**Limited Steelhead Season
Opend October 6**

Steelhead anglers will have a fall season in Idaho, October 6 through November 18, but with catch-and-keep fishing only on the Salmon River and part of the Snake River.

Catch-and-release regulations will be in effect on the Clearwater River system and the Snake below the mouth of the Grand Ronde River. Single barbless hooks are mandatory

on the Clearwater and the fish must be immediately returned to the water unharmed.

There are no gear restrictions on the catch-and-release stretch of the Snake.

The Fish and Game Commission, which approved the season Thursday, September 27, was told that the steelhead count at Ice Harbor Dam could be the second lowest on record.

But Commissioners agreed to limited catch-and-keep on the Salmon River after they learned that fish returning to the Pahsimeroi Hatchery made up more than 85 percent of the run.

Stacy Gebhards, chief of the Department of Fish and Game's bureau of fisheries, told the Commission that a harvest of surplus hatchery fish was possible without affecting the minimum 1,000-1,200 adults needed for spawn-taking at Pahsimeroi.

Daily bag limit is one fish; possession limit, one; season limit, 3. All steelhead longer than 28 inches must be returned to the water, un-

harmd, a regulation designed to protect the relatively few numbers of the larger, 2-ocean fish.

The same regulations apply to the Snake River, upstream from the mouth of the Grand Ronde River to 400 feet below Hells Canyon Dam.

The Clearwater run is expected to be critically low, with a projected count of no more than 7,000 steelhead. Dworshak National Hatchery requires a minimum of 2,500 spawners.

Gebhard said a count of about 18,400 was projected for Ice Harbor Dam, the first barrier the fish must traverse before they enter Idaho waters.

"In view of the low numbers and critical status of certain wild steelhead stocks, the season will be watched closely and emergency closures will be issued at the first sign that the fish are in jeopardy," Gebhards said.

FIRST SECURITY BANK LETTER

Modest improvement was evident in residential building permit activity in Idaho during the month of August, according to James Hoogland, Jr. and Stan Merrill, managers, quoting from the Idaho Construction Report. The report, edited by Dr. Kelly Matthews, vice president and economist for First Security Corporation, is a monthly publication of First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A.

The rapid increase in the prime rate will, however, add significantly to the homebuilder's financing cost during the period of construction, the report said. The outlook, therefore, is for reduced residential construction activity in the months ahead.

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations in August was \$52,080,621 or 14.1% above 1978. New residential construction for 824 dwelling units totaled \$27,317,600, an increase of 7.6% in number and an increase of 18.1% in value compared with a year ago. Nonresidential construction valued at \$11,420,774 was down 5.7% below last year, while alterations and repairs totaling \$13,342,247 was up

**DISTRICT COURT UPHOLDS
EMERGENCY CLOSURE**

Second District Judge Roger Swanson has found three members of the Nez Perce Indian tribe guilty of violating an emergency closure to treaty fishing below the Rapid River salmon hatchery in 1978.

The judge's opinion, against Rod Allison and Frank Scott, affirmed the Department of Fish and Game's right to issue such a regulation.

"I hope the results of the trial will clear the air regarding the states authority to regulate for conservation purposes," Joseph C. Greenley, department director, commented.

Greenley had ordered the Rapid River closure effective June 8, 1978 from the fish barrier dam just above the fish trap entrance to a point 100 feet downstream.

Swanson concluded that closure of the 100-foot sanctuary to Indian treaty fishing was "valid and enforceable" and he also found that the department did not discriminate against Indian treaty fishing rights in favor of any other fishing rights.

"The Indian has been afforded more than equal opportunity to take a fair and equitable share of all fish which the State of Idaho permits to be taken from any given salmon run up the Salmon, Little Salmon and particularly in Rapid River," Swanson stated.

The December 1978 trial in Grangeville was held jointly, although each defendant had been separately charged with gaffing salmon within the 100-foot enclosure.

Swanson also found that Allison Scott, in addition to gaffing one salmon, "aided and abetted" Rod Scott in gaffing salmon while standing guard with a gun. Under Idaho law the offenses are misdemeanors.

Rapid River hatchery is financed by the Idaho Power Company and operated by department personnel.

Idaho Celebrates National 4-H Week

 Moscow—Projects dealing with food, clothing, horses, health, and livestock are the most popular learn by doing activities of Idaho's 25,600 4-H boys and girls. These 4-H members and 5.2 million other nationwide will have special displays and activities Oct. 7-13 to observe National 4-H Week.
 About 30 percent of Idaho 4-Hers take at least one food project, according to Maurice Johnson, state 4-H leader at the U. of I. Over 5,000 of the 9 to 19 year old Idaho girls and boys participate in 4-H clothing programs. Horse, health and livestock programs each have enrollments exceeding 3,000 young people.

Altogether, nearly 60 program areas are administered by the Idaho 4-H office, the youth education program at the U. of I., Cooperative Extension Service. Program in Idaho, each geared to the specific interests, abilities and age levels of participants, include survival, motorcycle, snowmobile, Indian bead work, gun safety, geology and terrarium.

Projects become even more diverse—wild edible foods, fly tying, natural dyes, sign language and clowning—in individual areas of Idaho. These are special interest subjects studied in some of the state's 44 counties and at the North Idaho Agency, Lapwai, and the Fort Hall Reservation.

