Drive for New County Library Facilities Begins

A county-wide drive to raise funds for help in construction of a new Moscow-Latah County library has begun under the chairmanship of Gerald Ingle, Bear Ridge farmer and former county commissioner. A fiveperson fund raising committee seeks to gain \$200,000 in areas other than the City of Moscow, as its share of money to match what the City of Moscow has already approved and what the State of Idaho would contribute toward a new headquarters

Twice last year the county voted down a bond revenue proposition that would have matched the funds already available. Now, as an alternative, a county-wide committee seeks to raise the necessary funds through pledges and donations. Unless the \$200,000 is pledged by March 31, all the available matching funds would

Pledge letters will soon be available to all residents outside of Mos-A pledge of \$50.00 will buy cow. one square foot of furnished library based on 1978 average national building costs for libraries. Any amount of pledge is needed. The contributors are tax deductible.

The rural library system in Latah County was created in 1958 and for approximately 10 years was housed in a downstairs room at the court-house. In the 60's the rural library and Moscow City Library were consolidated and the rural library took up headquarters in the old Moscow Carnegie Library with the city facilities, facilites built for a population of 3,000 people in 1906. The city library was already outmoded when the consolidation took effect and following consolidation the situation became desperate. This is the rea-
