## Melva Woody, 78, Passes Sept. 30

Melva Woody, 78, a former rural school teacher of the Kendrick-Juliaetta vicinity, passed away Sunday September 30 at Gritman hospital. Mrs. Woody was born February 8, 1901, to Charles E. and Kittle G. Walker in the Oklahoma Indian Territory. The family moved to the Leland area of northern Nez Perce County in May of 1902. A few years later they moved to the nearby Fairview neighborhood. She attended the Fairview and Stony Point rural schools and after her family moved to Koooskia in 1917 she graduated from Koooskia High School. She attended the former Lewiston Normal School, graduating with an Idaho elementary life certificate.

For 14 years she taught in the rural schools around Kendrick and Juliaetta. She was married, May 20, 1928, to Robert Ericl Woody, a farmer on Potlatch Ridge. The couple made their home on the ranch until 1952. Woody died Dec. 1, 1972.

Mrs. Woody was a charter member of the Juliaetta Seventh-day Adventist Church that she and her husband helped build, both with their labor and finances. She held a number of church offices through the years and was a leader in the Dorcas Society until ill health limited her activities.

Survivors include a foster daughter, Karol Hoisington; 3 brothers, Charles L. Walker, of Caldwell; Joe D. Walker of Spokane and Clifford W. Walker of Boise, and four sisters, Velma Morgan and Leulah Grieser, of Lewiston and Elva Lewis and Vera Carnes of Spokane.

Three daughters and two brothers preceded her in death.

Funeral services were held October 3 at 10:00 a. m. at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel, Lewiston with Pastor Fred Christensen officiating.

Organist Marie L. Jones accompanied vocalist Eugene Rainville who sang, "Each Step I take," and "Beyond The Sunset." Casket Bearers were Arnold Hoisington, Edward Grieser, Donald Morgan, Orval Walker, Dick Walker, Roger Morgan.

## Heart Attack Oct. 13 Claims Given Mustoe

Given M. Mustoe, 86, a Southwick native who farmed there for more than 50 years, died Saturday morning October 13 at Gritman Memorial Hospital, Moscow, of an apparent heart attack.

Mustoe was born July 25, 1893, at Southwick, to Chamber and Elizabeth Mustoe, pioneers of the area. He grew up and then married Goldie Marie Southwick on December 12, 1917, at Cream Ridge. The Southwick community had been named for the bride's grandfather, Stephen Southwick, the first postmaster.

The couple went to Edwards, Mont. to homestead after their marriage, but returned to Southwick to farm his parent's place two years later. Mustoe retired in 1959 but continued to help his son, Jack, on the farm until recent years.

Mustoe served in the Army during World War I. He was a member of the Kendrick Grange, the Southwick Community Church and the Golden Sunset Senior Citizens of Kendrick. Survivors in addition to his wife and son, Carl of Page, Idaho; a sister, Thena Bernden of Lewiston; two grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by four sisters and two brothers.

The funeral was held at 1 p. m. Tuesday at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston, with the Rev. Steve Caskey of the Kendrick Community United Methodist Church officiating. Burial was at the Southwick Cemetery.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE CONSTRUCTION AND INSTALLATION OF IMPROVEMENTS AND BETTERMENTS OF THE WATER SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF GENESSEE, OF LATAH COUNTY, IDAHO, AT THE ESTIMATED COST OF \$530,800.00; PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF WATER REVENUE BONDS TO PAY THE COST THEREOF IN THE SUM OF NOT MORE THAN \$530,800.00, WHICH BONDS SHALL BE PAID ONLY OUT OF THE REVENUES & EARNINGS OF THE WATER SYSTEM, SUBJECT, HOWEVER, TO THE APPROVAL OF THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID CITY AT A SPECIAL ELECTION ORDERED HEREIN; DESCRIBING SAID BONDS AND THE CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH THEY WILL BE ISSUED; AND CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION FOR THE SUBMISSION TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID CITY THE QUESTION FOR THE RATIFICATION OR REJECTION OF SAID BOND ISSUE AND OF SAID INDEBTEDNESS; PROVIDING FOR THE NO-

TICE OF SAID ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING FOR OTHER MATTERS PROPERLY RELATING THERETO.

#### CITY OF GENESSEE

Latah County, Idaho  
BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Genesee, Idaho, as follows:

WHEREAS, it has been determined by the City Council of the City of Genesee to be necessary and essential to the health, safety, comfort and welfare of the inhabitants of said City to install, construct and acquire certain improvements and extensions to the water system within said City, and

WHEREAS, the Council has determined to finance the cost of the construction and installation of said improvements to the water system through the issuance of Water Revenue Bonds of the City, pursuant to the provisions of the Revenue Bond Act of the State of Idaho, Sections 50-1027 to 50-1042, inclusive, Idaho Code, and the Municipal Bond Law of the State of Idaho, Chapter 2 of Title 57, Idaho Code.

