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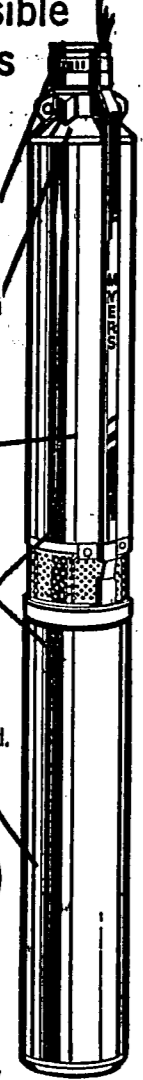

Kendrick Gazette January 2, 1939
 J. B. Helpman, pioneer resident of this section and particularly of Kendrick proper, sent us the following brief history of Kendrick and we believe it will be of interest to both new and old.

"Learning that the N. P. Railway was building a branch from Pullman through Kendrick we came up from Lewiston to look and listen—and stayed. Thus on June 10, 1890, we found the beginnings about as follows:

"A string of shacks on what is now Main Street, but not a single one that could be called by a better name. "Thomas Kirby was operating a drug store in a story and a half building with the post office in the rear of the store.

"M. C. Normoyle was having material hauled for the construction of a hotel, which was located on the southeast corner of the now city park. When completed it was a credit to any small town. Mr. Normoyle proved to be one of the best boosters Kendrick ever had.

"J. P. Vollmer was operating a general store (Mat. Jacobs, manager), just north of where N. E. Ware's barn now stands.

"Wm. Myers was operating a black smith shop this side of the store.

"Cap" Carlton opened up a very small grocery store later. A customer coming for lunch inquired the price of a small can of sardines. "Cap" replied: 10c or 2 for 25c. The customer took 2. "Cap" took the 25c."

Durham and Cauffman (Cauffman, manager) moved from Juliaetta as soon as the Wilcox and Helpman building was completed, opening up a fairly complete general store.

"The Lincoln Bros. (Will & Theo) were the first to enter the hardware line, soon selling out to Messrs R. M. Walter and Robert Sinclair.

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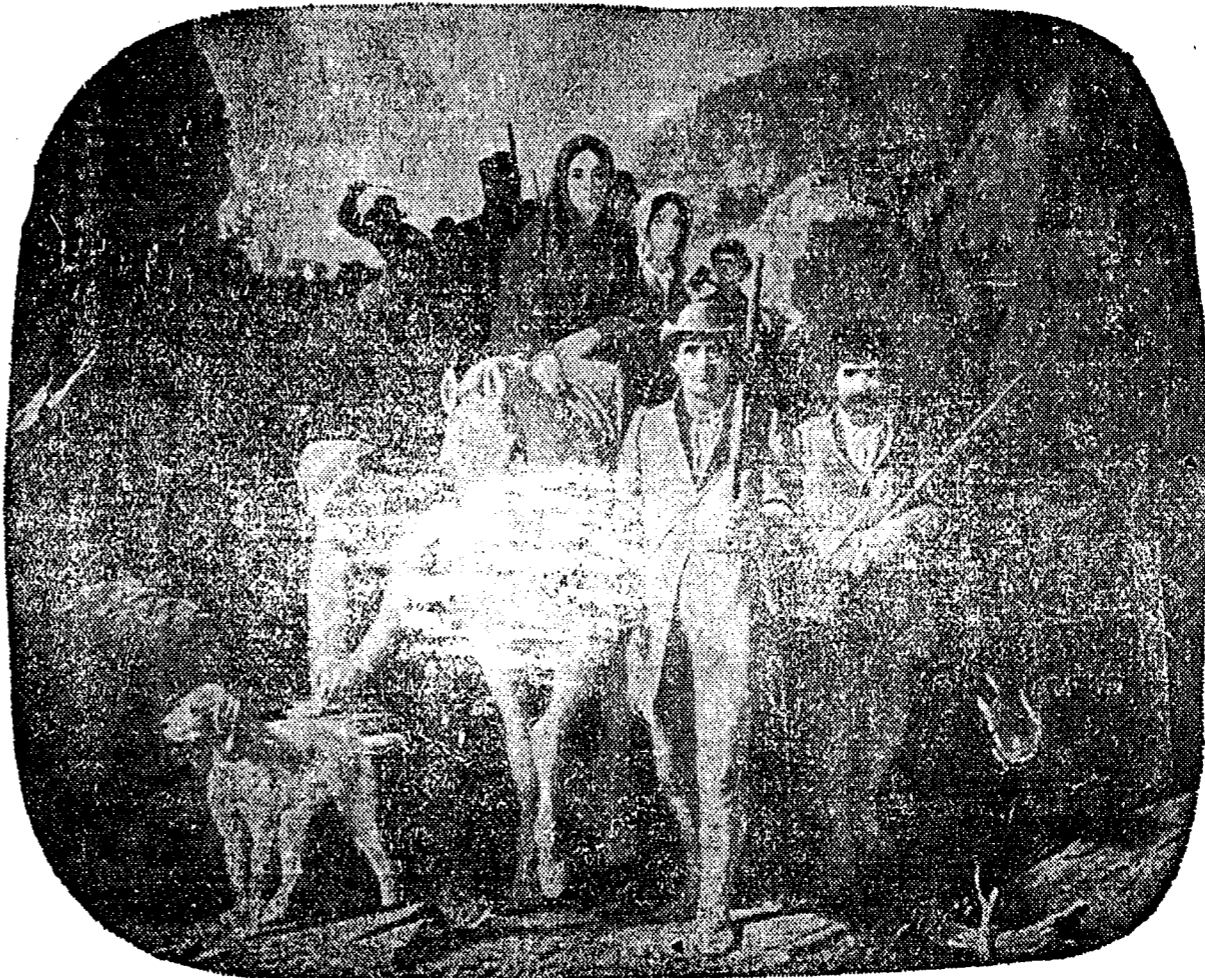

