Free, Reduced Price Meals, Milk Policy for Kendrick School District

Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 today announced its policy for free and reduced-price meals, and free milk for children served under the National School Lunch, and Special Milk Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for determining eligibility.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals or free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child and disaster or casualty losses are urged to attend.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the main office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. A simple statement of income and family size is required, plus a signed certification by the parent or guardian that the information provided is correct.

To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal Funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable State and Federal criminal statutes.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy, Richard H. Morton, Supt. will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis.

If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Luther Parks, Chairman Kendrick, Id. 289-3607 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, or national origin.

Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

Genesee Installs Street Signs, Assign House No.'s

Ninety years after being incorporated as a city, Genesee has installed signs designating street names. The signs were paid for by the Genesee Civic Association and were placed by the Genesee Chapter of the Future Farmers of America as a public service project to make Genesee a better place to live. As mayor of this city I wish to thank all of the people in the town who make the annual Community Day celebration a success.

The money acquired over the years has been used for the improvements in the city such as lights for the ball park, a tennis court, the picnic shelter and the rest rooms at the three parks together with donations of labor and material from individuals, both inside and outside the city. The school has also been assisted as well as the local Boy Scout organization. These are probably not all of the things accomplished by the Genesee Civic Association as I was absent from the community for a few years.

No Federal or State grants have been used in any of these projects—they have been accomplished by the sole effort of local people helping themselves. In my opinion this is something to be proud of.

Now, to update the city a little more, house numbers are to be added. There is an assigned number for every lot in the city. If one has a house that covers one or more lots, that person may have a choice of one of two numbers to be placed on the front of the house, visible from the street. Apartment houses will be assigned one house number. The apartment may then be numbered according to the owner's wishes.

Trailer courts will also be one number and the various spaces will be numbered designated by the owner. Private homes with apartments in them may use the house number, adding one-half (1/2) to complete the street address.

Numbers may be purchased at the Electric Shop in Genesee. They have a map of the city and can assign a number. You need to know your street and lot number as well as the block number. These can be found on your tax statements. City Hall can also assist residents with assigning numbers.

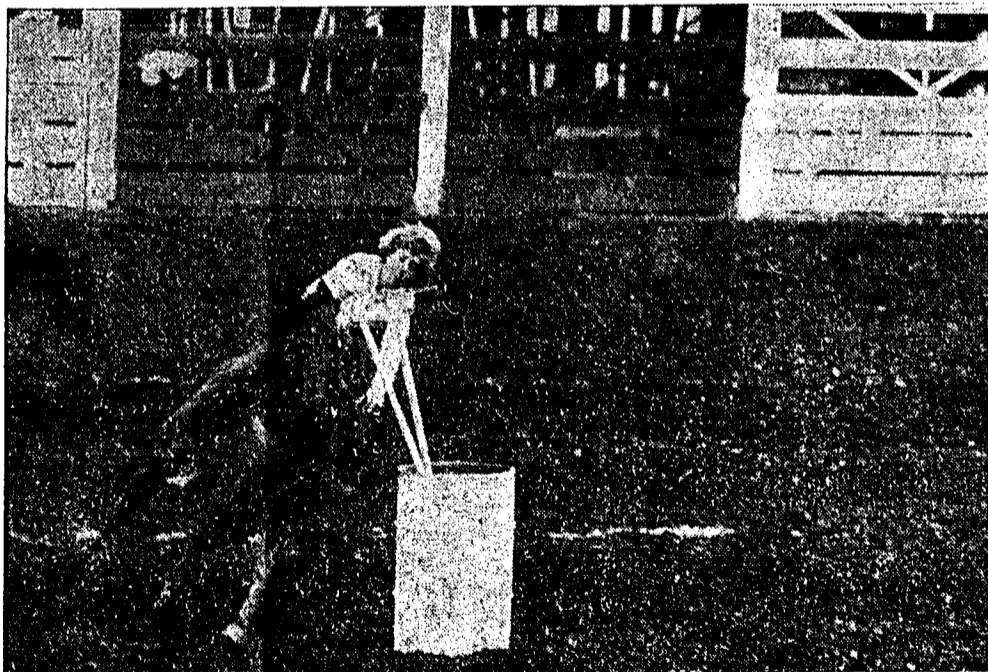
The rain delayed for another period of time the final completion of harvest. Many areas were almost untouched by the storm and some farmers were back combining Tuesday.

