In the Varsity games Kendrick took the first 15-6 but were trailing 13-8 in the second until Bronwyn Manfull served 7 straight points to give Kendrick the game and the match.  
Tuesday night the KHS girls were at home and took both the JV and the Varsity games from Potlatch. The JVC won two straight matches 15-11 and 15-7. Bonnie Lawrence and Janet Warner each served 7 straight points to give the Varsity squad 15-2 and 15-5 wins.  
This Thursday evening the Tigers will be up at Genesee for two games.

Both teams scored 1 unconverted touchdown, but Steve Becker slipped through the line and tackled Kendrick quarterback Rex Snyder in the second quarter for a two-point safety and that margin was enough to give the Genesee Bulldogs an 8-6 win Friday night on the KHS field.

**Bicyclists, Motorists  
Need Better Understanding**

The sudden appearance of a bicyclist or motor vehicle in front of one or the other can send chills down a person's spine. All too often, the bicycle-automobile encounter can yield tragic results. Injuries are received by 97 percent of the bicyclists involved in traffic accidents in Idaho. The majority of those bicycle accidents occur with persons under the age of 14. The increasing number of youngsters riding bicycles to school this year and the popularity

of the bicycle with adults, sets the stage for an increase in Idaho bicycle accidents.

There is a reason for so many of the 155 fatal and injury bicycle accidents that happen in Idaho each year. Many bicyclists consider themselves as a separate person not bound by law to observe laws and safety practices of the road. Similarly, many vehicle drivers do not recognize the rights of a bicyclist using the public roadways. These common habits of disregarding other's rights are the cause of most motor vehicle-bicycle accidents.

**Rules and Regulations**

Both the bicyclist and motor vehicle operator must obey the "Rules of the Road." There are certain key rules a bicyclist can follow to insure greater safety: Idaho law requires a bicyclist to stay on the right side of the street, near the curb, and to ride with traffic. If you are riding with other bicyclists, don't ride more than two abreast except when on a bicycle path or a part of the roadway set aside for the exclusive use of bicycles. Even then, it is advisable to ride in single file. Whenever a usable path

for bicycles has been provided next to the roadway, the bicyclist must use the path, not the roadway.

A bicyclist can be given a traffic ticket for the same traffic violations a motorist might commit. All traffic signs, signals, and road markings must be obeyed. This includes stopping at all stop signs. Use hand signals to indicate a turn, lane change or stop. Yield to motorized vehicles about to cross in front of you. Do this even when you have the right-of-way. If there is any chance the other person will not yield, and walk your bicycle across all busy intersections. At least one hand must be kept on the handlebars at all times, and packages should not be carried that interfere with your vision or control of the bicycle. Only one person is allowed to ride a bicycle, unless it is a bicycle built for more than one person. When riding after sunset, light clothing should be worn.

**Equipment Requirements**  
When riding a bicycle at night, Idaho law requires that a white light be used which is visible for 500 feet to the front of the bicycle. A red reflector is required on the rear of the bicycle. The red reflector must be visible up to 300 feet when directly in front of a vehicle using its high beam lights. A red light may be used in addition to the reflector. Side wheel or pedal reflectors will increase your nighttime visibility. A warning device, such as a bell, which can be heard for at least 100 feet is required. A siren or whistle is not allowed. Every bicycle must be equipped with a working brake. The brake must permit the bicycle operator to make the braked wheels skid on dry level clean pavement.

The percentage of bicyclists injured in traffic accidents is high. Recognition of the rules of the road by both the bicyclist and motorist, along with the use of proper safety equipment by the bicyclist would go a long way toward reducing bicycle involved traffic accidents.

**DEER AND ELK**

Horns and antlers must accompany the carcass while in transit, but elk antlers may be cut to ear length to make transportation easier.

Proper tag validation is a must. It must be the right one for the species taken and it is validated by cutting and removing the two triangles indicating the date and month of the harvest.

The tag must be attached to the largest portion of the carcass retained and it must remain attached during transit and storage. Validation is to be completed immediately after the animal is taken.

