## Emma Kluss Spills, Thorncreek Native, Passes July 3

Emma Kluss Spills, a Thorncreek native and a resident of the Genesee area nearly all her life, died Tuesday July 3, at the Lewiston Nursing home in Lewiston.

Mrs. Spills was an avid gardener and farmer and prior to moving to the nursing home in January of 1978, had made her home with her son Harold Kluss Northwest of Genesee.

She was born November 24, 1892 in the Thorncreek area, the daughter of Hubert and Clara Manderfeld and attended rural schools and later Genesee high school. She was a member of the Altar Society of St. Marys Catholic school and the Catholic Daughters of America.

On March 13, 1913, she was married to Rudolph and they farmed at the home place until his death in October of 1945. She married George Spills at Colton, Washington on November 17, 1951 and they farmed in the Uniontown-Colton area until Spills died in April of 1955. She later returned to Genesee where she made her home with Harold.

She is survived by two sons, Harold Kluss of Genesee and Ralph Kluss of Lewiston; a brother, Irvin Manderfeld of Genesee, and five grandchildren.

A resary will be held for Mrs. Spills Thursday at 7:30 p. m. at 7:30 p. m. at St. Mary's Catholic church. A Mass of Resurrection will be said Friday at 10 a. m. by Father Roger S. La Chance and interment will be at St. Mary's Cemetery.

## Workshop on Gifted Children July 13-14

Idaho's gifted/talented children will be the subject of a workshop to be held July 13-14, sponsored by the Department of Special Education of the University of Idaho. The workshop will run 9-3 p. m. Friday, and 9 a. m.-12 and 1-5 Saturday.

Topics will include current legislation, funding and educational resources; family and community resources and needs; and problem-solving techniques which will be used to identify major concerns and to generate ideas for planning.

The workshop begins a year-long project which will focus on creating a support system and communications network for persons working on behalf of gifted/talented children in North Idaho. It will concentrate on training adults who are most significant in the lives of gifted children and putting those people in touch with each other.

In addition to the workshop, interested persons may register this fall for university credit in a Special Education Directed Studies program that will deal with the basics in educating gifted children. A text by Martha C. Burroughs of Lewiston, entitled "Restrained on Excellence: Our Waste of Gifted Children," will be used, and individual projects will be chosen by participants to be carried out in their home communities.

Preliminary work on the project involved the UI Special Education faculty and graduate students and members of the Moscow branch of the American Association of University Students.

The project funding is from a grant by the Higher Education Act of 1965, Title IA, Community Service and Continuing Education, and administered by the Idaho Post-secondary Education Commission.

## Ralph Stout, Genesee Pilot, Escapes Serious Injury

Ralph Stout, a 22-year-old Genesee pilot, was taken out of the intensive unit of Lewiston's St. Joseph's Hospital Wednesday where he had been placed following the crash of his airplane Tuesday morning. Ralph, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Stout, Genesee, is a pilot for Super Kat, Inc., at Lewiston, an aerial agricultural service. He was applying the insecticide Parathion to a pea field farmed by his uncle Claude Stout in Whitman County about four miles southwest of Untown when the accident occurred.

According to reports, at about 8 a. m. Tuesday morning, Ralph was flying a Grumman Ag Cat cropduster airplane low over the pea field when the plane hit a downdraft, struck the ground and flipped over on its top. Although Ralph, as soon as he realized he was going to crash had tripped the load release, the remaining chemical in the tank completely drenched him.

He freed himself from his restraints after the plane had hit the ground, kicked out a window, and walked almost a mile and half to Claude's farm home. At the farm the authorities were notified and Ralph then washed the chemical from his body. He was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital by ambulance where examination revealed some severe bruises, three injured vertebrae (none crushed), and some dental damage.

He was placed in the intensive care unit because the doctors were unsure of the damage the chemical might have on him, but the danger of this apparently had passed by Wednesday afternoon, although Ralph was understandably sore and shaken yet.

Volleyball is played in the parking lot of the church every Wednesday evening at 7 p. m. Everyone is welcome to join in the fun.

