six weeks.

Monroe said Tuesday night that Friday's probable starters would be Parks, Snyder, Pea, Gertje, and Manfull. "We've got plenty of good depth, but we need to improve our defense some more," Monroe said. He indicated the Tigers would be using the fast break this year, a change from the deliberate type of ball that marked the Kendrick teams of previous years.

Last year the Tigers finished the season with a 10-10 record, swept the district in three straight games, but were eliminated at state in 2 straight games for a 13-12 over-all season.

Monroe will be assisted this year by Gale Vallem, who will also coach the junior varsity squad. The JV's will have a 12-man team this year... all sophomores, except two juniors. "We've got lots of depth," was Vallem's appraisal of the JV's.

### Skiers Spent 35 Million In Idaho in 1977

By Bill Loftus, College of Forestry, Wildlife and Range Sciences

Moscow—Prompted by a severe drought that nearly shut down western skiing two seasons ago, a U.I. researcher's study reports that downhill skiing during a normal year contributes over \$35 million to the Idaho economy.

Dr. Joe Hoffman, associate professor of wildland recreation, based his figures on nearly 5,000 questionnaires filled out by skiers at 21 downhill ski areas last winter.

Among Idahoans, Hoffman's report states that Boise boasted the largest number of skiers with 10%, Idaho Falls ranked second with 8% and Pocatello skiers made up 7% of the in-state group.

Grangeville, Moscow and Lewiston skiers accounted for about 2% apiece of the in-state group followed by McCall, Osburn and Wallace skiers at just over the 1% apiece.

About the study, Hoffman said, "As far as we know this is the first comprehensive look at the effect of skiing on the Idaho economy ever conducted in this state."

Hoffman used the number of skier days, full or partial-day visits to Idaho ski areas as reflected in their attendance figures, along with the amount of money survey respondents reported spending per visit to arrive at the final \$35 million.

He estimated that of the 1.2 million skier days spent at Idaho ski areas, nonresidents accounted for 690,000 of them compared to 520,000 skier days for residents.

Altogether the study estimated that skiers spent over \$32 million for lodging, meals, entertainment and other ski-related services or miscellaneous products while here.

They also spent over \$1 million for season ski passes and nonresidents spent \$2 million that remained in state for package ski trips to resort areas.

However, Hoffman said his study did not include sales of ski equipment clothing or special snow equipment for vehicles or money spent on ski-related purchases while not on skiing trips.

According to the report, Sun Valley proved the most lucrative area in attracting skier revenue with over \$18 million spent there. Of that total, non-residents provided the bulk, spending \$16.4 while Idahoans spent nearly \$1.7 million there.

The other 3 top-grossing areas included Bogus Basin with \$4.3 million, Schweitzer Basin with \$2.7 million, and Grand Targee with \$2.8 million. Hoffman said he included the last, actually in Wyoming, in the study because the only access route passes through Driggs, Idaho and therefore the area draws skiers and their money into this state.

Nonresident skiers spent the majority 58% of their money on lift tickets, food and board the study states. Their largest expense was food followed by lift tickets and lodging.

Another purpose of Hoffman's study was to gather data about who Idaho skiers are and what they do for a living.

Among those responding, 31% indicated they worked in professional

capacities, 18% said they were students and 14% indicated they were employed as executives or business managers, including farmers.

32% reported annual incomes of \$15,000 to \$21,999 and those with incomes above \$50,000 accounted for another 13%.

Hoffman's survey forms also included additional space for random comments from skiers.

Surprisingly, the comments turned up complaints about the Idaho potato, its size as served in Idaho restaurants, and how it was prepared; diners complained it did not live up to what they expected from Idaho spuds," his report states.

Hoffman's study was commissioned by Gov. John Evans and funded by the Pacific Northwest Regional Commission. The final fleshed-out version of the report is expected to be published in about 3 months, he said.

