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Chinese Negotiating For Wheat, Barley Purchase

Boise, Idaho—Grain buyers from the Republic of China (Taiwan) were in Boise on Friday, July 6, to negotiate the purchase of an estimated 166,000 metric tons of wheat and barley grown by farmers in Idaho and other Western region states.

State and Chamber of Commerce officials are scheduled to host the trade team which is headed by the Honorable K. H. Shao, Director of the Board of International Trade, Ministry of Economic Affairs, Republic of China. Contract signings at the State Office Building will be witnessed by U. S. Senator Frank Church and Idaho Lieutenant Governor Phil Batt.

Idaho Wheat Commission Administrator Richard Rush says that this latest grain purchase follows the Republic of China's recent agreement in Boise last November to purchase 110,000 metric tons of wheat and barley grown in this region.

Associates marketing organization show U. S. wheat sales alone to Taiwan reached a record 900,500 for the crop year that ended May 31. Rush added, "U. S. wheat sales to Taiwan have been averaging close to 90% of the market in recent years, but last year we provided 100% of their wheat purchases."

Rush adds that despite continued pressure from competitors in the world market, the U. S. expects to continue to be the major supplier of wheat to Taiwan.

The Trade Mission will meet at 10:00 a. m. in the State Office bldg. to open bids from grain suppliers for 114,000 metric tons of wheat and estimated 52,000 metric tons of barley.

"Our foreign markets for wheat and other agriculture commodities are critical to our economic balance," Rush said, "and the Republic of China (Taiwan) has been and continues to be a very important cash customer for us."

Family Relationships Workshop Set

Moscow—Students in a University of Idaho summer workshop will examine four major types of family interaction and take a look at some different family forms.

Advanced family relationships will be taught by Dr. Gladys Phelan, director of the UI School of Home Economics beginning Monday, July 9, and running through Friday, July 20. Dr. Phelan said the course text will be her new book "Family Relationships," a series of readings drawn from original research, reviews of research, theoretical papers and clinical observations.

"It was prepared because of needs found while teaching classes in family relationships," Phelan said, and "to deal with the variety of family relationships in modern society."

One major topic covered in the book is sibling relationships, "an area seldom examined in literature. Yet, human development and family interaction rely heavily on this area," she said. The text is available through the UI bookstore.

Dr. Sharon Araj, who has experience in education and in family relationship work, will give guest lecture on violence in the family as part of the class.

Students will discuss such family forms as one-parent families, voluntarily childless couples, dual career families and stepfamilies as well as taking a look at extended family relationships.

Dr. Phelan said the workshop is aimed at home economists, social workers, clergy, psychologists, public school teachers and others working in areas of family concerns, as well as interested individuals. Her book offers a broad historical perspective, Dr. Phelan said, and the class will expand upon each of the material included in the book. Students may earn two credits at either the undergraduates or graduate level.

Standard summer session registration fees will apply. The workshop will be during the morning hours daily at the Home Economics Building.


