Robert F. Erickson, 76, Passed March 7

Robert F. Erickson of Lewiston, the retired owner of a motel and trailer park at Ritzville, Wash., died Wednesday, March 7 at 3:41 a. m. at St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston of heart failure.

Erickson, 76, had a heart attack Jan. 25 at Yuma, Arizona, where he and his wife were living for the winter. He was flown home by air ambulance Saturday.



He was born in Varmland, Sweden, August 11, 1902, to Oscar and Matilda Erickson and came to the U. S. in 1905. He was a naturalized United States citizen.

Since 1972, he and his wife had lived at 4521 Hatwa Road. From 1951 until 1972, he owned and managed a motel and trailer park at Ritzville. Previously, he worked at Adams Auto Sales of Lewiston, which is now Hoff Ford.

He was a member of the United Methodist Church of Ritzville, the Kendrick Campers Club and the Kendrick Grange.

He married Alvira C. Fleshman, a Leland area native, July 15, 1937, at Lewiston. She survives him.

Other survivors are four sons, Bruce of Wenmo, Ore., Terry of Temecula, Calif., David of Gardnerville, Nev., and Dale of Lewiston; two daughters, Diana Hansen of Bakersville, Calif., and Vicki Wiese of Corona, Calif.; two sisters, Alice Niemi and Irene Erickson, both of Brookston, Minn., and six grandchildren.

The funeral was held Saturday, March 10, at Mt. View Funeral Home in Lewiston with Rev. Donald Nother officiating.

Following the reading of a letter from the traveling Bradens, the Grange broke into spontaneous applause to express appreciation for the highly informative and entertaining account of Howard and Mary's adventures in the South Pacific and New Zealand.

Pollatch Ridge Considers Possible Fire District

Despite some last minute expressions of uncertainty about the wisdom establishing a tax-supported rural fire protection district on Pollatch Ridge, a group of interested property owners last Thursday evening agreed to let the matter be decided at the polls in May.

Reporting for the four man committee that has been pursuing the matter over the last several weeks, Ted Meyer brought the group up to date in developments, including the fact that at 1:30 p. m. on March 28 the Nez Perce County Commissioners will conduct a public hearing on the call for an election.

Some forty property owners in the area had signed the petition calling for the election. The committee cited this fact as evidence that area farmers and other residents mean business.

Speaking in opposition to forming such a district at this time was Werner Brammer, who stressed that while he was not opposed to the group's seeking to provide fire protection, he was opposed to the possibility of a successful election's "breaking the 1% limit." Brammer fears that such actions on the part of voters in Idaho will help defeat efforts in the legislature to provide for an optional tax, which in his view would keep the lid on the 1% limitation on the property tax. A successful election here would, it appears, prove politically embarrassing to Brammer in his efforts statewide to promote the optional tax.

As an alternative, Brammer urged the group to consider the selling of "policies" to those interested in having fire protection, the rate to be based on the assessed value of each owner's property. Taking such an approach, he argued, would win local farmers headlines statewide and would provide those who didn't want the service the right to say no, a privilege not provided in a tax-supported district. Such subscription methods of providing protection had been discussed at two earlier meetings of property owners, however, and were turned down both times in favor of the tax approach.

Spurred on by Brammer's "food for thought," some of those present proposed canvassing households on Pollatch Ridge as to whether they would favor a subscription approach to funding fire protection as opposed to the taxing district approach.

Opponents to their proposal argued that it's a little late to go this route now and urged that voters be allowed to express their views on the original question at the polls in May. The proposal was subsequently dropped.

Left unanswered was the question of how the \$200 expense of bringing the issue to the voters was to be paid for. In the interest of saving time (and convinced of supporters' enthusiasm for forming a district), Ted Meyer had already given Nez Perce County officials his personal check in that amount. It was pointed out that if each of the signers of the petition were to contribute \$5.00, the matter could be resolved. No final decision was made in this regard, however.

Finally, it was also pointed out that even though a majority of voters might vote in favor of the formation of a fire district, it would take a 2/3 majority vote to empower the district to levy any taxes. Should the issue pass by only a simple majority, it would leave Brammer satisfied but also leave the newly formed district biding its time fiscally until the legislature acts on an optional tax or some other alternative to the 1% limit on property taxes.

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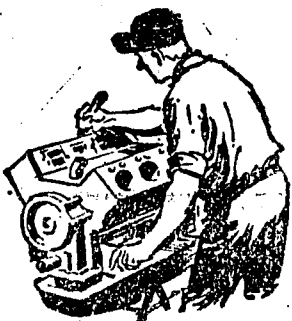

3 Genesee men attend 3-day Executive Institute Seminar

Spokane, Wa.—Feb. 7, 1979—Robert Borgen, director; Gordon Iverson, director, Moscow and Jerry Johnson, director, Genesee Union Warehouse Company, Genesee, Idaho, attended a 3-day Executive Institute Seminar for cooperative leaders in Spokane, January 30 through February 1. Conference sessions were held at the Ridpath Hotel.

The major purposes of this Institute were to:

- Stress ways and means for cooperatives to more profitably serve their farmer-members.
- Examine the rapidly changing business environment in which today's agricultural cooperatives must operate.