WHEREAS, said Revenue Bonds cannot be issued without the assent

of a majority of the qualified electors of the City of Genesee voting in an election called for such purpose; and WHEREAS, in order to authorize such Revenue Bonds, the Council and Mayor hereby call and establish the holding of a special municipal bond election for the aforesaid purposes as required by said Revenue Bond Act; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GENESSEE as follows:

#### Section 1: THE PROJECT

A. It is deemed necessary and advisable that the City of Genesee, (hereinafter designated as the "City"), acquire and construct certain improvements, extensions and betterments to the water system, such improvements and extensions consisting of the following:

- (1) Development of a new source of water supply;
- (2) Construction of a 300,000 gallon storage reservoir;
- (3) Construction of an 8" water transmission main to connect the proposed reservoir to the existing system; and
- (4) Installation of 8" and 6" water mains to replace undersized and outdated service lines;

together with sites and easements therefor and all appurtenances and machinery necessary or useful for said system, (hereafter referred to as the "Project"), all pursuant to the preliminary maps, plans and specifications therefor which have been prepared and filed by Richard Wyatt Engineering Inc., Consulting engineers heretofore selected by the Council for such purpose, and on file in the office of the City Clerk.

B. The cost and expense of the acquisition, construction and installation of the improvements of the Project, as estimated by the engineer to be \$530,800.00, which includes the cost of all preliminary expenses incurred and incident to the Project and properly incident to the issuance of the bonds. Included therein is the cost attributable to interest due on interim financing during the period of the Project is being acquired and constructed.

C. The acquisition, construction and installation of the improvements as described in subparagraph A above are hereby ordered.

D. Subject to the approval thereof by the qualified electors voting at the election for which provision is hereinafter made, Revenue Bonds of the City of Genesee shall be issued pursuant to the provisions of the Revenue Bond Act, being Idaho Code 50-1027 to 50-1042, inclusive, in the amount of not to exceed \$530,800.00.

Section 2: SPECIAL MUNICIPAL BOND ELECTION. That a special municipal bond election be, and the same hereby is, called in the City of Genesee, Idaho, on November 6, 1979, for the purpose of enabling the qualified electors of the City of Genesee to vote upon the proposition set forth in Section 4 hereof.

Section 3: POLLS. That the polls of said election shall be open at the hour of 12:00 o'clock Noon on said day and shall remain open continuously on said day until the hour of 8:00 o'clock P. M. of said day, at which time said polls shall be closed. The City, as its boundaries and corporate limits are now fixed and established, shall consist of One (1) voting precinct for said election. The polling place within said boundaries, together with the Judge and Clerks for the precinct are, and shall be as follows:

Precinct: 1  
Polling Place: City Hall  
Judges and Clerks: Janet Wishard, Madeline Johann, Donna Myers, Emma Hoduffer.

Deputy Registrar: Don Springer.

Section 4: BALLOT TITLE. The ballot title for said special election shall be in substantially the following form:

"SHALL THE CITY OF GENESSEE ISSUE AND SELL ITS WATER REVENUE BONDS IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF NOT MORE THAN \$530,800.00 TO PAY PART OF THE COST OF ACQUISITION AND CONSTRUCTION OF IMPROVEMENTS TO THE WATER SYSTEM? SAID BONDS SHALL BEAR A RATE OF INTEREST NOT IN EXCESS OF THAT PERMITTED BY LAW, SHALL MATURE OVER A PERIOD OF THIRTY YEARS, AND SHALL BE PAYABLE SOLELY FROM THE REVENUES OF THE SYSTEM, AS PROVIDED IN ORDINANCE NO. 251 ADOPTED OCTOBER 9, 1979."

IN FAVOR of issuing Water Revenue Bonds for the purposes provided by Ordinance No. 251  
AGAINST issuing Water Revenue Bonds for the purposes provided by Ordinance No. 251

Instruction to Voters: To vote on the foregoing proposition, the voter must make a cross (X) in the space to the right of the words "IN FAVOR OF issuing Water Revenue Bonds for the purposes provided by Ordinance No. 251" or "AGAINST issuing Water Revenue Bonds for the purposes provided by Ordinance No. 251" according to the way you desire to vote on the question. All marks otherwise made are forbidden. All distinguishing marks are forbidden and make the ballot void. If you by mistake or accident mark, tear, deface, or otherwise mutilate this ballot, return it to the election judges and obtain another ballot.

Section 5: SAMPLE BALLOTS. The City Clerk shall cause to be printed not less than Fifteen (15) days before said election, sample ballots containing the question to be submitted, which sample ballots shall be in the same form as the official ballots to be used, except they shall have printed thereon the words "Sample Ballot," shall be on paper of a different color than the official ballots, and shall not be numbered. The City Clerk shall furnish copies of the same on application at his office to anyone applying therefor. Said sample ballots shall be published at least twice in the official newspaper of the City, the last time to be within Five (5) days of said election.

