Lillie Mae Hermann, Genesee Native, Passes Suddenly

Lillie Mae Hermann, a native and lifelong resident of the Genesee area and president of the recently formed Idaho Women for Agriculture, passed away Thursday, July 12 at her home of an apparent heart attack. She was 49.

Mrs. Hermann was active in a wide variety of organizations, including the Lewiston League of Women Voters, a governor's advisory panel on rural affairs and formerly the Nez Perce County Planning and Zoning Commission. Idaho Women for Agriculture was formed last year and she was elected the group's first president.

Lillie Mae was born to Clarence and Ruby Aherin on December 7th, 1929. She attended Genesee schools and graduated from high school in 1947. She worked the following year in California and on June 9th, 1948, she married J. P. Hermann at San Francisco.

They returned to Genesee and lived on a farm southeast of town, just across the county line in NezPerce County.

Lillie Mae was seeking a degree in rural sociology at the University of Idaho at the time of her death. She also helped organize the Rural Women's History Project undertaken several years ago by the UI Women's Center.

She was a member of the Genesee Community Church.

She is survived by her husband at the family home; her parents of Eugene, Oregon; two daughters, Christine Craft of Albany, Oregon, and Peggy Hermann of San Jose, Calif.; two sons, John of Genesee and Curtis of Cedar Falls, Iowa; and seven sisters, Alice Mitchell of Olympia, Wa.; Margaret Fickle of Yakima, Wa.; Rae Nell of Roseburg, Ore.; Patty Kries of Kamiah; Vera Baumgartner of Seattle, Leitha Miller of Boise and Sharon May of North Adams, Mass.

Also one grandchild. Graveside services were held Sunday at 7:00 p. m. at the Genesee City Cemetery with the Revs. Don Hammond, Melford Knight and George Mitchell officiating.

The family suggests memorials may be made to the Genesee Ambulance Fund or to a Lillie A. Hermann Memorial Fund for mature women of rural background who have a special interest in majoring in the agricultural sciences. Contributions to the latter fund may be sent in care of the UI Foundation, Moscow.

INTERIOR RELEASES ENVIRONMENTAL STATEMENT ON BIRDS OF PREY NATIONAL CONSERVATION AREA IN IDA.

Secretary of the Interior Cecil D. Andrus today announced issuance of a draft environmental statement covering the proposed Birds of Prey National Conservation Area in Idaho.

The \$15,000 acres of federal land which will make up the proposed Conservation Area will assure the birds have an adequate kitchen and pantry for their protection just as we now protect their bedroom in the canyon," Secretary Andrus said.

"I want to stress," Andrus said, "that the proposed expansion of the Birds of Prey Conservation Area will not adversely impact private or state holdings. All present uses will continue. This means the stockmen will be able to continue to graze their cattle and sheep and the Idaho National Guard can continue to use the area for training exercises. This also means all recreational uses will continue."

The environmental study is based on a proposal to have Congress set aside public land along the Snake River Canyon in Idaho's Ada, Elmore, Canyon and Owyhee counties as a national sanctuary for eagles, hawks and other birds of prey. In 1971, the Department designated some 30,000 acres within the Snake River Canyon for the protection of the birds. The present proposal would enlarge the area boundaries to include hunting grounds used by the birds as they forage for food.

The enlarged area would include habitat of the Townsend ground squirrel, a key item in the diet of raptors. Andrus said that intensive research into the feeding habits and hunting range of the birds has documented the need for the larger area.

"Both the draft environmental impact statement and the proposed legislation will be subject to extensive public participation including public hearings," Secretary Andrus emphasized. Public hearings on the environmental statement will be held in Boise, Idaho and Washington, D. C. The Boise hearing will be held August 2 at 7:30 p. m. in the Rodeway Inn, the Washington hearing August 9 at 2:00 p. m. in the Interior Department Auditorium.

If the proposed plan of action is adopted, raptors and their habitat would be protected and managed along an 81-mile stretch of the Snake River in southwest Idaho.

This area provides nesting sites for the largest concentration of birds of prey in the world. Species using the area include the prairie falcon, the peregrine falcon, the Golden Eagle, the red-tailed hawk, the kestrel, the ferruginous hawk, the great horned owl, the barn owl, and many others. Bald Eagles use the area during the winter months.

"The designation would not prevent grazing, mining, and other traditional uses of the area," Andrus again emphasized.

The environmental statement deals with the impact on the human environment that can be expected if the area is enlarged as well as impacts from alternatives. Alternatives considered are: No action, maintaining the status quo; modification of the proposed boundaries; and with drawal of the proposed area under section

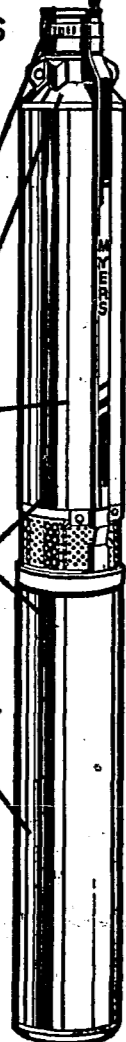

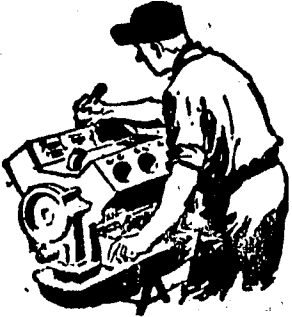

To The Editor:

Grace Wicks' recent letter to the editor congratulating the people of Genesee on the success of their Community Day celebration was, as usual, well thought out and sincere. The Latah County Historical Society would also like to congratulate the residents of the community on their continued interest in local history and community affairs. However, Mrs. Wicks' letter contained one error which we would like to clear up. The Vollmer Building, as well as the Genesee Exchange Bank, are already on the National Register of Historic Places.

The National Register is the nation's official list of districts, sites, and buildings which have been deemed to have important historical, architectural, cultural or archeological significance. In order to be placed on the Register a site must possess state, local or national significance. There are about 200 such sites in Idaho, thirteen of which are in Latah County. In addition to the Genesee buildings, the following Moscow structures are on the National Register: McConnell Mansion; Old Post Office; Mason Cornwell House; McConnell-Maguire (Thatuna) Building, Skattaboe (General Telephone) Bldg.; Almon Asbury Lieuallen Home; First Methodist Church; Hotel Moscow; Ridenbough Hall, U. of I.; Memorial Gymnasium, U. of I.; Administration Building, U. of I.

Genesee's Vollmer Building is a

remnant of the town's boom days when Genesee was an important rail terminus. It was erected by J. P. Vollmer and has one of the most elaborate fronts in all of Idaho. Vollmer maintained one of his many Idaho retail stores in the main floor of the building, while the second floor was originally a dance hall.

The Genesee Exchange Bank building originally, in addition to the bank, contained a store and two offices. The building is an excellent example of classical revivalist architecture and was constructed in 1904. The residents of Latah County have much local heritage to be proud of. The Latah County Historical Society is at the present time applying for a grant which will enable us to hire a researcher to survey, record and photograph the many fine historic sites in the county. If the grant is received such an inventory will be of great assistance to planners, researchers and all those interested in local history.