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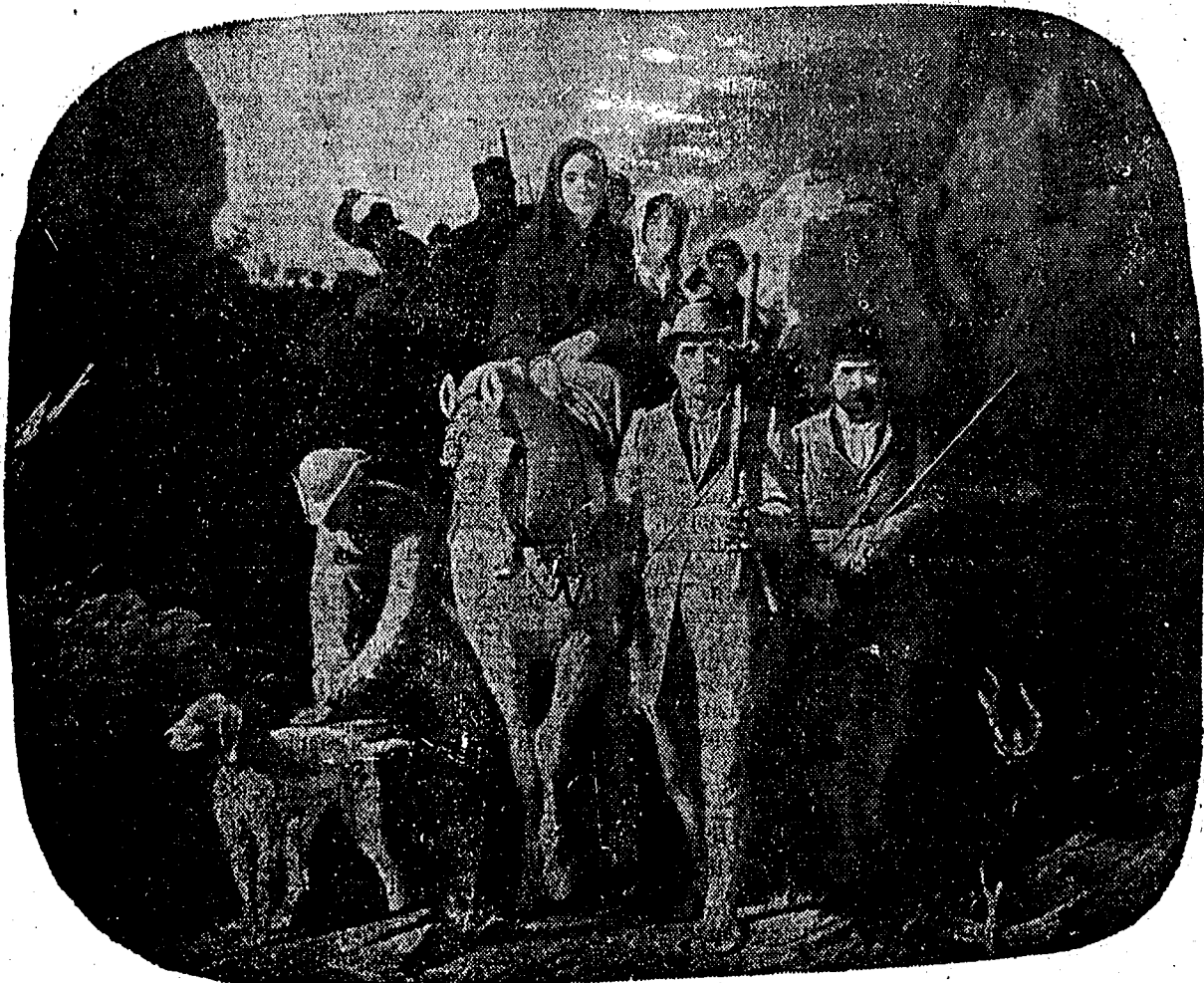