Section 6: NOTICE. That notice of said special bond election shall be given prior to said

election by publishing notice of such election in the official newspaper of the City once a week on the same day for: Two (2) successive weeks, the first of such publication to be not less than Fourteen (14) days prior to the date fixed for the holding of said election, which notice shall be in substantially the form attached hereto, marked Exhibit "A" and by this reference incorporated herein.

#### Section 7: WATER REVENUE BONDS

If, at said election, a majority of the qualified electors of the City voting therein vote in favor of the issuance of said Bonds for the purposes set forth herein and designated on the aforesaid ballot, Water Revenue Bonds of the City shall be authorized, issued, sold and delivered. Said Bonds will mature annually over a period of Thirty (30) years, and will bear interest at a rate or rates not in excess of that permitted by law, payable semi-annually, provided that the first interest coupon may be for a shorter or longer period than six months but not in excess of one year, at the discretion of the Council.

All Bonds shall be issued in the form and manner, be registered, disposed of and redeemed, in accordance with the provisions of the Revenue Bond Law of the State of Idaho, Section 50-1027 to 50-1042, inclusive, Idaho Code, and the Municipal Bond Law of the State of Idaho, Chapter 2 of Title 57, Idaho Code.

Said Bonds shall be in the denomination of \$5,000.00 each, except Bond No. 1, which may be in a lesser amount, payable in numerical order, lowest numbers first; and may be made subject to prior redemption at such time or times, with or without premium, and upon such terms and conditions as may be determined by the Council in the Ordinance authorizing the issuance of such Bonds.

In the event the Water Revenue Bonds are purchased by the United States of America, Farmers Home Administration, said Bonds shall be in the form of a single amortized bond and shall bear interest at a rate not to exceed that allowed by law. The gross revenues of said water system, after deducting all sums for payment of costs of maintenance and operation of the system, including all incidental fees, costs, and expenses chargeable to costs of maintenance and operation, are pledged for the payment of principal of and interest on, and redemption premiums, if any, said Water Revenue Bonds. Said Bonds shall not be a debt of the City of Genesee within the meaning of any State Constitutional provision or statutory limitation nor a charge against the general credit or taxing powers of the City, and the City shall not be liable therefor nor shall said Bonds or the interest thereon be payable out of any funds other than the revenues of the system specified above.

#### Section 8: EFFECTIVE ORDINANCE

The officers of the City are hereby authorized and directed to take all action necessary or appropriate to effectuate the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 9: CANVASS. The Mayor and Council shall meet within Five (5) days following said election, to-wit: November 8, 1979, at the hour of 7:30 o'clock P. M., at the regular meeting place in the City Hall, for the purpose of canvassing the results of the election. Thereupon, the results shall be entered in the minutes of the Council and proclaimed as final.

#### Section 10: REPEAL

All ordinances or parts thereof in conflict herewith, to the extent of such conflict, are hereby repealed.

#### Section 11: RATIFICATION

All action heretofore taken (not inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance) by the Council and the officers of the City of Genesee directed toward construction and installing said improvement to the water system and the issuance of Water Revenue Bonds of the City therefor, and for the holding of a special municipal bond election, be, and the same hereby is, ratified, approved and confirmed.

#### Section 12: EMERGENCY

An emergency existing therefore, which emergency is hereby declared to exist, this Ordinance, shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage, approval and publication.

Persons may register on each day at any time during the office hours of the City Clerk or the Deputy Registrar, beginning with the date the Notice of Election is given and continuing to November 2, 1979, on which date the Office of the City Clerk will remain open until 8:00 o'clock P. M.

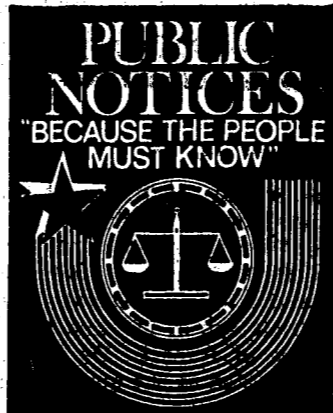

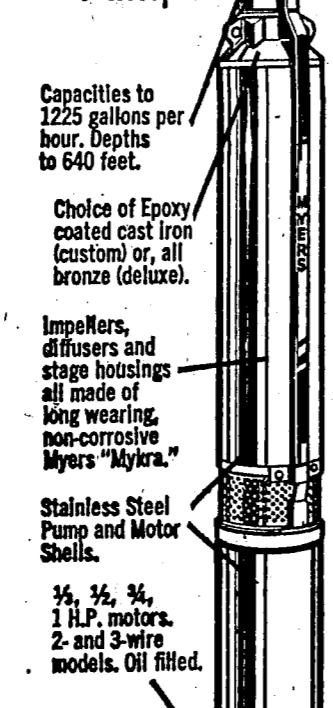


