#### Chinese Negototiating For Wheat, Barley Purchase

Boise, Idaho—Grain buyers from the Republic of China (Taiwan) were in Boise on Friday, July 6, to negotitiate the purchase of an estimated 166,000 metric tons of wheat and barley grown by farmers in Idaho and other Western region states.

State and Chamber of Commerce officials are scheduled to host the trade team which is headed by the Honorable K. K. Shao, Director of the Board, of International Trade, Ministry of Economic Affairs, Republic of China. Contract signings at the State Office Building will be witnessed by U. S. Senator Frank Church and Idaho Lieutenant Governor Phil Batt. nor Phil Batt.

Idaho Wheat Commission Admin-istrator Richard Rush says that this latest grain purchase follows the Republic of China's recent agreement in Boise last November to purchase 110,000 metric tons of wheat and Barley grown, in this region. "Figures from our Western Wheat er for us."

Associates marketing organization show U. S. wheat sales alone to Tai-wan reached a record 900,500 for the crop year that ended May 31." Rush added, "U. S. wheat sales to Taiwan have been averaging close to 90% of the market in recent years, but last year we provided 100% of their wheat purchases.






