Waterfowl hunters are reminded that the federal ("Duck-Stamp") and a valid Idaho hunting license are requirements for legal shooting when seasons open in October.

The cost of the stamp is \$7.50 compared to \$5 last year. It is not sold by the Department of Fish & Game. Anyone 16 years of age or older

must have the stamp to hunt waterfowl/?Revenue from sale of the stamp goes for federal acquisition of waterfowl habitat, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.






