Harvest Off to Slow Start; Weather Hot

The first of the 1979 small grain and pea crop harvesting began last week in the Kendrick and Genesee areas under a blistering heat wave that pushed the mercury up to 104 degrees in the valley and near 100 in the higher elevations. Thursday and Friday of last week saw the most severe heat yet encountered this year with highs of 103 and 104, respectively on those two days in Kendrick.

While the people sweated in the heat the grain was rushed in its ripening process. In the case of peas and lentils, too fast, as warehouses reported a decline in quality and quantity because of the weather.

"Off to a sputtering start," was the way Genesee Union assistant manager Mike Martinez reported Tuesday afternoon. Peas, mostly small sieve Alaska, and winter barley have been delivered. Martinez estimated that possibly 25 percent of the small sieve Alaskas have been cut, but that only less than 10 percent of the regular Alaskas have come in.

Genesee Union is expecting that the recent heat wave will cut the anticipated harvest by 15 to 20 percent, although Martinez said that the quality of the crops taken in so far looks pretty good.

No wheat has yet come into Genesee Union, but deliveries were expected by the end of the week.

The first lot of barley came into Lewiston Grain Growers Kendrick Branch July 18, reported manager Howard Hoffman. Harvest is "pretty slow" Hoffman said Tuesday afternoon. While there has not been enough grain in to get an accurate picture of the coming harvest, Hoffman did say that what they had looked at was "better than we expected."

Peas have also been of good quality. The first lot of what has come in from Cameron and it, too, looks good. Howard also predicted that the pace of the harvest would pick up by this weekend.

Bob Watts, manager of Kendrick Rochdale echoed the "slow start" reported by the other warehouses. Some barley and peas have come in and the fall barley didn't look too bad with the yields pretty good.

Only George Brocke, Jr., of Brocke and Sons, in Kendrick, reported his crews were busy with receiving peas, lentils, rape seed and even some Austrian Peas. The first lentils of the year came in Tuesday, George said. The quality of the small sieve Alaska peas taken in at Brocke and Sons was of good quality, but the yields have been bad to fair. Brocke expected the small sieve Alaska peas cutting to peak this weekend.

Federal Grant of \$10,000 Used to Help Purchase New Fire Dept. Ambulance for K-J

The capabilities of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Ambulance Department were greatly enhanced this week with the arrival of a \$10,000 federal grant which was applied to the purchase of a new modular ambulance and the certification of seventeen members of the community as Emergency Medical Technicians.

The federal grant of \$10,000 has been used to order a 1979 Classic II ambulance from the Modular Ambulance Corporation of Grand Prairie, Texas. The unit is built on a Ford F350 Chassis and will have a capacity of four, plus driver and attendants.

The present ambulance has added space, the new unit has a built in oxygen supply, suction units, plus other life support equipment. The ambulance will also now be able to carry extrication equipment and additional lighting for use at accident scenes.

The total cost of the new ambulance will be roughly \$22,000 and will take from 60 to 90 days to arrive from the factory in Texas. There will be other costs also, such as insurance, winter tires and equipment. With the remaining \$12,000-plus cost facing the Ambulance Dept. now

seems a good time to remind residents of the area that donations, memorials and contributions to the Fire Department of Kendrick and Juliaetta are still gratefully accepted. The past generosity of the community has made it possible for Kendrick and Juliaetta to have one of the best equipped and trained emergency units in the state.

Present plans are to sell the present ambulance and use the funds from that to help pay for the new unit. The present ambulance is a 1974 Chevrolet unit.

New E. M. T.'s

Seventeen members of the Juliaetta-Kendrick area recently completed their training as Emergency Medical Technicians. This brings to 32, the number of qualified E. M. T.'s in the two communities. The persons who have completed training attended classes in Lewiston two nights a week, three hours each night, for a three-month period and then had an additional 10 hours of hospital time at St. Joseph's Hospital.

Fire Restrictions Effective July 25

Fire restrictions are going into effect on all National Forest, all state and private forested land in North Idaho Wednesday, July 25 at midnight, the Gazette was informed this week.

Loggers and other forest workers will be placed on Hoot Owl restrictions which means shutting down at 1:00 p. m. each day during the high risk period.

Open fires are prohibited except in designated camp grounds and picnic sites. Smoking is restricted to vehicles, camp grounds and homes.

All firewood permits are temporarily suspended. Firewood cutting on all forest lands is prohibited because of the high fire risks until weather conditions permit.

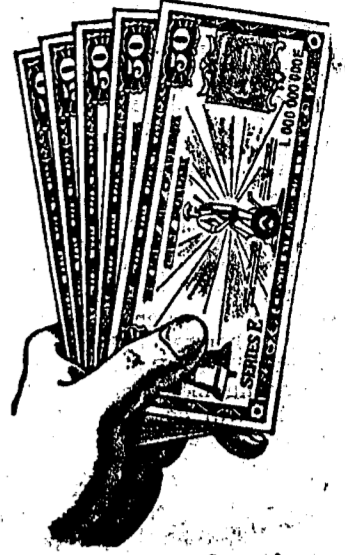

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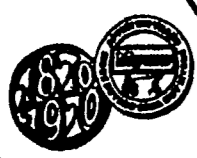

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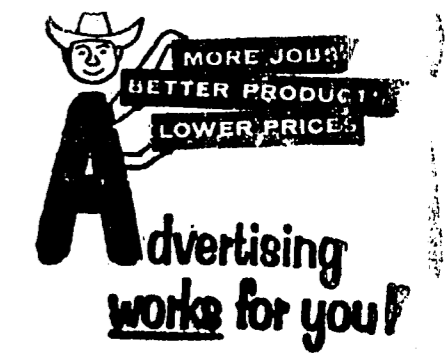
