Harvest Still In Early Stages

Harvest operations in the Kendrick, Genesee area is still in its early stages, but is beginning to pick up speed as the temperatures climbed back up into the middle and high nineties Tuesday afternoon. A small thunder and lightning storm Saturday morning stopped field work for several hours, but the farmers were back in the fields again Saturday afternoon under clear, blue skies.

Bill Wood, manager of Genesee Union Warehouse Co. said the Saturday rain didn't cause much of a delay and harvest was just getting a good start Tuesday afternoon. Wood estimated that about half of the dry peas, both small sieve Alaskas and regular Alaskas were in. He said the quality appeared good but the volume in "just fair." Wheat is just starting to come in now, mostly from the Rimrock area. Wood said maybe 20 or 30,000 pounds had been cut and delivered. What winter barley that has come in has appeared to be pretty good quality, but some of it was "quite weedy," the co-op manager said. The yields are still not average.

Howard Hoffman, manager of the Lewiston Grain Growers, Kendrick and Juliaetta facilities, said he estimated that the barley was just about half done now and dry peas were on the downhill side this week. Some wheat is starting to come in now, Hoffman said, mostly from the lower Potlatch ridge and looks good so far. "There'll be lots coming in next week," he added.

Kendrick Rochdale also reported that the barley and pea crops are getting pretty far along now and that the Kendrick co-op is also starting to get some wheat from the lower Potlatch ridge. Peas and barley were coming in from Texas and Bear Ridge.

Geo. Brocke, Jr. of Brocke and Sons, estimated his firm's small sieve Alaska pea harvest was about two-thirds done with quality looking good, but the yields down. Lentils are less than 10 percent in and it was too early to get an accurate picture on quality and yields. Rape seed is about 75 percent in for Brocke and Sons. Austrian peas were put at 25 percent completed.

Accident Claims Southwick Pioneer C. A. Cuddy

C. A. Cuddy, 88, a pioneer resident of Southwick, was found dead Sunday apparently after a fall from his horse.

Born on the original Cuddy homestead on May 28, 1891 to Hiram and Isabelle Cuddy, he was raised there and attended the Southwick school.

After serving in World War I he moved to Southern Idaho in 1909 where he worked in construction and logging in the McCall-Boise area. While in McCall, he bartered for a brief period. He returned to the original homestead in 1915. He and Christina A. Southwick were married on March 15, 1919 at Orofino. He worked as a logger for Harry Wright in 1923 and for Gus Farrington in the late 1920's and also had a pole camp for A. B. Brown in 1941.

He owned his own blacksmith shop and did blacksmith work and horse-shoeing for area residents.

He served on the Joint School Board No. 283 in the late 40's and early 50's. He was a Clearwater Co. Commissioner from 1950-1968. During that time he was active in starting the Clearwater Valley Hospital and served on the hospital board.

He was a charter member of Dicks Creek Cattlemen's Association and a charter member of the Grain Growers. He was also an honorary member of the Sheriff's Posse in Clearwater County. He was a member of the Kendrick Senior Citizens and a life-long member of the Southwick Community Church.

He loved and worked with horses all his life.

His wife, Christina died on April 21, 1970.

A daughter, Annabelle and two brothers and a foster brother also preceded him in death.

He is survived by three sons, John R., of Grangeville; David of Lewiston, and Charles of Orofino; a daughter, Virginia Cole of Lewiston; a brother, P. C. Cuddy of Kendrick; eight grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2:00 p. m. at the Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston with burial at Normal Hill cemetery.

The family suggests any memorials may be given to the Juliaetta-Kendrick Ambulance Fund or the Clearwater Valley Memorial Hospital Auxiliary.

Idaho Employment Rate Still Holding Good Says Bank Newsletter

Idaho's employment rate held up well in the first half of 1979, said James Hoogland, Jr. and Stan Merrill, managers, quoting from the First Security News Letter. Edited by Dr. Kelly Matthews, vice president and economist for First Security Corporation, the quarterly News Letter will be published this week.

In May, nonagricultural employment totaled 341,000 an increase of 11,900 jobs or 3.4 percent above the previous year. Employment weakness was evident in transportation equipment manufacturing, contract construction and in areas related to the tourist industry. The rate of unemployment in May at 5.3 percent had actually edged downward in the second quarter, but nevertheless was above the 4.7 percent of a year ago, according to the report.

For the third quarter, the rate of unemployment is expected to vary between 5 1/2 and 6 percent. Average wage gains in Idaho were about 7 1/2 percent in the second quarter, but after adjustment for inflation and taxes, real, spendable earnings were 3.7 percent below last year.

Uncertainty, relatives to the cost of unemployment, relatives to the cost with higher mortgage rates and declining real incomes, will continue to depress consumer's ability and desire to purchase new homes.

According to the News Letter, despite the nationwide slowdown in home building and other related recessionary fears, lumber production in Idaho was down only 5 percent, but employment in the lumber industry remained above last year.

Total retail sales slowed significantly in the first half of 1979 and are expected to remain sluggish in the third and fourth quarters, predicted the First Security publication. Retail sales increased 9.3 percent in fiscal 1979 compared with 14.4 percent in fiscal 1978.

Cattle prices eased significantly. The life that is unexamined is not worth living.

in June, with choice fat steer prices dropping up to \$100.00 per head compared with 6 weeks earlier. Feeder steers are currently selling in a range of \$73 per cwt. Increased supplies of pork and chicken, marketing dislocations resulting from the truckers strike, rising grain prices and reduced consumer buying power, contributed to the lower cattle price structure. The News Letter indicated choice steer prices are expected to vary in the mid to lower \$60 in the third quarter with modest firming anticipated by year end.

Based on reports of reduced wheat production in the Soviet Union, U. S. wheat prices rose abruptly in June reaching \$4.50-\$4.75 per bushel. The U. S. winter wheat crop, however, is forecast to be 25 percent above the 1978 crop and in consequence of the favorable domestic report, wheat prices have currently retreated to the \$4.00-\$4.25 per bushel range. In the months ahead, wheat prices are expected to remain firm to 25c higher—a gain of 35 percent above last year.