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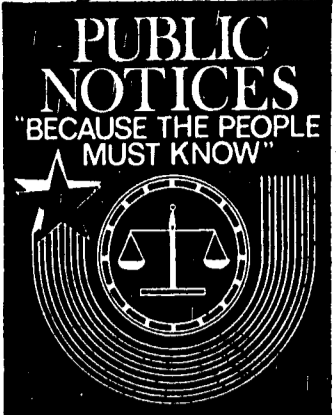

Old Idaho Teaching Certificates Being Sought

Do you have an old teaching certificate or know someone who has one? If so, would you or they be willing to allow it or a copy of it to become part of Idaho's Educational history? Early Idaho Territorial Legislatures enacted legislation requiring local boards of trustees to examine teacher applicants and to issue qualified persons letters of authorization or teaching certificates. Later the Territorial Board of Education, Territorial County Superintendents and boards of trustees of some charter districts were authorized or required to issue certificates. Do you have one of these certificates or know someone who has one? By the time Idaho became a state in 1890 there was a total of 19 counties, and the County Superintendents were authorized to issue teaching certificates of several types. Some certificates were good only in the county in which they were issued while others were valid in any county in the state. These counties, two of whom (Alturas and Logan) no longer exist were—Ada, Bannock, Bear Lake, Bingham, Boise, Cassia, Custer, Elmore, Idaho, Kootenai, Latah, Lemhi, Nez Perce, Oneyda, Owyhee, Shoshone and Washington. Certificates issued by County Superintendents of these territorial counties would be greatly appreciated.

When Idaho became a state in 1890, county superintendents, the State Board of Education and the two Normal Schools as well as certain charter districts were issuing certificates of various kinds. Actually teaching certificates were issued by 46 different county superintendents, since Alturas and Logan counties did not cease to exist until 1895. Since 1890 there have been many changes in certification requirements. With these changes have come changes in the types and numbers of certificates. Vocational Education teaching certificates were issued by the State Board of Vocational Education. Certificates issued by the teacher training institutions were changed and then abolished. The same was true for the county superintendents. The number and kinds issued by the State Board of Education changed constantly. At one time a total of 13 different certificates were being issued. During all of this time no effort was made to preserve copies of the many different certificates.

Over the past three years the State laws and the records of the State Board of Education have been researched in an effort to find out when, where, and what kinds of teaching certificates were issued. Allen Jeffries, in cooperation with the Boise Retired Teachers Association, has been collecting these certificates. Presently there are over 135 certificates in this collection. These certificates plus a history of Teacher Certification in Idaho will be turned over to the Idaho Historical Society for inclusion with Idaho's Educational Historical records.

Bursitis Brings Pain In Joints

Bursitis Brings Pain

Sometimes it's "housemaid's knee." Or "policeman's heel."

By any other name its still bursitis. It is one of mankind's more painful and disabling ailments.

Bursitis, says the AMA means inflammation of a lubricating sac about a joint. The sac, called a bursa, is similar to a collapsed balloon with some fluid inside. It is located at various places in the body where joints or tissues touch and rub. Without cushioning there would be friction.

Bursitis can hit many points in the body, but most often occurs in the shoulder, elbow or knee.

In almost every case bursitis follows unaccustomed strain or overuse of a limb. By taking a little time to warm up to your physical condition and especially by training the muscles that you plan to use in any repetitious motion outside your normal activity

(strengthening your wrist and arm before starting to paint the house, for instance) you can probably keep clear of this common and painful ailment.

If you get bursitis, no one need suggest that you see a doctor. The pain is so acute that you will be the first to seek relief.

There is much your doctor can do to relieve the pain and promote healing. One of the mainstays in treatments is a mild pain killer. Cortisone-type drugs have been used with some success. Heat treatments also have their place in bursitis therapy. In extreme cases, surgery may be required.

The basic treatment is complete rest in bed. Anything that will lessen the chance of the afflicted joint being moved will ease the pain and speed healing.

Like bearings in mechanical things, your bursa stay trouble-free much longer if you warm up slowly and let them get fully lubricated before you race the motor.

Farmers Home Admin. To Guarantee Rural Housing Loans

Moscow Idaho: Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has begun a program through which it will guarantee rural housing loans made by commercial banks, savings and loans associations and other private lenders, Jack Suesz, FmHA County Supervisor for Latah County, announces.