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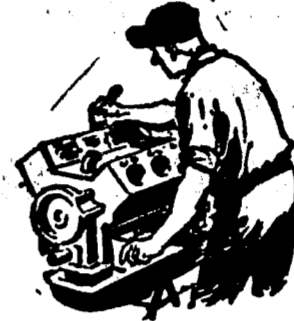

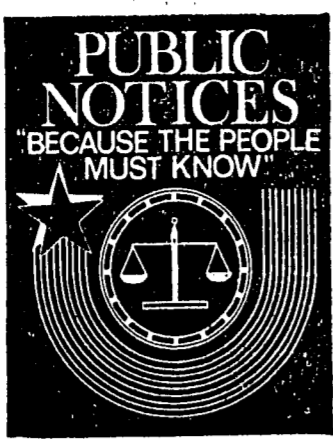

AN ORDINANCE VACATING THE SOUTHEAST ONE-HALF OF MAIN STREET CONTIGUOUS TO BLOCKS 104 AND 105, OAKS ADDITION TO KENDRICK, AND CAMERON STREET BETWEEN SAID BLOCK 104 AND 105, AND THAT PART OF HIGH STREET CONTIGUOUS TO BLOCKS 104 AND 111 OF SAID ADDITION AND NORTHWEST OF THE NORTHERLY BOUNDARY LINE OF STATE OF IDAHO HIGHWAY NO. 3, AND THE SOUTHEASTERLY 10.88 FEET OF WHEELER STREET CONTIGUOUS TO SAID BLOCK 111, AND THE ALLEY IN BLOCK 111, AND THE NORTHWEST ONE-HALF OF WHEELER STREET CONTIGUOUS TO LOT 10, BLOCKS 104, AND LOTS 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, AND 8, BLOCKS 105, ALL OF SAID OAKS ADDITION, SUBJECT TO EXCEPTIONS FOR EXISTING FRANCHISES AND RESERVING CERTAIN EASEMENTS FOR WATER AND SEWER LINES; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF DEEDS TO OWNERS OF LAND ABUTTING ON THE VACATED PORTIONS OF SAID STREETS AND ALLEY AND PROVIDING THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Kendrick, County of Latah, State of Idaho, as follows:

Section 1. That the Southeasterly one-half of Main Street beginning at Southwesterly lot line of Lot 8 (extended to the center of Main Street), Block 105 and extending to and through the intersection with High Street be, and the same is hereby vacated.

Section 2. That all of High Street contiguous to Lot 1, Block 104, Oaks Addition to Kendrick extending into the intersection with Wheeler Street, and all of High Street contiguous to Lot 1, Block 111 of said Oaks Addition and Northwest of the Northwest boundary line of Idaho State Highway No. 3, and the alley in said Block 111 lying Northwest of said Highway No. 3 boundary line and extending to the boundary line of the property of the State of Idaho Highway Department, which line is 19 feet Southwest of the Southwest lot line of Lot 5 of said Block 111, be, and the same is hereby, vacated.

Section 3. That Cameron Street lying and being between Blocks 104 and 105 of Oaks Addition to Kendrick be, and the same is hereby vacated.

Section 4. That the Southeasterly 10.88 feet of Wheeler Street contiguous to Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and the Northeast 19 feet of Lot 6, Block 111 of Oaks Addition to Kendrick, Idaho, be and the same is hereby vacated.

Section 5. That the Northwest one-half of Wheeler Street contiguous to Lot 10, Block 104 and extending from the Northeast line (extended) of said Lot 10 to the Southwest line (extended) of Lot 3, Block 105, all in Oaks Addition to Kendrick be, and the same is hereby, vacated.

Section 6. That the aforesaid alley and streets are vacated reserving unto the City of Kendrick easements over, under and across the above described alley and portion of the aforesaid streets for the maintenance, repairs and replacement of water, drainage and sewer lines, mains and connections now in place in said vacated alley and streets, and for all other purposes of every nature pertaining thereto, together with the right of ingress and egress to and from said premises for the purposes aforesaid.

Section 7. That the Mayor and the Council of the City of Kendrick, Idaho, be, and they are hereby authorized and directed, in the name of and on behalf of the City of Kendrick, to execute and deliver to the owners of land abutting on said vacated alley proper quitclaim deeds conveying to said owners said vacated alley and streets, SUBJECT TO the reservations set forth in Section 6 above.

Section 8. That this Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage, approval, and publication.
