

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

the Federal reserve board announced a major change in monetary policy which significantly altered conditions around the world. In consequence of continuing strong inflationary pressures, dollar weakness in international exchange markets, and scaring gold prices, the Federal Reserve increased the discount rate by 1 full percentage point to 12 percent, increased the reserve requirement by 8% on centain types of deposits and borrowed money. It announced that it would monitor short-term ihterest rates much less closely in the day-to-day conduct of monetary policy. The emphasis will be put on the control of the money supply and rates will be allowed to float most freely. This program should result in improvement in the high inflation rate.

Almost immediately, interest rates on short-term financial instruments jumped sharply and as a result the commercial bank prime lending rate for large commercial customers was increased to 15%. The bond market showed significantly weakness, with the prices of many unsold bond issues dropping sharply. Great uncertainty was also evident in the stock market.

Mr. Eccles said that Federal Reserve oard chairman Paul A. Volcker has told the nation's banks to pur-sue conservative lending policies and to avoid speculative loans during the board's tight money policies.

This process was sustaining inflationary forces at home and weakening the dollar abroad. International money markets viewed our government's previand lack of coherent energy policy with great uncertainty. All of these conditions combined to create an enaction to address the fundamental causes of inflation and dollar depreci-

"In the months ahead," Mr. Eccles stated, "short-term interest rates may actually edge moderately higher. It now seems apparent however, that the growth in money and credit will slow shamply. This should begin to ease inflation but will also further weaken the economy." Mr. Eccles also predicted a down-

turn in the Gross National Product, some increase in unemployment, lower housing construction and fewer auto sales. The hopeful result will be a downturn in inflation. weakness in the economy will not be just short lived. It will be several months, according to Mr. Eccles, before any adjustment in inflation, interest rate reductions, and real pickup in the general economy will be in evidence.






