**Shelter Care Bond Issue
Faces Latah County Nov. 20**

The taxpayers of Latah County are being asked to vote on a general obligation bond issue Tuesday, Nov. 20 to finance a proposed addition to the Latah County Convalescent Home that would provide a Shelter Care Center.

Shelter Care is housing for elderly, alert, ambulatory people who need the supportive services of prepared meals with special diets, activities, socialization, housekeeping and minimal assistance with personal care. Persons in shelter care units take their own medications (although a reminder by the attendant may be needed), come and go independently, and generally enjoy much of the freedom of citizens in general. Often Shelter Care offers elderly persons an alternative to nursing home admission.

It is proposed that there be constructed an addition to Latah Convalescent Center consisting of single and double rooms for 52 Skilled Nursing beds, plus a new kitchen—all on the same level as the existing building. The ground floor of the addition would house physical therapy, laundry, staff lounge and storage. The existing North wing would remain part of the skilled nursing section—retaining the capacity of 76 skilled nursing beds. The two original wings, plus the existing kitchen and dining room will be remodeled to serve as the Shelter Care unit.

The revised preliminary estimate provided by the architects as of Aug. 20, 1979, indicates a total project cost, including equipment, of \$1,417,700.00 if constructed during 1980. The architects have been asked to provide an estimate for remodeling the two original wings. Pending the receipt of their figures a conservatively high amount of \$182,300.00 has been estimated, bringing the total cost to \$1,600,000.
