Dear Editor:

Dear Editor,
This is a report to the people of Idaho about how regulations, calling for the State to pay bank service charges on state accounts for the first time in history have complicated my budgeting process while I am trying to respond to the 1% initiative.

A separate State agency, the Investment Board, last May adopted rules requiring the State Treasurer to pay what I have guessed to be nearly \$220,000 in bank service charges and related costs. According to the law, these charges are to come out of the State Treasurer's office budget.

I contested these rules in court, and also the constitutional authority of the Investment Board to adopt them. This month, however, a district court in Boise said that the rules were valid.

The rules as adopted by the Investment Board provide that any Idaho bank may elect to bill service charges on state accounts. Never before in history has the state been charged such fees. Rather, in the past it was considered a privilege and an economic benefit for a bank to have a state account.

Four big banks have elected to charge service charges under the Investment Board's rules. All the rest of the state's banks have decided not to charge.

It is very difficult to guess exactly how much the state will owe in service charges when they are due to be paid in July of 1980. I put in an estimate of \$200,000 in my 1980 budget request for the service charges themselves, and an additional \$15,930 for salary and \$3370 for personnel benefits for an auditor to audit the charges presented by the banks, as provided by the rules. One bank alone to date has charged over \$20,000 for four months and another over \$17,000.

I have tried to switch as many of the state's operating accounts as possible from the banks which are charging to non-charging banks. However, I have been unable to avoid service charges altogether because the banks are charging for the DOLLAR amount of the state warrants which they haven't yet presented to the State Treasurer for payment.

The result of the bank service charges is an additional \$219,300 in the State Treasurer's budget. My total budget request is thus 68.2% higher than my 1979 appropriation, but with out the service charges the increase would be only 5.9%. I worked really hard to keep this as low as possible to follow the spirit of the 1% initiative.

The bank service charge rules will have to be approved by the Legislature, which could throw them out. I hope the Legislature takes a close look at the wisdom of paying out such large amounts in bank service charges in a year when the people are calling for a reduction in government spending.

**INFLUENZA INOCULATIONS**

It's that time of year when virus infection, including influenza occurs in various geographic areas with consequences from mild upper respiratory infection to pneumonia or death.

In a span of 10 years (1968 to '78) more than 150,000 excess deaths are estimated to have occurred during epidemics of influenza A in the United States.

Evidence shows that influenza-related deaths are primarily among chronically ill adults and children and old people over 65.

Influenza goes under many names. Hong Kong flu, China strain, Russian strains. Strains of influenza A are found more frequently than influenza B, but influenza B can also cause death.

The Center of Disease Control (CDC) of the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare, in Atlanta, Ga. recommends annual vaccination for all persons at increased risk of adverse consequences from infection of the lower respiratory tract.

This statement appears in the November issue of the Annals of Internal Medicine, the official journal of the American College of Physicians, the national professional association of more than 40,000 specialists in internal medicine and related areas.

Some people suffer adverse reactions to the vaccine. The influenza vaccine of 1978-79 has been associated with few side effects. It consists of inactivated trivalent preparations of three strains expected to be prevalent (A USSR-77 CHINA, A-Texas-77 (H3N2), and B/Hong Kong 173).

There are three types of systemic reactions to influenza vaccines: (1) fever, malaise, myalgia, and other systemic symptoms of toxicity. (2) allergic reactions due to sensitivity to some vaccine component. (3) Guillain-Barre Syndrome (Ascending paralysis.)

According to CDC, there is no evidence to suggest that influenza vaccination of pregnant women poses any special maternal or fetal risk.

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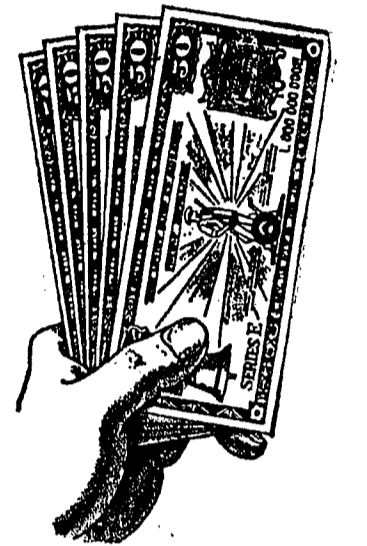
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A CHRISTMAS POEM

Dear Bill:  
Just a line to let you know that the Kendrick people down at Yuma are not froze up yet. How about you up there in the North?  
We see the Parks, Souders, and Parsleys quite a bit—all are well. The cold spell that hit here did not do much damage to anything. It got down to 28 degrees for about 2 hours a night for two nights, but the grapefruit and oranges were on the ripe side, so not much damage. I expect they greatly exaggerated that up there to drive the price up. We buy 50 lbs. of grapefruit for \$1.50 and 60 pounds of oranges for \$3.00, any kind you want. Lettuce is free, brought right to your door by people in the court. Cauliflower is just coming in now. We get all we want for 10c for a big head, although everything else has gone up this last year to match the rest of the country, it is still a bargain to live in the warm, sunny south where the sun shines most all of every day and the temperatures are in the 60s and 70s most all of the time.  
We still miss the home town folks and wish you and them a Merry Christmas and a very Happy New Year.

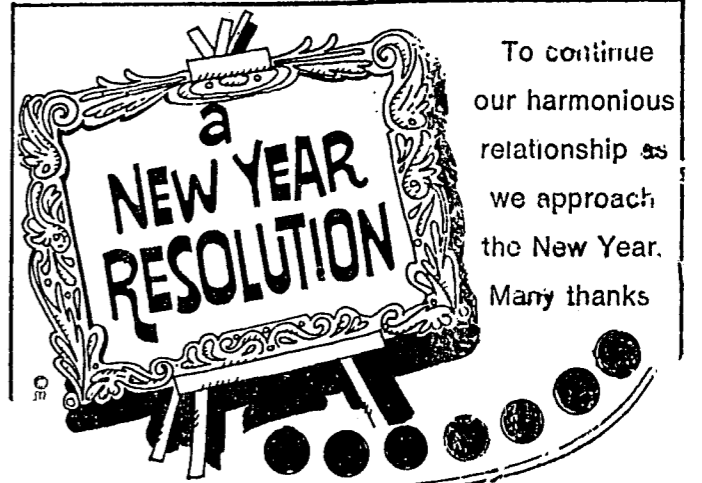