Howard Bradens Write From New Zealand

Dear Bill and friends:

Hope this finds you all in good health. We are making our way up the east coast of the South Island of New Zealand and tonight we are camped at the Elms Motor Camp, rated three stars by the N. Z. Automobile Association.

Four stars is the top rating but some areas are blessed only with three star or two star motor camps. We have learned to believe these camp ratings of the Auto Assoc. as being accurate.

On Wednesday, the 27th, we completed the Milford Track, a group back-pack tour from (fresh water) Lake to Anau up over the Southern Alps and down to Milford Sound on the west coast. It was 33 miles of truly spectacular mountains, rivers, valleys, lakes, and weather effects.

After an arduous eleven-mile second day, we stayed one full day at Qumtun Huts and journeyed on side trips, one of them to three-tiered Sutherland Falls, 1900 feet of water fall culminating into a huge spray at the base and rainbow some 300 feet wide. Breathtaking.

We saw quite a few brown trout in the Arthur River, some of them 5 and 6 lbs. Only one fellow in our 37 member group brought his fly-rod. But no luck.

The Milford Track area is not known for its hospitable weather, as some 300 inches of rain falls each year. As luck would have it, our group had five gorgeous days with a few morning fogs, but no rain.

We were the 63rd group to walk the Milford Track but you would never know it—the track was free of litter, cigarette butts, etc.—that must say something for the people who like this country.

The highways are almost litter-free, as are the cities. We have had our trip altered a little by the start of gas rationing this weekend. Service stations cut off all gasoline sales at 12:00 noon today, Saturday, and will not resume again until Monday morning at 8:00 a. m.

Gasoline here is 31.6c per litre which is \$1.49 for U. S. gallon. Our rented "Van" (small motor home) gets, at best, 14.8 miles per U. S. gallon. Ouch!

Tomorrow we will travel to Pictou where on Monday will cross Cook Strait to Wellington, North Island by ferry at least we hope. The ferry crewmen have been on strike, off—so no crewmen, no ferry for our motor home.

Gas rationing—ferry strike—cost of milk has just doubled, what next?

STATEWIDE RUBELLA EPIDEMIC

Boise—Idaho health officials said today that statewide rubella epidemic poses a potential danger to unborn babies and advised expectant mothers who are uncertain whether they are immune to the disease to consult their family physician.

Eight cases of rubella have been confirmed in Idaho and large numbers of suspected cases are under investigation, Dr. John Mather, state epidemiologist, said at a Boise news conference.

Rubella, also called German measles on the face and neck and lasts from serious when contracted by women in the early stages of pregnancy, he said, adding that the disease can cause birth defects.

Dr. Mather said the Lewiston area appears to be the hardest hit by the epidemic, but confirmed or suspected cases are being reported over most of the state. The majority of cases have occurred in teenage and young adult age groups.

"It is not practical to attempt to contain the epidemic through immunizations because it is too widespread," Dr. Mather said. "Our primary concern is the prevention of congenital rubella syndrome in babies who will be born later this year."

Dr. Mather said Idaho's 7 district health departments have asked local school officials to alert pregnant employees and students of the rubella epidemic and the need to know whether they are immune to the disease.

"The probability of susceptible school employees and students becoming infected during a school rubella outbreak is very high," he said. Idaho physicians have been alerted of the epidemic.

The usual symptoms of rubella are a slight fever, a rash that appears on the face and neck and lasts from one to three days and swollen glands in the back of the neck. Some young adults also have temporary pain and stiffness in the joints.

"Persons with incubating rubella are infectious for about one week before and at least four days after onset of the rash," Dr. Mather said. "In addition, there are cases with a typical symptoms or with no symptoms, particularly in young children, who are also contagious."

Pregnant women who are not immune should avoid contact with children and adults with a rash illness. Expectant mothers should consult their physician if they are exposed or develop a rash illness which could possibly be rubella.

A state law requiring women to be tested for immunity to rubella before receiving a marriage license went into effect last July. Up to 13 percent of women obtaining the premarital certificates are not immune to rubella.

Guess we in the U. S. don't have all the world's troubles after all. Mary and I wish you all the best. We have had a really good trip. We should be in the U. S. again March 15 or so.

FIRST SECURITY BANK LETTER

Building permit construction activity in Idaho continued a downward plunge in January, said James Hoogland, Jr. and Stan Merrill, managers quoting from the January Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A. Edited by Dr. Kelly Matthews, vice president and economist for First Security Corporation, the report will be distributed this week.

According to the publication, the number of building permits was down 50.1% from last January. During the month, the total value of authorized building permits in 54 major Idaho locations totaled \$13,839,344 as compared with \$27,708,284 during the same month last year. In addition to the 10% usury law on mortgage loans, adverse weather conditions in many parts of the state further slowed activity in the construction industry.

Residential and non-residential construction suffered severe cutbacks. New nonresidential construction valued at \$2,310,163 was down 72.8%, while new residential construction totaled \$7,462,970, a decrease of 52.9% compared with last year's figures. Of the total residential permits issued in January, 59% were obtained in Boise City and Ada County Unincorporated.


The report noted a significant increase in alteration and repair permits. The permits, totaling \$4,066,211 were up 21%.


