OUTBREAK OF RUBELLA REPORTED IN LEWISTON HS

An outbreak of rubella has been reported in Lewiston High School and young adult women in that area. Because of the proximity to our area, we are concerned about the potential for an outbreak here.

Rubella is also called German measles or 3-day measles. It is a common disease of children and may also affect adults. If a pregnant woman gets rubella, there is a good chance that she may have a miscarriage or that the child will be born crippled, blind, or with other defects. Usually rubella is very mild and causes a slight fever, rash, and swelling of glands in the neck. The sickness lasts about 3 days. Sometimes, especially in adult women, there may be swelling and aching of the joints for a week or two.

Rubella is easily confused with other mild infections and rashes. Because of this, it can be diagnosed only by a blood test. Please contact your physician or health department if you suspect that you or your child may have rubella.

Immunization against rubella is available, and should be given when a child is 15 months old. Your private physician has the vaccine, or it may be obtained, without cost, from the Health Department during regular immunization clinics. These clinics are held on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of each month from 1:30 to 4:30 p. m. No appointment is necessary. The next scheduled clinic is February 21 in Room 206 of the Latah County Courthouse.

HUNTER REPORT CARDS SHOW DEER, ELK HARVEST INCREASES

Hunter report cards returned to the Department of Fish and Game show an increase in the harvest of deer and elk during the 1978 seasons, compared to the previous year. The deer harvest was up approximately 9 percent and about 15 percent more elk were taken, but the summary showed, too, that more hunters were in the field.

Rate of hunter success will be estimated later this year when the department's wildlife bureau compiles the results of its annual questionnaire and telephone surveys.

The report cards also indicate the ratio of bucks to does in the deer harvest and bulls to cows for elk.

Buck-doe ratio, at 71 percent, was slightly below the bureau's management objective of 75 percent, but the bull-cow ratio was on target at 80 percent.

Bear hunters reported that they took 697 animals, compared to 523 a year earlier. Harvest of other species last year and in 1977 shows: antelope, 680 and 623; bighorn sheep, 37 and 25; mountain goat, 62 and 74 and moose, 70 and 72.

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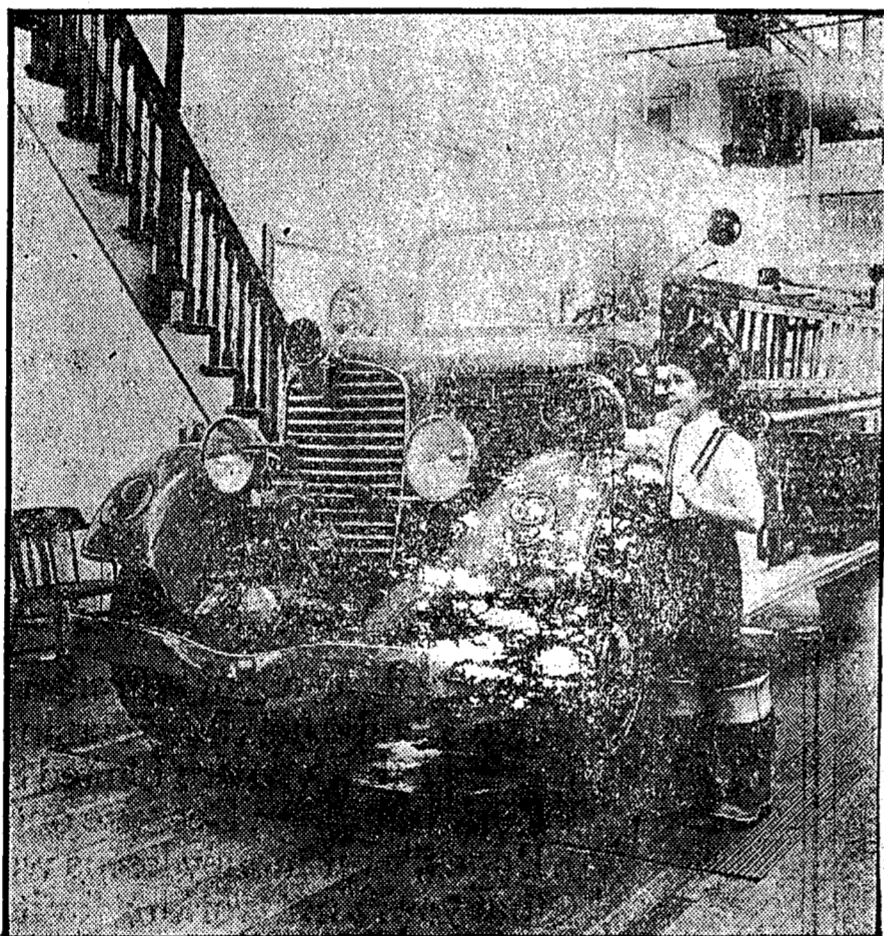
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Old Number 9.

First you'd hear the siren piercing through the trees. Then Old Number 9 would heave into sight, wallowing down the street and galumphing toward her destination like a dinosaur with flat feet.

She wasn't your sleek, classic beauty, but the Chief and his boys kept her shined up and as spiffy as possible for an aging lady who had put out a lot of fires in her time.

I loved that fire engine. And my grandfather knew it. When he gave me my first Savings Bond, he smiled and said, "Save enough of these, boy, and someday you can buy your own fire engine."

I couldn't get enough of Old Number 9. Even her siren had a special wail that gave me goose bumps. Kind of lonely and yet reassuring at the same time. Sometimes they'd park her out in front of the station, and I'd walk slowly all around her. She'd sit there, all alone, resplendent in her red coat, her chrome fixtures

gleaming and winking at me in the sun.

The Federal Insurance Administrator gives notice of the proposed determinations of base (100-year) flood elevations for the City of Genesee, Idaho, in accordance with section 110 of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (Pub. L. 93-234), 87 Stat. 980, which added section 1363 to the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (Title XIII of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 (Pub. L. 90-448), 42 U. S. C. 4001-4128, and 24 CFR 1917.4 (a).

These elevations, together with the flood plain management measures required by Section 1910.3 of the program regulations, are the minimum that are required. These proposed elevations will also be used to calculate the appropriate flood insurance premium rates for new buildings and their contents and for the second layer of insurance on existing buildings and their contents.

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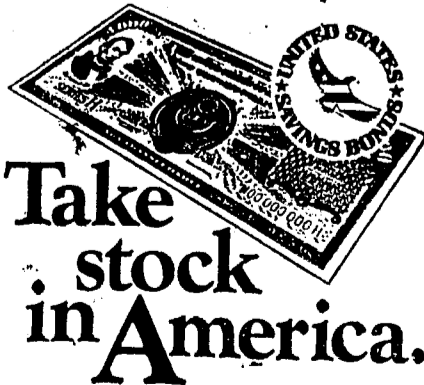

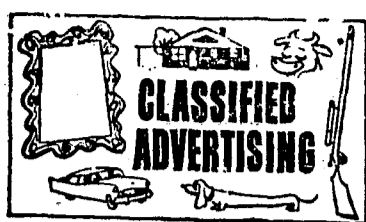