With the theme, "Expanding Horizons" the national observance calls on 4-H members everywhere to be-

come productive, self-directed and contributing members of society.

Many of the 4-H learn-by-doing projects and activities build character and leadership-citizenship skills. "In our rapidly changing world, it is increasingly important that young people learn life skills, prepare for meaningful careers and assume citizenship and leadership responsibilities," Johnson said. "4-H is one way for youth to expand their horizons."

Over 4,600 Idahoans, many of them parents of 4-Hers or 4-H teens lead organized club and special interest groups or serve as advisers for 4-H activities. Each volunteer devotes an estimated 20 eight-hour days annually to 4-H leadership responsibilities.

In addition, Johnson noted, many resource people from business, industry, agricultural and civic groups routinely contribute to Gem State 4-H program through personal involvement and financial assistance.

Of more than 1,900 organized clubs and groups in Idaho, most are in rural areas, although Johnson indicated the number of 4-Hers in urban communities is increasing. Others come from farms and rural nonfarm towns.

Further information about 4-H program and planned activities for the observance of National 4-H week is available at county offices of the UI Cooperative Extension Service.

YACC Jobs Available in Orofino

Thirty jobs with the Young Adult Conservation Corps (YACC) camp in Orofino are available, according to Camp Director Roy Tate.

YACC enrollees, who do conservation work on public lands, are paid the Federal minimum wage, \$2.90. Enrollees selected to lead work crews are paid higher wages.

Enrollees must be between 16 and 23 and must be unemployed. Applicants cannot leave school to secure employment, and students cannot sign on for summer or holiday periods only. Enrollees can participate in the program up to one year.

YACC enrollees are housed at McKelway Hall on the State Hospital North grounds in Orofino. Some crews are housed during the work week at field locations.

Tate said that persons interested in working with YACC should contact their nearest Department of Employment office. Qualified applicants are then referred to YACC for selection.

Waterfowl Hunting Started October 6

Duck hunting is expected to improve in Idaho this year and the harvest on geese should about match last season's record breaker, according to Department of Fish and Game reports.

The duck season opens statewide October 6, along with goose hunting in the 10 northern counties. Other goose season opens in counties to the south are October 13 and 27. Varying closing dates and hunting areas are shown in the printed regulations.

Dick Norell, state game bird manager, says Idaho production of Canada geese benefited from favorable water conditions earlier this year. Conditions were also reported to be good on nesting grounds in Montana and Alberta, Canada.

Last season, the estimated harvest of Canada geese—highest on record, was 45,700, up 66 percent from 1977, and 70 percent above the previous 5-year average.

Hunters bagged about 540,000 ducks in Idaho during the 1978-79 season, a 3 percent increase over the previous year, but 4 percent below the latest five-year average. Waterfowl harvest estimates are based on returns from the annual hunter questionnaire survey.

Norell says the fall flight forecast from Canada and Alaska shows no major change in the total number of ducks that will be coming in from the north.

But Idaho hunters may see more mallards. Most of them come from southern Alberta, where mallard production was excellent this year, Norell says.

Here are the 1979-80 seasons and bag limits, as established by the Fish and Game Commission.

Geese
 The 10 Panhandle counties, from Idaho county north—October 6 thru January 6. Daily bag and possession limits, 3 and 6, with no more than 1 Ross goose.

Blaine County south and east of U. S. 93 and Cassia, Gooding, Jerome Lincoln, Minidoka and Twin Falls counties—October 27 through December 23. Daily bag limit is three but no more than 2 Canada geese or 1 Ross goose may be taken daily or be in possession.

Fremont County within the North Fork of the Snake River drainage above the new Wendell bridge—October 13 through November 25. Daily bag and possession limits, 2 and 2. Hunting all white geese prohibited.

All other counties—October 13 through December 23. Daily bag limit is 3, but no more than 2 Canada geese or 1 Ross goose may be taken daily or be in possession.

Ducks
 North of Clearwater and Idaho counties and in most of southwestern and south central Idaho—October 6 through January 13. Daily bag limit 7, possession limit 14.

Starting in Clearwater and Idaho Counties, extending across the center of the state and into the southeast corner—October 6 through January 6. Daily bag limit 7; possession limit 14. Check the printed regulations for exact hunting areas.

Bag limit restrictions—Statewide the daily bag limit may not include more than 2 canvasback or redheads in an aggregate and the possession limit may not include more than 4 canvasback or redheads in the aggregate.

In Benewah, Bonner, Boundary, Kootenai and Shoshone Counties, the daily bag and possession limit may not include more than 1 wood duck. Shooting hours for waterfowl are from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Exact daily starting and closing times are listed in the regulations.

Duck Stamp and Idaho License Needed for Waterfowl Hunting

Waterfowl hunters are reminded that the federal "Duck Stamp" and a valid Idaho hunting license are requirements for legal shooting when seasons open in October. The cost of the stamp is \$7.50 compared to \$5 last year. It is not sold by the Department of Fish & Game. Anyone 16 years of age or older

must have the stamp to hunt waterfowl. Revenue from sale of the stamp goes for federal acquisition of waterfowl habitat, according to the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Since 1934, more than 75 million stamps have been sold, providing more than \$210 million for purchase of some 2.3 million acres of habitat. Spiraling land purchases costs made the price increase necessary, the agency says.

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

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
