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

NEED?

- Shelter Care has been identified as a way to reduce costs of the Federal/State Medicaid Program which supplements low-income patients in nursing homes—a growing number.
- Moscow's 3 nursing homes have been filled to capacity these last 6-8 months. Some patients have had to wait for weeks for a skilled nursing home bed to become available. There are presently some patients at the Latah Center who would prefer Shelter Care housing were it available.
- There are more than 2,500 people in Latah County over the age of 65 years. This county is entirely without Shelter Care Facilities.

Dear Editor:
Latah County will have a bond election Nov. 20th for a new nursing home shelter.

This new building will house a few over 50 people.

It will cost 1.6 million dollars. This amounts to about \$30,000 expenditure for each original occupant.

This does not include the costs for extra personnel and maintenance. There are many elderly people and others who are now having trouble paying their property taxes.

With all the bond elections and hefty override levies for most schools in Latah County it could easily push more low income people into the welfare rolls.

The very problem we are trying to cure we are creating by increasing the property tax.

It is not only property owners who should be responsible for these expenditures. Everyone must be included in the paying as well as in the voting.

Most families will be paying higher energy costs and with a 13% inflation rate they cannot afford any more taxes at this time.

Also, all these bond expenditures are outside the 1% limitation on the property tax.

Consider these points when voting on bond elections.

The club has decided to adopt grandparents again this year. Each member will be contacting their grandparents soon.

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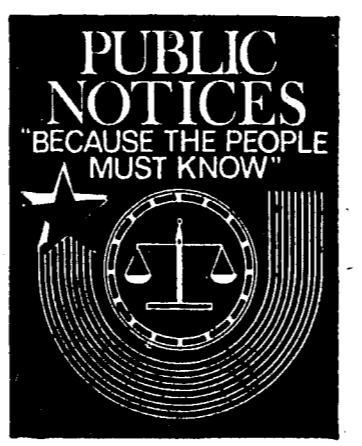

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that pursuant to Resolution No. 79-24361 adopted October 29, 1979, of Latah County, Idaho, a Special Bond Election will be held in said County on TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 20, 1979, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A. M. and 8:00 o'clock P. M. for the purpose of voting upon the question and proposition of issuing general obligation bonds in the principal amount of \$1,600,000.00 for the purpose of providing funds to defray the costs and financing of the acquisition and construction of a County Nursing Home facility for the aged and infirm, pursuant to the provisions of said Resolution, which Resolution is hereby referred to for further particulars and which by reference is made a part of this Notice.
 The construction of the County Nursing Home facility will permit the County to remodel a portion of its present facility, to provide Shelter Care for the aged and infirm. The proceeds of the bonds herein proposed to be issued, if authorized by the electorate, will be expended solely for purposes authorized by the Idaho Code as amended.
