



GROWING GASOLINE SHORTAGES

"Americans must deal with growing shortages of gasoline and other petroleum products because of stifling, often contradictory, government regulations," said John Schurbon, Chairman of the North Central Idaho Tax Reform Immediately (TRIM) Committee.
