## KHS Tigers Claim White League Title with 28-8 Win over Deary; at Genesee Friday

Coach Daren Munden's KHS Tigers clinched the 1979 White Pine football league championship last Friday night as they ran up a convincing 28-8 victory over the visiting Deary Mustangs to bring the season record to 5-0 in league play. Kendrick was able to lay claim to the championship as Genesee had dropped a hair-line 8-0 contest to the Nezperce Indians that same afternoon, giving the Bulldogs a 4-2 record. Genesee, who had defeated the Tigers in a non league game earlier this year, will host Kendrick this Friday night in the final game of the season.

Stubborn Deary never yielded an easy yard to the Tigers Friday night but outstanding performance turned in by the Kendrick offensive line tore gaping holes in the Mustang line and allowed the Tiger backs to rush for 361 yards.

Kendrick, taking the opening kickoff, drove down to the Deary 15 yard line early in the first quarter, then

quarterback Rex Snyder was sacked back on the Mustang 25 and the Tigers were forced to give up the ball on downs. It was not until there was just under three minutes remaining in the first quarter that Kendrick moved deep into Mustang territory again, this time on the running of Duane Howerton, who moved the ball to the 15. Kendrick then moved the ball down to the 5 and on the next play Howerton broke over the middle to score. Snyder passed to Terry Hudson for the two point conversion.

With less than three minutes remaining in the first quarter, Kendrick scored again with Howerton running from the thirty yard line to the 10 and two plays later, Rex Snyder using a quarterback option, rolled over to score from 2 yards out. A running extra point try failed.

Terry Hudson saw his 80-yard run go for nothing in the second quarter as he took a reverse handoff on his own 10 yard line and went to the Deary ten before being hauled down. Deary's defense stiffened and in four tries, the Tigers could move the ball only six yards. Deary took over and marched back up the field to the Kendrick 45 where Darren Clemenstagen broke up the drive with a pass interception on his own 38.

The Snyder to Clemenstagen pass combination helped set up the next touchdown for Kendrick as Clemenstagen gained ten yards in a play that put the ball on the Mustang 5 yard line. It was tough going from there as the Tigers gained four yards in three tries and then on the 4th and 1 situation, Snyder went over the right tackle slot to score and Hudson ran the 2-point conversion.

Kendrick's Joe Mathews put the game out of reach for the Mustangs in the final quarter with a 1-yard run to the final KHS score. Deary, still trying, fought back in the final minutes of play to march down field and score with Rex Lunstford taking a fifteen yard pass from Roger Thompson for the final 28-8 tally.

Nezperce lead all the way, even if it was only by 8 or 2 points as the Indians upset the Genesee Bulldogs 8-6 Friday afternoon at Nezperce. The Indians scored in the first quarter on Lon Leitch's 86 yard run and added two more points when he passed Chris Braun. Mike Kanikkeberg finally got the Bulldogs on the score board in the third quarter with a 40 yard run; but Genesee failed to convert the TD.

In the final quarter, Kanikkeberg was on his way to another score running 67 yards before being hauled down by Nezperce's Scott Schaler.

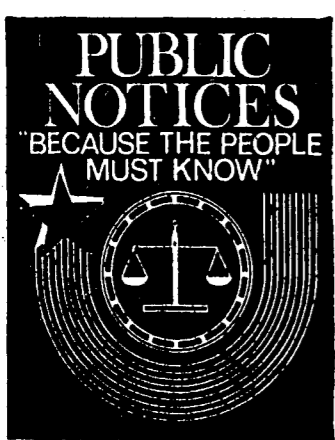

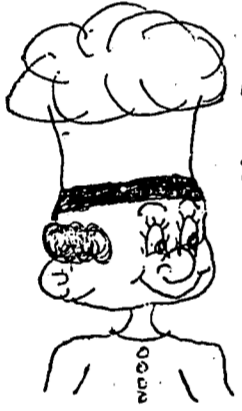
