Monday Rains Half Harvest

A moderate rain Monday afternoon and evening, the first in almost forty-five days, brought operations in the area to a halt this week as farmers were in the process of putting finishing touches on this year's harvest. The skies cleared Tuesday and unless more rain falls most predictions were that combines could get back in the fields by Wednesday afternoon.

While there was some talk of last year's disastrously wet harvest period, most farmers were not too worried Monday evening. The weather had been so hot and dry that combining went at near record pace. The rains came Monday after many farmers had finished up cutting and just had a few wet draws and such to complete. Most of the Spring Barley is out and some lentils are still to come in.

Mike Martinez, assistant manager of Genesee Union, said Tuesday afternoon that approximately 95 percent of the peas were in and 80 percent of the wheat was cut when the rain began. Overall, Martinez estimated that the harvest was 75 percent complete. In volume, Genesee Union now estimates that wheat will not quite be as much as was predicted earlier in the season. Peas will be slightly more in total volume. In fact the peas that have been delivered have already exceeded estimates. Genesee Union estimated that 300,000 bushels would be cut this year and already there have been 330,000 bushels delivered. The brighter side of the wheat picture was that the wheat has been testing better than anticipated. Over fifty percent of the wheat is grading No. 1. Some is running No. 2 because of the dry weather.

Spring barley is just getting a good start in Genesee with 69,000 bushels coming in by Monday afternoon—about 20 percent of the anticipated harvest. Only one lot of oats has come in.

Howard Hoffman, manager of Lewiston Grain Growers Kendrick warehouses said he estimated 90 to 95 percent of the anticipated wheat had come in prior to the Monday rain. Spring barley, he said, was just getting started. Peas were all in. The wheat has been testing very good.

Wheat harvest is over for Kendrick Rochdale, as manager Bob Watts reported Tuesday that the co-op's wheat storage facilities were now full. There was still room for Barley to be received.

The rains Monday were welcome indeed for the weary fire crews who have been watching the fire index go higher with each passing day.

The contest is divided into two categories: short story and poetry. Young writers may submit entries in either or both categories.