The years roll by but if one can make it, the old friends can peel off the change in glasses, hair-does, postures and locomotion to find each other. Those who come seldom but from far away get the best kick out of it. The graduating classes reveal much; ladies who are slow of step, the next who get around just fine but also have lost many members. Then there are those who still look great but have wives and hus-

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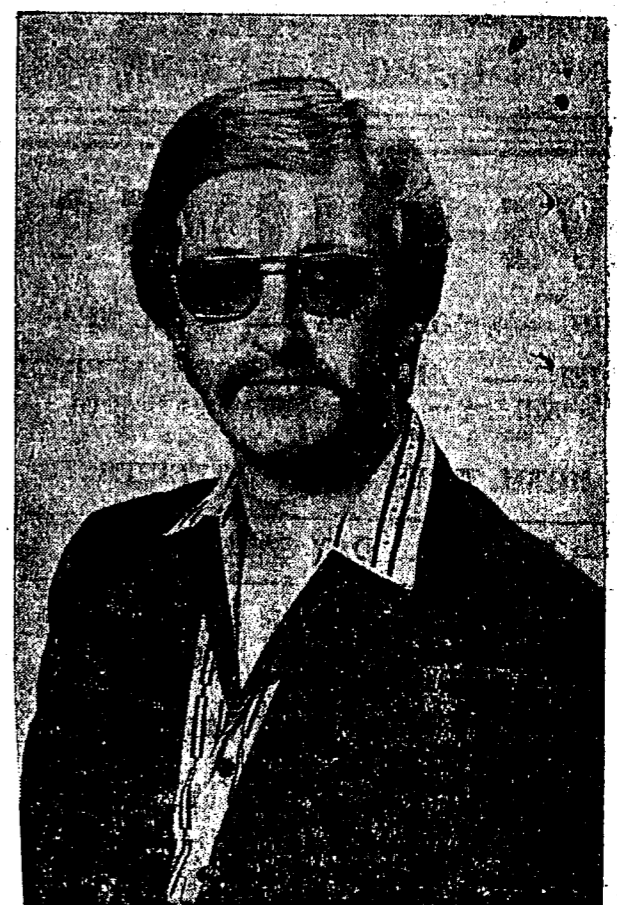

## Avoid Gasoline Hazards, UI Safety Expert Says

If you've had to wait in long lines to refuel your car or if you've been unable to get any gasoline at all, you may have considered storing an extra supply in the trunk of your car or in your home. Don't.

"Having a reserve supply in your trunk, especially on summer travels such as during holiday weekends, may seem like the way to make the best of the situation, but it could be a convenience you could live without," states Tom Karsky, University of Idaho extension safety specialist. "Really, there is no safe way to store gasoline in your car or house."

"There's no difference between carrying sticks of dynamite and a can of gasoline in your trunk, he observed. "If you're hit from the rear, there can be a fatal explosion. You'd be just as dead either way!"

Gasoline is extremely dangerous because its explosive vapors are heavier than air and can flow invisibly along the ground. Any ignition source, such as matches, pilot lights, cigarettes, stoves, heaters or electrical equipment, can set the vapors afire, even from a considerable distance.

Planning ahead—filling up as soon as your tank is half full instead of waiting until it's nearly empty, and traveling during daylight hours along main routes — will help you avoid needing extra fuel.

Eliminating unnecessary travel will help conserve gasoline for everyone, Karsky noted.

"Storing gasoline in your home or apartment also is a very dangerous practice," he pointed out. "Already, there have been several news reports of gasoline explosions and fires that took lives and destroyed property."

If you must store gasoline (to fuel power lawn mowers, for instance), Karsky advised keeping it only in approved safety cans which have flame arresters and pressure-release valves. Store it in a well-ventilated area away from your living quarters.

Never keep gasoline in glass or unapproved plastic containers. Keep it locked up and out of the reach of children.

Do not siphon gasoline by mouth, the UI specialist stressed. Even a few drops, if they get in your lungs, can kill you.

"If you swallow gasoline accidentally, do not induce vomiting," Karsky said. "Call a physician immediately."

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
