## Genesee Council Plans Bond Election For Water System

Minutes of the Genesee City Council meeting for Monday, August 6th.

The pre-budget hearing on expenditure of General Revenue Sharing funds was held at 7:00 p. m. Discussion on spending the estimated allocation of \$11,800 was centered on equipment, improvements to the water and sewer system and purchase of rocks. Hearing adjourned at 7:30 p. m. by Mayor Sorensen and the regular monthly meeting of the council was opened at that time.

The full Council was in attendance as well as Attorney Ray Barker of Moscow and all staff members.

Leon Edwards and son attended and presented a petition signed by thirty-one subscribers of the Genesee T. V. System all of whom stated they were dissatisfied with the cable service. Carl Simons and Willis Moser, directors of the TV System were present and stated the directors have already met and have made tentative arrangements to sell this system to Don Mackin, of Moscow pending a vote of the stockholders who will meet on August 14.

July bills in the amount of \$15,651 were reviewed and approved for payment.

Building permit applications during the past month for B. Tennant to build a room over a carport, T. Dunn to enclose a carport and to R. Matson for roofing of a home, Don Jain to remodel and build an addition to his home have been issued and approved by Del Owens, Building Inspector for the City.

The Council adopted a tentative budget for the Revenue Sharing Funds and also a tentative budget for the Water-Sewer Fund and all General Funds. Hearing date was set for these proposed budgets. Hearing will be held on Monday, Sept. 10th at 7:00 p. m., just prior to the regular September Council meeting.

The Council voted unanimously to authorize the go ahead of arrangements that will enable the City to hold a bond election for the proposed improvements to the water system at the first opportunity. Two informational meetings have been held for the users of water, one in July, the second Aug. 2nd and the majority of water users were in accord that the improvements are needed. In fact, at each meeting just one user, voted against going ahead with the project.

Clerk Mercedes Roach will be out of the office at City Hall on August 9th. A workshop in Moscow for Clerks of District-II is being held that day. In addition, City Hall will be closed next week for the Clerk's vacation.

## Good Weather Hastens Harvest

The 1979 small grain harvest moved into high gear this week as hot, dry weather hastened the ripening of wheat in all areas and allowed farmers to work without interruption. While some farmers may have grumbled about the lack of moisture during the growing season, there could be little complaint about harvest conditions. Temperatures stayed in the high eighties and nineties again for the second week.

Howard Hoffman, manager of Lewiston Grain Growers Kendrick facilities, reported Tuesday afternoon that pea deliveries were mostly in and that wheat was "rolling along." The wheat still looks "real good" in quality, the LGG manager said.

Bob Watts estimated that harvest for Kendrick Rochdale growers was probably half completed by Tuesday. Wheat was looking good, Watts said, and the yields were better than expected.

Deliveries to Brocke and Sons in Kendrick were also slowing down this week. George Brocke, Jr., reported that Green peas were pretty well in, Austrian peas about two-thirds completed, Yellow peas coming in now and lentils just getting a good start.

Except for farmers out on the Rimrock section, Genesee harvesting is not quite as far along. Bill Wood, manager of Genesee Union Warehouse Co., estimated Tuesday that peas were 90 percent completed, wheat 30 percent, and barley 20 percent. Some of the Rim farmers are just about finished up this week and deliveries are starting to come in from all areas around Genesee.

## Creative Writing Contest At Juliaetta Library

The opening of a Creative Writing Contest for children ages 6-12 was announced Monday at the Juliaetta Community Library. The contest will run through August 25, with winners being announced September 4.

The contest is divided into two categories: short story and poetry. Young writers may submit entries in either or both categories.

Entries are limited to one short story of no more than 500 words; and one poem of no more than 24 lines per writer. Stories and poems must be original and written by the entrant. Spelling and punctuation will not be of concern in judging.

A prize of one silver dollar will be offered in each age division (one for 6-year-old, one for 7, etc.) in each of the two categories. A grand prize of five silver dollars will be offered for best story and for best poem submitted. Prizes are being made possible by a library patron's donation.

The funeral was held Saturday at Brower-Wann Chapel with the Rev. Edward Silrum, pastor of Our Savior's Lutheran church officiating. Burial at the Genesee Valley Lutheran Church Cemetery.