FmHA the rural credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, will guarantee up to 90 percent of the principal and interest of these loans.

Guaranteed housing loans will be available for above moderate income borrowers who cannot get housing mortgage credit without a guarantee. At present, the USDA agency will offer guarantees only under a single family housing loan program. FmHA will continue to make single housing loans with its own funds. It will also continue to make but not guarantee loans for rural rental housing, farm labor housing, housing site development, and other purposes.

Single family housing loans are made in open country, towns with up to 10,000 population, and certain designated towns between 10,000 and 20,000 population. They finance modest but adequate housing and related facilities, Suesz explains.

Loans may be used to buy, build, improve, repair, or rehabilitate houses and related facilities, and to provide adequate water and waste disposal systems. Guaranteed loans will be made only to applicants with above moderate income, defined by FmHA as the adjusted gross income of \$15,600 to \$20,000 per year for residents of Idaho. Low and moderate income applicants may be eligible for rural housing loans made by FmHA.

Most guaranteed loans are limited to 97 percent of the market value of homes and sites for the first 25,000 and 95 percent of the loan in the excess of 25,000. The borrower must have equity from his own resources, in the form of cash or land for the downpayment. The maximum repayment period is 3 years, notes Suesz.

Suesz saw the reports of FmHA regulation provide lenders who obtain guarantees for rural housing loan options for selling, assigning, or selling participations in the guaranteed parts of these loans.

FmHA regulations require that the lender making a guaranteed rural housing loan be a local lender located in or doing business in the area where the house is located.

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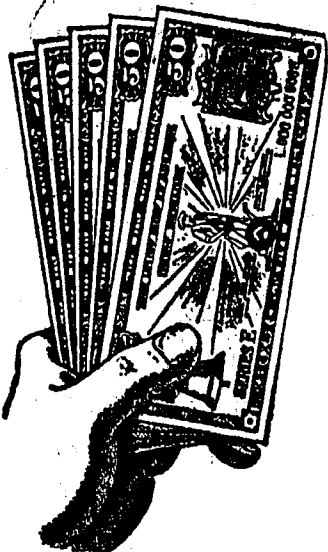

Della Rosenau, 91, Former Genesee Resident, Passes August 14

Della A. Rosenau, 91, a Genesee and Greencreek farm wife who moved to Lewiston 33 years ago, died at 4:00 a. m. August 14 at Tri-State Memorial hospital.

She and her husband, William H. Rosenau, farmed at Genesee for 28 years before they bought a larger farm 20 miles north of Grangeville in 1938.

Eight years later, the Rosenaus rented the farm to their children and moved to Lewiston, where they built a home at 1015 7th Avenue. Rosenau died in 1975.

Mrs. Rosenau was a member of the Trinity Lutheran church, Order of the Eastern Star and Daughters of the

Nile. She enjoyed playing bridge and working in her garden.

She was born May 19, 1888, at Lincoln, Illinois, to Herman and Marie Morscheck. Her family moved to Genesee when she was five because "land was selling cheap." Rosenau recalled in a 1977 Elders column in the Tribune.

Her parents received word from her grandparents that good farm land was going for about \$16 an acre. "They had a bad, wet year and many people lost their crop and had to sell out. Some of that land went for as low as \$10," she remembered.

Della graduated from the 8th grade at the old Ingle school south of Genesee. She met her husband, recently arrived from Minnesota, at a New Year's Eve party at her parents home

in 1908. They married at her parents' farm on July 14, 1910.

Survivors include a son, Willard Kamiah; two daughters, Edna Bailey of Kamiah and Marguerite Berry of Lewiston; a sister, Anna Rosenau of Lewiston; 9 grandchildren and 12 great grandchildren. A daughter, Marie Rosenau, and three brothers preceded her in death.

Funeral services were held Friday at Trinity Lutheran church with the Rev. Wm. Moos, pastor of St. John's Lutheran church of Nez Perce County, atin. Burial at St. John's cemetery in Genesee.

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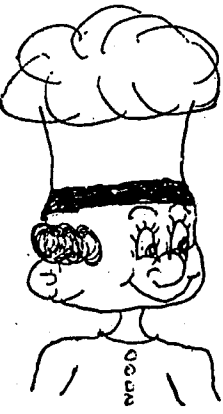