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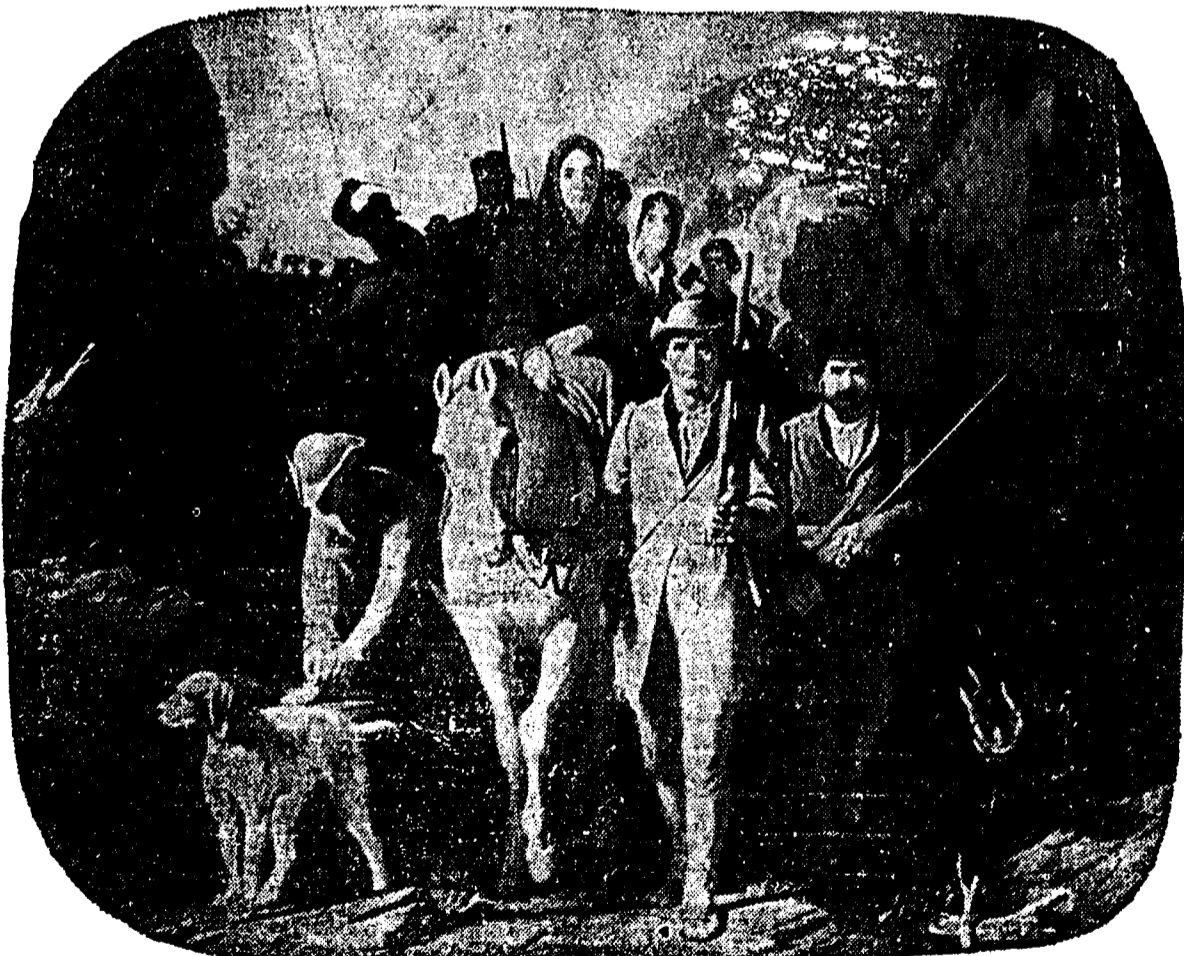
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**National Grange Opposes Veto of Meat Import Act**

Denver, Colorado—Delegates attending the 112th Annual Session of the National Grange in Denver, Colo., took action today strongly opposing President Carter's veto of the Meat Import Act. In a direct communication to the President, John W. Scott, Master of the National Grange, said the veto will not provide more beef for American consumers. He said cattle men will not expand their herds as long as the fear of increased beef imports hangs over the market. Consequently, the long-run retail price of beef will continue to increase until domestic production meets the demand.

Scott said the Grange delegates are critical of the recently announced 1979 feed grain program. He said the program fails to reduce next year's production enough to prevent a serious addition to surpluses and a further deterioration of prices. He said the double-barreled announcement of the beef bill veto and weak feed grain program are shots that will be heard in the countryside and echoed back to Washington.

