If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Luther Parks, Chairman Kendrick, Id. 289-3607 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.







When Idaho became a state in 1890. county superintendents, the State Board of Education and the two Normal Schools as well as certain charter districts were issuing certificates of various kinds. Actually teaching certificates were issued by 46 different county superintendents, since Alturas and Logan counties did not cease to exist until 1895.

Since 1890 there have been many changes in certification requirements. With these changes have come changes in the types and numbers of certificates. Vocational Education teaching certificates were issued by the State Board of Vocational Education. Certificates issued by the teacher training institutions were changed and then abolished. The same was true for the county superintendents. The number iod October 1, 1979—September 30, and kinds issued by the State Board of Education changed constantly. At




