A History of Kendrick

1909—KENDRICK GAZETTE—1959

(A short sketch of the Kendrick Gazette, now published for 14 yrs.)
The Kendrick Gazette was established in 1891 by Joseph S. Vincent, and the first office was in a tent with a small Army Press for machinery, and the quality of type was in proportion to the remainder of the outfit.

The plant was burned out in the first fire in 1892, but resumed operation in a short time with a little better plant. In 1898 the plant suffered severely from the flood of that year, but never missed an issue.

In 1901, the Gazette passed into the control of D. T. A. Mackintosh, who continued in charge of its destinies until June of the present year. In the first of 1904, the plant was again entirely destroyed and for the next two weeks its issue was printed in the neighboring town of Juliaetta.

In 1905 the Gazette was moved into a new brick building. In June of this year Mr. Mackintosh sold his interest to the Kendrick Publishing Co. of which company Geo. W. Hancock is the manager and principal owner.

City Council

The city council was organized with the first incorporation of the town, and it speaks well for the various councilmen elected to manage the town's affairs that no indebtedness of either bonds or floating hangs over the citizens to add to taxation. The town possesses a fire department, good streets, and sidewalks, a city hall, hydrants and other municipal improvements. The officers now in charge of the administration are as follows: city council: E. W. Bradbury, mayor; John Lauterbach, Guy M. Lewis, W. O. Morr and Roy Dickey; W. M. McCreary, treasurer; Sam Millison, city clerk.

Schools and Churches

Schools and churches are two of the magnets that attract or repel settlement. Beautiful for situation and picturesque in its setting, Kendrick's schoolhouse like that of the "Bonnie Briar Bush" invites to pleasure and scholarship.

Banks

The people of this town have ample cause to be proud of the banks established here, for indeed they represent strength equal to any in the state.

Lodges

As to lodges—the Odd Fellows, Knights of Pythias, Masons, Woodman of the World, Encampment Endowment Rank, Rebekah and Womens Circle are all strongly organized.

SOUTHWICK COMMUNITY

Southwick, Nez Perce County, is situated on the Big Potlatch Ridge about 100 miles south of Spokane and about 35 miles north of Lewiston, the county seat of that county. The town has three flourishing churches. The post office is located in a new building on Main Street. There are three millinery stores, blacksmith shop, two livery barns, meat market, etc. It has a good hall in which the Southwick Commercial club and other lodges and clubs meet.

Telephonically

We believe there is no section of the great northwest, nor indeed in the effect east, that is better equipped telephonically than in this section. We have two systems—the Potlatch Telephone owned and operated locally and the Interstate Telephone Company, a stock company controlled by Spokane capital.

Lumber Business

The lumber business is one of the most important enterprises of this city and is represented locally by the Barnum Lumber and Construction Company who do a wholesale and retail business in lumber and building materials, carrying a stock of \$10,000; and Pine Creek Lumber Company has its headquarters in Kendrick. Their annual output is over 2,000,000 feet per year. There are, besides the above, 12 small sawmills . . . an annual output of not less than 10 million feet.

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

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Juliaetta Historical Edition
 1910—1960

Unlike the great majority of western towns, Juliaetta did not spring into prominence with a magic growth nor has she ever experienced a great speculative boom, which in the majority of instances retards, rather than promotes the growth of a town. But, on the other hand, its geographical location, together with the progressive spirit of the businessmen, has resulted in continued normal growth up to the present time.

Naturally, the Indians were the first to realize and appreciate this natural wealth and resources of this section; and in the days of the early pioneer they were so numerous and in some cases hostile, that it made very early settlement, most impossible.

To obviate in a measure this difficulty, the Nez Perce Indian Reservation was granted by the Federal government in 1858, thereby making it possible after a number of years to confine the Indians to the reservation and permitting the homeseeker to make permanent settlement without fear of being molested.

The silvery waters of the Potlatch, the abundance of timber, the beautiful and fertile prairie lands and the enormous amount of great varieties of wild game and fish all furnished alluring promises of peace and plenty to the homeseeker. These promises have not become realities, and the productiveness of this area of land so far exceeds that of many other states, we have come to realize that this is truly a land which flows milk and honey.

ing Mill. This industry proved an important factor in the development of the town and necessitated building of wagon roads from all the surrounding country in Juliaetta thereby making this the commercial center.