The Grange also opposes transferring the Forest Service and the Soil Conservation Service from the Department of Agriculture to the Department of the Interior or a new Department of Natural Resources. Scott said the conservation of soil and water are principle practices in the production of food and fiber and are fundamental to the total package of farm programs administered by USDA. He also said that with over 50% of total woodlands being on private owned land by farmers, the services delivered by the Forest Service are an integral part of the overall farm services administered to USDA. Only USDA has the delivery system necessary to provide information regarding woodlot management to private woodlot owners, said Scott. Scott reported that the Grange delegates who represent 500,000 members in 41 states, voted to urge the FDA and USDA to permit the continued use of nitrite in food

**50-cent Vendor Fee In Effect for '79 Licenses, Tags, Permits**

Fish and game licenses, tags and permits for 1979 will each cost 50 cents more under a law approved by the last Idaho legislature.

The across-the-board fee replaces the 5 percent-15-cent minimum commission to vendors. It will improve service to the public, give vendors a better return and benefit Department of Fish and Game program.

Vendors prior to 1979 paid for their surety bonds, required by law when state funds are handled. The flat fee will allow the department to

products until such time as the Delaney Clause can be amended and a determination made under the guidelines of a new law, or that action to ban nitrite be delayed until such time as a suitable substitute has been developed.

They also noted a need to improve the 1977 Food and Agriculture Act. They recommended the feed grain program be announced by September 15 to allow producers more lead time in planning next year's farm operations, maintain the CCC grain reserves release provisions at 180% of the target price, diversion payments on an irrigated yield basis be made only when irrigated land is diverted from farm production, state ASCS committees be appointed from present county-elected committees, substantial set-aside payments as an incentive for producers to reduce production and that soybeans be designated as a basic farm commodity.

Additional action taken included support for further development of cooperative export marketing, standard grades for feed grains, a moratorium on the purchase of agricultural land by foreign investors until the results of the registration act can be evaluated, improved farm loan programs, and continued funding of agricultural research programs.

purchase a bond covering all vendors. Their total added return, including an increase of about \$27,800 in commissions and savings from department of the bond, is estimated at \$40,440.

Licenses, tags and permits should be easier to purchase on the spot. The individual bonding limitations caused vendors to be reluctant to stock higher cost licenses when most of their sales were of lower cost types, but it will now be possible to furnish them with supplies on an "as needed" basis.

Vendors can expect more equitable compensation from the 50-cent fee. For example, they received 25 cents for the sale of a resident hunting license, but were required to spend more time processing it—verifying and recording residency than for the \$2.50 commission on a non-resident hunting license.

The standard fee should also offer more incentive for vendors to stock and sell lower priced licenses.

Under the present system, each commission is paid from the value of the sale. The department, by retaining the full amount, will be able to earmark some \$88,000 in fiscal '79 for fish production facilities and wild life habitat improvement.

And the department's Bureau of Administration likes the idea because it will allow closer accounting and better control of distribution and sales.

**DEER, ELK HARVESTS UP FROM PAST SEASONS**

The dry weather has made it tough for hunters, but their reports to the Department of Fish and Game show that the harvest of deer and elk is higher than it has been for 3 seasons.

Tabulation of hunter report cards for the 4th week shows 3,918 deer taken, compared to 3,164 at the same time last year, 2,417 in 1975 and 2,509 in 1976.

The elk count is 1,191 up from 944 for a comparable period a year ago. Totals in 1976-75 were 816 and 1,135 respectively.

Jerry Theissen, state big game manager says the harvest ratio of bulls to cows 50 percent is right on target with management objectives.

The ratio of bucks, however stands at 64 percent instead of a more desirable 75 percent and it reflects the unfavorable conditions for mule deer hunters, according to Theissen.

"But if the weather continues, we can look for the herd to show a larger carryover," he says, "and we have the winter range to support them, barring severe weather."

Bear hunters continue to report good success with 533 animals tagged, compared to 373 last year.

The hunter report cards summary for other species, comparing this season with 1977, shows: antelope, 547 and 492; bighorn sheep, 22 and 11; mountain goat, 34 both years, and moose, 43 and 50.

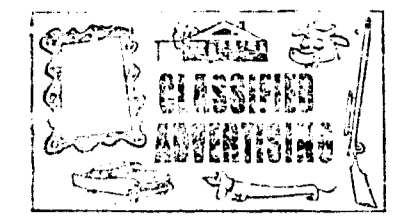

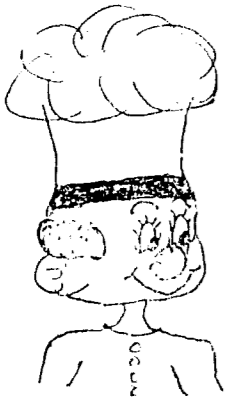
