

FOOD STAMPS

Food stamps will be issued to certified recipients by mail beginning in January. This constitutes a major change from the way recipients have obtained their food stamps in the past, according to Neil Ehresman, food stamp program coordinator for the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare (DHW)

Most persons already getting food stamps will receive their coupons in the mail sometime during the first 10 days of each month, Ehresman

Persons applying for stamps dur-ing January and in following months will receive their stamps by mail about five days after they have been approved, Ehresman added.

Previously, program participants obtained the coupons at outlets throughout the state Ehresman said. Many of these outlets will remain open to enable households with little or no income to get their stamps

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

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
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

State Highway Dept. Offer

Winter Driving Information
The Idaho Division of Highways
District Maintenance Superintendent Leo Hill offers the following winter driving information:

The holiday season brings out many travelers who encounter a variety of driving conditions—and drivers. It's time now to readjust our time schedules and thinking, to adapt to the condition of the roads. If we heed this warning there will be little necessity for the rash of accidents that usually develop with the first cold

To begin with you will not be able to assume that the road will always be recently plowed or sanded every mile of the way when these winter

District Four consists of five counties: NezPerce, Latah, Clearwater, Lewis and Idaho. There is a total of 730 miles of highways that are maintained by the Division of Highways. The Idaho Division of High-ways wishes you to be aware of the procedures that are most generally followed during our winter season operations.

During the winter, travelers may receive a road condition report thru a code-a-phone system. You may dial 746-3005 day or night and re-(Dec. 24) when Rick and Rosetta ceive the road report of District high ways and some State-wide reports. When a storm begins, the snow removal operations start and contin-

ue throughout the storm. Plow trucks usually operate in pairs, one parted at noon for Hayden Lake and plowing the center and one the out-Christmas with Rick's parents and side. The trucks will travel at a speed ranging from 20 miles per hour to 35 miles per hour, depending on the storm visability and snow conditions. Beware of following one of these vehicles too closely, as occasionally the plow will dig into the snow floor on the roadway and come to a sudden stop; or sometimes will veer into on-coming traffic. Therefore, please drive with extreme caution when following a snowplow or approaching an on-coming snowplow. Following too closely may leave you in a fog of flying snow, making it very difficult

> During the plowing of a roadway the surface will become very slick and as snow continues to fall, the traffic packs the snow to the surface, continualy building a snow floor. The snowplows are unable to remove this packed condition until just the right temperature change allows the snow to start thawing. Then the floor will break, causing a slush condition and the plows can then remove the snow.

> There are areas in the District that receive more snowfall,, therefore driving in these areas requires more