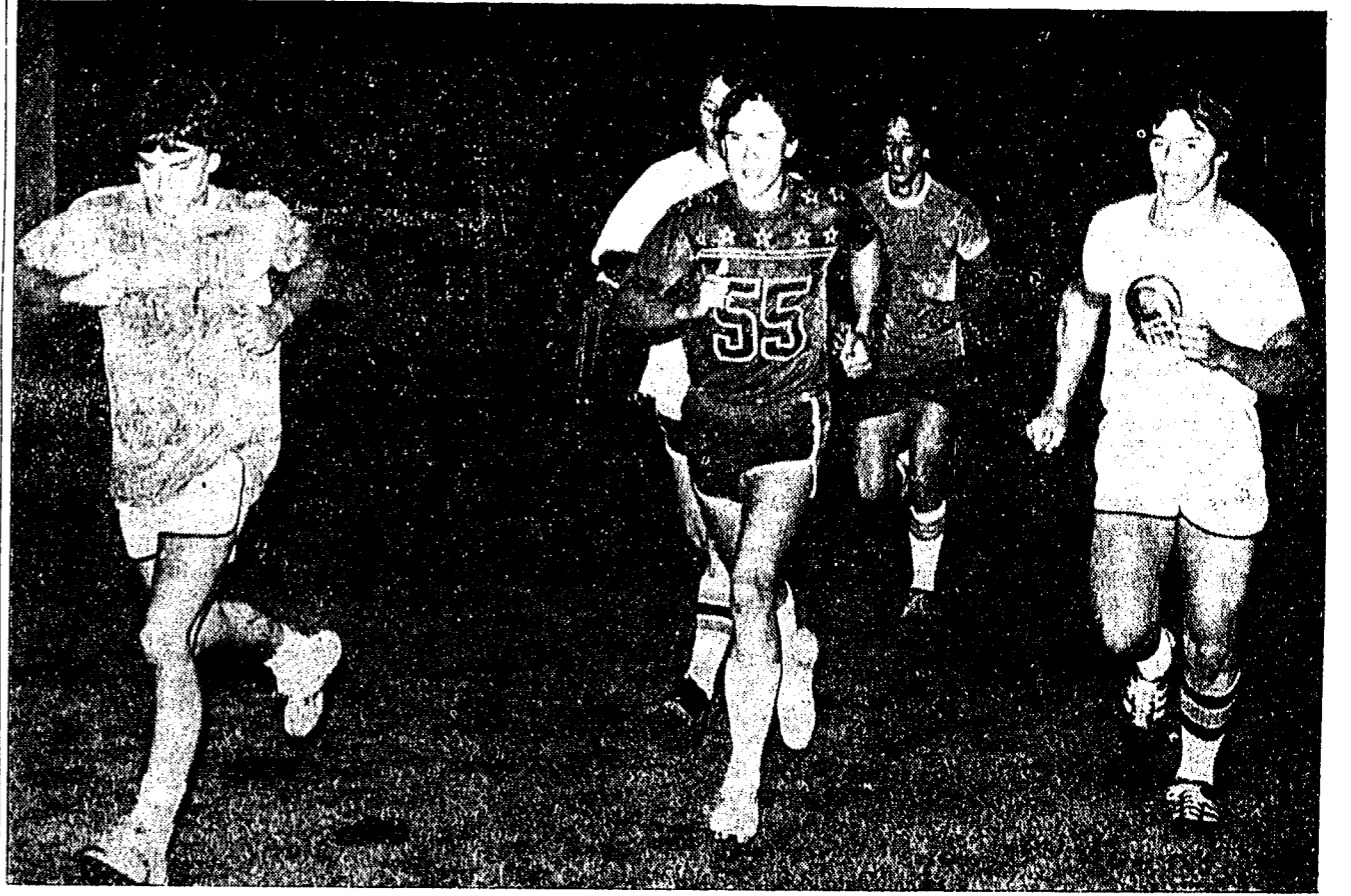

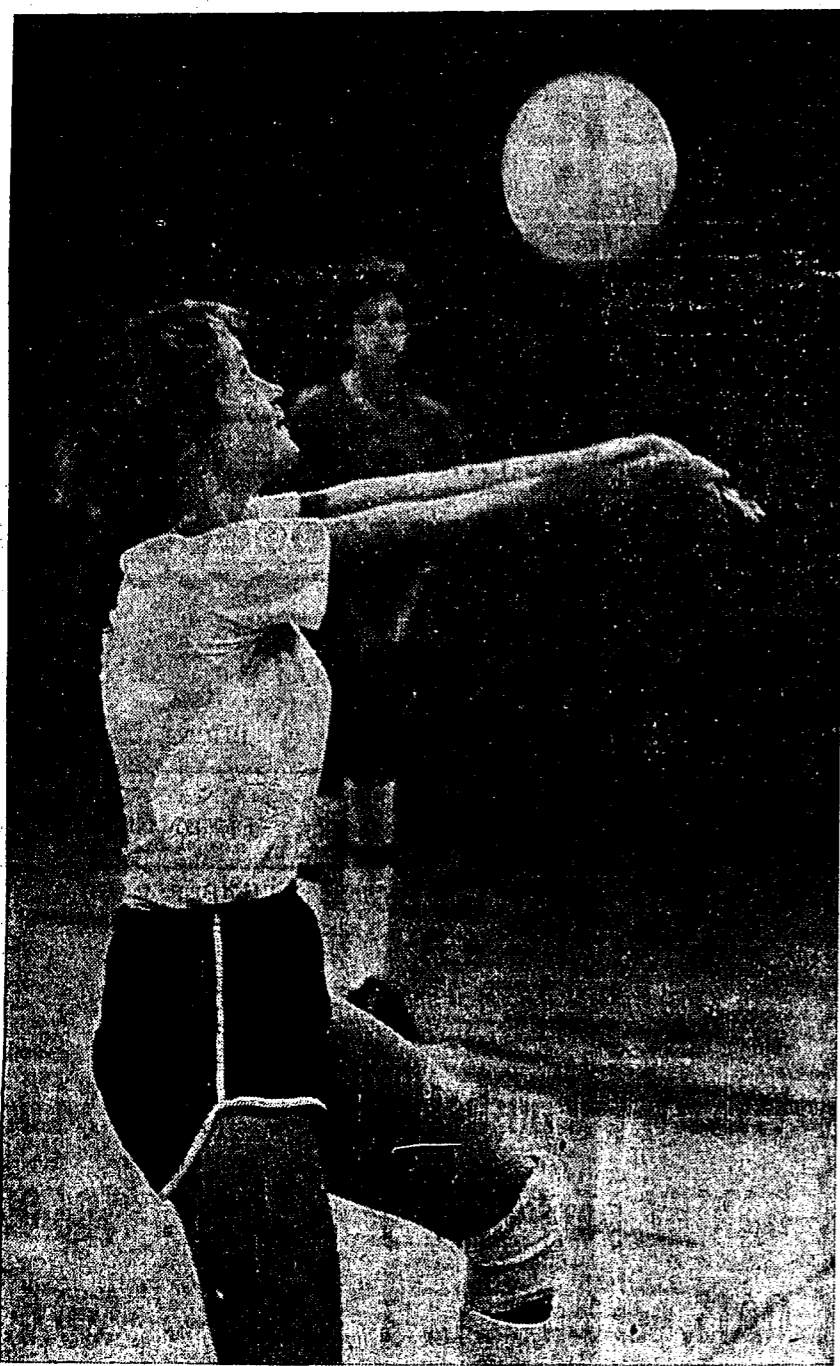

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First Security Corp. Reports Growth

The board of directors of First Security Corporation met in Ogden, Utah July 30 for its regular quarterly meeting and heard a favorable report on six-month operations that includes gains in all major categories.

George S. Eccles, chairman and chief executive officer of the financial services firm which was founded here in 1928 as one of the nation's first multi-bank holding companies, announced record resources of the corporation's banks and subsidiary companies of \$3.3 billion, a 5.9 percent increase over the \$3.1 billion reported on June 30, 1978.

Total deposits of First Security Corporation banks on June 30, 1979 were \$2.4 billion, a 4.8 percent increase over deposits reported on the same date in 1978. Average deposits for the year to date increased \$162.5 million, a 7.4 percent increase.

Mr. Eccles said that June 30, 1979 deposits in the banks included \$733.5 million in demand of checking account type deposits, and \$1.7 billion in time deposits, which showed a seven percent increase over mid-year 1978.

In commenting on time deposits, the bank executive noted that First Security was the first banking organization in its market region to announce interest rate increases for savers which went into effect on July 1, 1979.

These included an increase from 5 to 5 1/2 percent on statement savings accounts, and a new higher rate paid on a new 4-years or more certificate.

As reported earlier this month, First Security Corporation achieved six-month earnings before securities transactions of \$17.8 million or \$1.51 per share, compared with \$14.6 million or \$1.35 per share, an 11.9 percent increase over 1978. Second quarter income was \$9.1 million or 77 cents per share, compared with \$7.0 million or 64 cents per share, an increase of 20.3 percent.