State Highway Dept. Offer Winter Driving Information

The Idaho Division of Highways District Maintenance Superintendent Leo Hill offers the following winter driving information:

The holiday season brings out many travelers who encounter a variety of driving conditions—and drivers. It's time now to readjust our time schedules and thinking, to adapt to the condition of the roads. If we heed this warning there will be little necessity for the rash of accidents that usually develop with the first cold weather.

To begin with you will not be able to assume that the road will always be recently plowed or sanded every mile of the way when these winter storms arrive.

District Four consists of five counties: NezPerce, Latah, Clearwater, Lewis and Idaho. There is a total of 730 miles of highways that are maintained by the Division of High-

ways. The Idaho Division of Highways wishes you to be aware of the procedures that are most generally followed during our winter season operations.

During the winter, travelers may receive a road condition report thru a code-a-phone system. You may dial 746-3005 day or night and receive the road report of District highways and some State-wide reports.

When a storm begins, the snow removal operations start and continue throughout the storm. Plow trucks usually operate in pairs, one plowing the center and one the outside. The trucks will travel at a speed ranging from 20 miles per hour to 35 miles per hour, depending on the storm visibility and snow conditions.

Caution of following one of these vehicles too closely, as occasionally the plow will dig into the snow floor on the roadway and come to a sudden stop, or sometimes will veer into on-coming traffic. Therefore, please drive with extreme caution when following a snowplow or approaching an on-coming snowplow. Following too closely may leave you in a fog of flying snow, making it very difficult to see.

During the plowing of a roadway the surface will become very slick and as snow continues to fall, the traffic packs the snow to the surface, continually building a snow floor. The snowplows are unable to remove this packed condition until just the right temperature change allows the snow to start thawing. Then the floor will break, causing a slush condition and the plows can then remove the snow.

There are areas in the District that receive more snowfall, therefore driving in these areas requires more caution.

U. S. 12 from Lowell to the Montana Line is an extremely hazardous area for snow removal because of the heavy snowfall and avalanche problems.

On U. S. 95, Lewiston Hill, Culdesac Canyon, Lawyers Canyon and White Bird hill receive heavy snow fall, making travel difficult at times. Sanding in these locations is not always done until snowing has stopped, as sand will be plowed off the roadway before it has done much good.

You'll be a safer motorcyclist if you DRIVE DEFENSIVELY! Don't travel too close to parked cars—you can get into trouble fast, when a door opens or car pulls out unexpectedly! This reminder from the Idaho Traffic Safety Commission.

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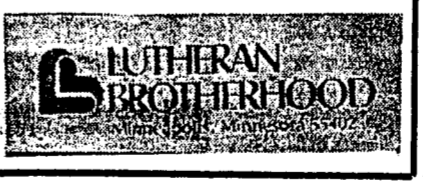
