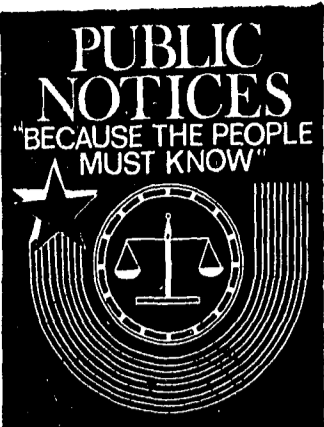

ORDINANCE NO. 249

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, ESTABLISHING THE SALARIES OF ELECTED OFFICIALS, AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF GENESEE, IDAHO:

Section 1, MAYOR AND COUNCIL: SALARIES: Commencing January 1, 1980, the salaries of the Mayor and of members of the City Council shall be as follows:

- (a) The Mayor of Genesee shall receive a monthly salary in the sum of Sixty Dollars (\$60.00),
- (b) Each member of the Council shall receive a monthly salary in the sum of Forty-five dollars (\$45.00).

GROWING GASOLINE SHORTAGES

"Americans must deal with growing shortages of gasoline and other petroleum products because of stifling, often contradictory, government regulations," said John Schurbon, Chairman of the North Central Idaho Tax Reform Immediately (TRIM) Committee. "Government agencies tell oil companies what kinds of oil and gasoline products they may manufacture, and how much, a procedure which creates serious distortions in the energy market. So called environmentalists, both within and outside the government, prevent the orderly production of known energy resources in this country," noted Schurbon. He also pointed out that the budget of the Department of Energy is greater than the combined annual profits of all the major American oil companies—yet it does not produce a single drop of oil.

"This continuous stifling of the production of domestic energy resources is not only economically unjustified," said Schurbon, "it also causes the country to become the political captive of the nations from which we currently import half of our oil."

The North Central Idaho TRIM committee has just published the Summer 1979 TRIM Bulletin as a public service. The Bulletin contains articles explaining how too much government has brought about our current energy crisis. As a regular feature, a report of how Steve Symms, our federal Representative, has voted on significant issues involving billions of tax-dollars is printed on the fourth page of the Bulletin.

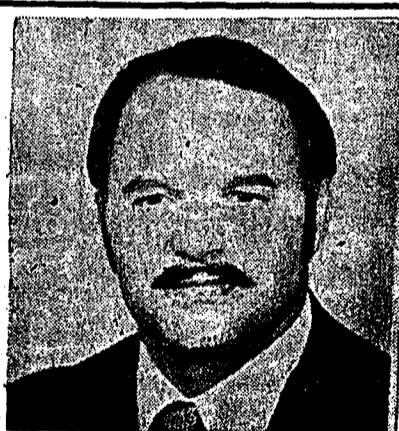

Kendrick Gazette Aug. 17, 1939

Last Saturday morning the ranch home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Stedman on the north slope of Big Bear ridge, formally known as the Stanton ranch, was totally destroyed by fire. The flames were discovered about 1 o'clock and while Mr. Stedman fought the flames, Mrs. Stedman went to town for help. All their household goods except for a few articles nearest the door were lost.

Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Vincent were awakened around 2:30 by the honking of the horn of their car. He went out to investigate and found the car enveloped in flames. Neighbors were called and with the help of family, flames were held to a single building. In addition to the loss of the car and garage, tools, harness and saddles, stored in the building to the estimated value of \$150.00 were destroyed. It is believed that the fire started from a short-circuit in the ignition system of the car.