Loan demand in the region served by First Security continued strong during the first six months of the year. Total loans outstanding, including leases, on June 30, 1979, were \$2.2 billion, an increase of 2.4 percent over the corresponding date one year ago.

Real estate loans totaled \$1.05 billion, Mr. Eccles said. "In addition, the banks and our three mortgage companies were servicing real estate loans sold to investors totalling \$1.4 billion. This brings new money into our region to be used for additional mort-

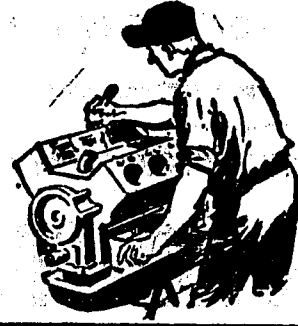

gage loan financing," he said. First Security Banks and subsidiaries made a total of 73,980 loans for \$1.5 billion during the first six months of the year. These included \$799 million in commercial loans, \$452 million in real estate loans and \$285 million in installment loans for consumer purposes.

Mr. Eccles told directors that First Security is continuing to develop and improve its financial services. He noted that the newest service to be introduced is the First Security Banking Card, which works like a credit card, but the funds are deducted from the customer's checking account. He also reported that plans are in process for the introduction this fall of a network of automated teller machines called HandiBanks.

On the economy, Mr. Eccles said that a national recessionary economy plagued with continued high inflation is expected to persist throughout the second half of the year and into 1980. The bank executive noted, however, that the present economic downturn will not be experienced worldwide to the same degree as 1974 and 1975, and while nominal interest rates are high, a credit crunch is not probable.

Interest rates must be kept high because of the volatility of the dollar in the foreign exchange market, brought about by the more than \$60 billion fuel bill with the OPEC countries, and rising interest rates by the other major countries in their efforts to combat inflation. The Federal Reserve Board raised the discount rate to 10 percent, the highest ever.


