Roberta Weeks Manwaring Retires from Pocatello Corp

Roberta Weeks Manwaring, retired August 1 after 23 years employment with Pocatello Corporation in Lewiston. At the time for her retirement she was a control clerk in the EDP.

Her first job was as a teletype operator and billing clerk in the lumber sales department. Later she was made stock clerk with the responsibility of keeping track of the lumber inventory at all the plants.

When the lumber sales department was reorganized in 1962, Roberta went to lumber shipping where she handled just about every clerical job and even sold lumber over the phone. When Pocatello sold Idaho supplies in 1970, Roberta transferred to EDP as lead lumber invoice clerk, in charge of lumber invoicing. She was the first woman to take courses in grading, checking and tallying.

Half owner and manager of a 1,300-acre ranch on Texas ridge, about 5 miles northeast of Kendrick, she leases the land and rents out the pasture.

She raises cattle, chickens, ducks, geese, horses, garden and has a small fruit orchard.

While working, she spent her weekends on the ranch and the week at her trailer home in the Lewiston Orchards. Now that she's retired, she plans to reverse that. She also has a recreation retreat at Orogrande about 16 miles from Elk City.

Cutoff Dates Approach For Tag, Stamp Sales

Hunters who plan ahead would do well to check upcoming cutoff dates for the general sale of deer and elk tags, archery and muzzle loader stamps.

Deadlines are a scant month away. Department of Fish and Game regulations show that midnight, October 2, is the cutoff date for elk tags statewide and deer tags in the 10 northernmost counties.

A closing date of midnight, October 16, has been set for deer tags in all other counties and for the general sale of archery and muzzle loader stamps.

Resident and non-resident Panhandle elk tags and the non-resident quota of deer tags are sold out, according to the department's license section.

The Panhandle tags are valid only in management units 1 through 7 and unit 9.

There are some exceptions to cutoff dates. Departments offices sell deer and elk tags, archery and muzzle loader stamps directly or by mail to children who become 12 yrs. of age following the closing dates.

Persons who have established six-month residency or Idaho servicemen and women home on leave after the cutoff dates also are included in the exceptions.

Following cutoff dates, hunters may purchase deer and elk tags through a department office, but it will be unlawful to use the tags until the second day following issuance. Such tags are stamped with the effective dates.

Not included in the Panhandle quotas are senior residents 70 years of age and older, children becoming 12 years old, military persons home on leave and those attaining the six month residency requirement.

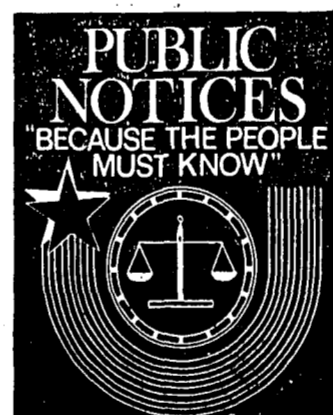
Virgil Hove, 78, Former Genesee Resident, Passes September 17

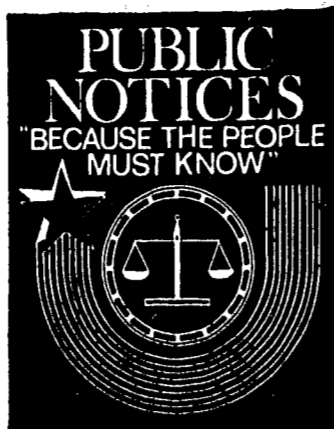

Helicopter Logging Operations at Quartz Creek

Columbia Helicopters will begin yarding logs this week in the North Fork of the Clearwater River Canyon at the mouth of Quartz Creek according to Canyon District Ranger, Charley Mosier.

Mosier said the operation, which is along the North Fork Road (289) about 8 miles upriver from the Canyon Ranger Station is a continuation of the 24-million board foot Lower Quartz timber sale. Traffic delays up to 45-minutes are possible as the helicopter flies back and forth across the road and yards logs. The logs will be loaded onto trucks in the North Fork road also.

The operation will probably last into November, Mosier said. Columbia Helicopters has been working in the Quartz Creek area all summer.

Mosier pointed out that this yarding operation will provide a good opportunity for the public to watch helicopter loggers in action. Visitors are invited to observe the operation from along the North Fork road.

The district ranger also reminded forest travelers of another road construction project which may result in traffic delays. Crews are reconstructing portions of the Sheep Mountain Road (680) which heads east off the Beaver Creek Road and up Sheep Mountain Creek. The project include lengthening of culverts, brushing, constructing of turnouts and graveling. Mosier asked that traffic in the area be limited as much as possible. No date has been set for the completion of the project.

A correction is in order — there were actually 42 present at the last meeting at the Taylor home, not 21 as appeared in the paper.

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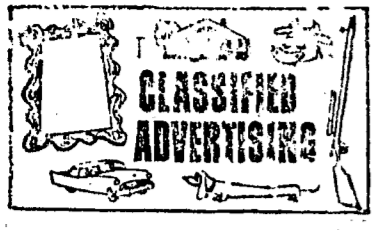
