Ralph Stout, Genesee Pilot, Escapes **Serious Injury**

Ralph Stout, a 22-year-old Genesee pilot, was taken out of the intensive unit of Lewiston's St. Joseph's Hospital Wednesday where he had his airplane Tuesday morning. Ralph, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Stout, Genesee, is a pilot for Super Kat, Inc., at Lewiston, an aerial agricultural service. He was applying the insecticide Parathion to a pea field farmed by his uncle Claude Stout in Whitman County about four miles southwest of Uniontown when the accident occurred.

According to reports, at about 8
a. m. Tuesday morning, Ralph was flying a Grumman Ag Cat cropduster airplane low over the pea field when the plane hit a downdraft, struck the ground and flipped over on its top. Although Ralph, as soon as he realized he was going to crash had tripped the load release, the remaining chemical in the tank commaining chemical in the tank completely drenched him.

He freed himself from his restraints after the plane had hit the ground, kicked out a window, and walked farm home. At the farm the authortitles were notified and Ralph then K-J Jr. Miss Title washed the chemical from his body. He was taken to St. Joseph's Hospiarea nearly all her life, died Tues tal by ambulance where examination day July 3, at the Lewiston Nursing revealed some severe bruises three revealed some severe bruises, three injured vertebrae (none crushed), and some dental damage.

He was placed in the intensive care unit because the doctors were co-chairmen of the event. unsure of the damage the chemical might have on him, but the danger of this apparently had passed by Wednesday afternoon, although Ralph was understandably sore and shaken yet.

Alternative Energy Workshop Planned

A non-mathematical approach to alternative energy sources will be offered participants in a University of Idaho Alternative Energy Workshop

Jim Cassetto, assistant professor of industrial education and workshop director, said the program will cover solar energy, wind power; small scale water power generation, including low and high head hydro generation; stcam; nuclear energy and the use

"It wil show people how to build their own systems—kind of a nuts-and-bolts approach," Cassetto said. "People are finally getting concern-

ed about energy and they want to learn about some of the alternatives. "They (alternatives) aren't curealls. Some people think that putting a solar energy collector on their roof will solve all of their energy prob-

This is the third in an annual series of alternative energy workshops. The two previous programs concentrated mainly on solar energy. "We have had students ranging from utility company employees to people with no experience," Cassetto said. "They all seemed to like the programs."

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
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Old Number 9.

If you've had to wait in long lines to refuel your car or if you've been unable to get any gasoline at all, you may have considered storing an extra supply in the trunk of your car or in your home. Don't.

"Having a reserve supply in your trunk, especially on summer travels such as during holiday weekends, may seem like the way to make the best of the situation, but it could be a convenience you could live without," states Tom Karsky, University of Idaho extension safety specialist. Really, there is no safe way to store gasoline in your car or house." * There's no differnce between carry-

Planning ahead—filling up as soon as your tank is half full instead of waiting until it's nearly empty, and traveling during daylight hours along main routes — will help you avoid needing extra fuel.

Eliminating unnecessary travel will help conserve gasoline for everyone, Karsky noted.

"Storing gasoline in your home or apartment also is a very dangerous practice," he pointed out, "Already, there have been several news reports of gasoline explosions and fires that took lives and destroyed property." If you must store gasoline (to fuel

power lawn mowers, for instance)

Karsky advised keeping it only in approved safety cans which have flame arresters and pressure-release valing sticks of dynamite and a can of ves. Store it in a well-ventilated area away from your living quarters. Never keep gasoline in glass or unapproved plastic containers. Keep it

locked up and out of the reach of Do not siphon gasoline by mouth, few drops, if they get in your lungs,