Moscow was the Post Office address for the entire section before the establishing of an office here. Mr. Charles Snyder, who came from California in 1876 and took up a claim on American ridge saw the necessity of a post office in this locality and it was the result of his effort in particular that the office was established in the year 1881. In selecting a name, Mr. Snyder expressed his paternal love—naming the office in honor of his daughters, Misses Julia and Etta, who are now enjoying good health and happiness.

When the post office was first established the mail was carried on horseback from Genesee, a distance of 16 miles. There being no roads, it required two days to make the round trip and in cases of inclement weather, 3 and all times, four days were spent in making the trip—while now with improved roads, an auto will run from here to Genesee easily within an hour. Mr. Snyder also put in a stock of staple merchandise at the time the post office was established, this being the first store in Juliaetta.

Lee and Stuart put in a large stock of general merchandise in the building now occupied by Alexander's Store.

In the year 1886 Lee & Stuart put in a large stock of general merchandise in the building now occupied by Alexander's store. Within a short time thereafter a \$20,000 stock of merchandise was put in by Durham and Kaufman in the property now owned by Niles & Needham. In 1889 J. L. Hallett of Portland, Oregon established a banking institution which ultimately succeeded by the Bank of Juliaetta.

By this time, it became evident that this was the natural geographical location for a permanent town and then began the work of grading streets, building sidewalks, etc. and

the settlement began to assume the appearance of a village.

Tramway
 To properly care for the grain which was being grown on the table lands surrounding us, and to secure quick and easy transportation, the Juliaetta Tramway was built with a cost of \$25,000 and warehouses erected.

Northern Pacific Railway
 Another event which added importance to the town was the building of the Northern Pacific Railway from Spokane to Lewiston in 1890, this town being the terminus of the road until 1893, when it was continued to Lewiston which was at one time the Capitol of Idaho territory.

The congenial and accommodating proprietor of the Juliaetta pharmacy Dr. S. A. Roe, graduated from the Missouri Medical College at St. Louis in 1887. After practicing medicine for a few years in Missouri and Kansas he decided to come to the Inland Empire. The lines now carried by the up-to-date drug store include so many of the absolutely necessary articles that the name no longer implies merely an apothecary's shop.

First Homestead Claim
 The first homestead claim was filed on Fix ridge by E. Fix in the year 1878, and is the same property where Mr. H. J. Eckman now lives. The next settler was Mr. Taylor who home steaded the farm where Willie Hall now lives. Soon after this, Mrs. Mary Hall and her two sons, Columbus and Walter moved from Williamette Valley, Ore. to Fix ridge and have since made their permanent home. The Halls, Richardsons, and Hendricks were among those who followed.

Juliaetta Concert Band
 The Juliaetta Concert Band is composed of 18 pieces and each of the individual members possess remarkable musical talent.

Our town is lighted by a modern electric plant. The waterworks which is municipally owned was installed several years ago and furnishes an abundant supply for every purpose.

Business Affairs
 The business affairs of our town are looked after by a Board of Trustees who are chosen by popular vote every two years. At present the town officials and board of trustees is composed of W. F. Taylor, marshal; Marion T. Curry, attorney; N. M. Talbot, treasurer; B. N. Trout, clerk. Trustees are R. A. Pickens, J. C. Groseclose, T. B. Bash and W. C. Cochran.

Foster School of Healing
 This institution attracts sufferers from every known disease and they come from distant states as well as from this and those surrounding us. The Foster School of Healing was established here in 1903 by Prof. Robert Foster.

History of Hardware Business
 Small stocks of shelf hardware and a few repairs were carried by the general merchandise stores before the establishment of an exchange hardware store by Trout and Robinson in 1892. This business was continued until 1895, when it was sold to Cox and Davis.

S. T. Dunlap, under the firm name of Lewiston Trading Co. put in a line of agriculture implements in the building now occupied by the Juliaetta Meat Market in the year 1899. The present owner of the Juliaetta Hardware Co., Messrs. E. E. Guldage and Miles Pierce, purchased the store from Peter H. Peters.

Juliaetta boasted of a cannery; 2 banks, The Citizens State Bank and Bank of Juliaetta and School of Art. Juliaetta also has 4 churches: Catholic, German Lutheran, Presbyterian and Christian, while other denominations held regular meetings.

The Juliaetta school offers to boys and girls the opportunity of receiving a good high school education.
