Kendrick FFA Scores High at Moscow



On Saturday, March 17, the Kendrick FFA chapter traveled to Moscow to compete in the poultry judging and parliamentary procedure contests and was outstanding. The poultry contest began at 9:00 a. m. and the Kendrick participants were very successful. They were scored on their ability to judge laying hens, broiler breeders and ready-to-cook broilers.

They also had a closs on internal egg qualities and another on which they were scored. After the scores were tabulated, Pat May took eighth overall and Mike Courtright placed 5th overall. Other team members who were close behind were Brian VonBargen. The Kendrick team placed 2nd in the district and took home a banner.

At 1:30 Saturday afternoon 10 teams from the North Idaho district began the parliamentary procedure contest. For each team there are 3 main parts of the contest on which they are scored. The first and most important is how well the team can handle business efficiently with the use of parliamentary law. The second part scored on deals with the chairman's ability to handle the business brought up by the floor members.

Pea & Lentils Growers Seek New Building Funds

After several years of discussion, the Washington Dry Pea and Lentil Commission, the Idaho Pea and Lentil Commission, the Pacific Northwest Pea Growers and Dealers Association, and the USA Dry Pea and Lentil Council have voted to combine their professional activities under one roof in the interest of improved efficiency and economy.

By avoiding duplication in personnel, advertising, travel, mailing, etc., their budgets can be extended into other areas of research programs, domestic and foreign utilization, and to develop new products and markets.

The Washington Association of Dry Pea and Lentil Producers, the Idaho Association of Pea and Lentil Producers, and the Pacific Northwest Pea Growers and Dealers Association have committed themselves to provide the necessary facilities while still maintaining the Stateline concept of being on the state line. The property has been purchased across the road from the present site for \$15,000.

To meet the present and future needs, a block building 32 x 50' with a full daylight basement has been designed. The top floor will have offices, reception, and work area with a small meeting room. The basement will contain storage area and a large conference room, suitable for larger meetings.

The estimated cost, or lowest bid is \$99,000. Presently there is \$35,000 in donations and commitments to the three Associations for an average of \$85.00 per donation.

Every person and business who gives a donation will have their name permanently and prominently displayed in the building display room. The commissioners are asking every person or business who has an interest, directly or indirectly, in the future of the pea and lentil industry to make a donation to the Pea & Lentil Building Fund.

—Thoroughly familiarize the sitter with the address of your residence in the event he or she must refer to it quickly during an emergency.

—Lock all doors (including garage doors) and secure all windows and screens.

—Advise the sitter not to open the door when talking to strangers. If they have any doubt concerning a stranger's identity, they should call you.

—Instruct the sitter to answer the phone "hello" and not "Jones residence" and never to let a caller know that the person answering the phone is a babysitter. A sitter could also be advised to tell callers that you cannot come to the phone at the moment and to ask if there is a message.

In addition to these crime resistance suggestions, it is also a good idea to furnish the sitter with emergency telephone numbers, including those of the police, the fire department, your hospital and your doctor. In addition, sitters might be prohibited from having friends or dates visit them at your home without

your prior approval. A night out without the children is always more enjoyable when a few precautions such as these are exercised.

Editor: March 20, 1979

I would like to comment on creating a fire district on Pollatch Ridge. I am not opposed to a fire district if it is based on selling policies. I am opposed to putting the tax on the property.

Let us look at what happens if it is voted on the property tax. First, it allows all non-property owners to vote the tax on property owners.

In this fire district area there seems to be many renters who want to vote the tax on their landlords. Also—there are almost as many landlords living outside of the district as there are voters in the district—yet they are not allowed to vote. The tax will be on the land but they receive only one-third of the crop.

Why should the renters have a right to vote when their landlords cannot?

Are these people who are pushing the fire district really concerned about fair play for all their fellowmen? If so, why don't you give each person the right to decide if they want to buy a policy?

As I said before if we go the policy way—we do not need to form a district—we can sell policies to those who want them—with this money we can set up and see what kind of service we can provide—we can set up a corporation for \$10.00 so we can provide insurance for those who need it.

I am willing to buy a policy and try it—even if my neighbor doesn't

buy a policy—and if he has a fire I am all for helping him—is there any among us who doesn't want to help his neighbor?

As was stated in the Gazette that a simple majority vote would create a fire district—but it would take two-thirds majority to levy taxes.

Let me say this, don't get hoodwinked into this district as we did into the recreation district. It is so important to wait and see what the legislature will do with a bill lowering from two-thirds to simple majority to levy taxes for override levies and special assessments.

This would include fire districts, recreation districts and others. These taxes would be above the 1 percent limit. There are other things we don't know as yet—what will our land be valued at? Will budgets continue to be frozen as they are now? The farmers should be the first to find other ways to pay for things besides the property tax—other taxing units might follow the lead.

Farmers better take a good look at what is happening at the legislature—we do not know as yet how these things could affect our property taxes. We are not giving away any of our options—we can still form a district in a year or two.

I do not feel that 40 signatures on a petition is a true representation of all the people that will be affected. I do not have time to contact all of you—so please send me a post card or a letter and tell me if you want—No District — By Policy — or On Property— (one of the three), send to Werner Brammer, Kendrick, Id. I want to hear from all of you and especially from those landlords living outside of the district who will not be allowed to vote.

By sending me your name and address I can represent you at the public hearing at 1:30, March 28, at Lewiston. When you send me your names be sure to include man and wife and all those over 18 years of age living in the district.

What I am asking for is that people have a right to make their individual choice to join and not have it forced on them.

This is what I call democracy. Werner Brammer
