

Genesee turned out 140 voters who cast 45 yes votes and 95 no ballots. Juliaetta voters turned down the issue with 49 no and 32 yes votes. Kendrick favored the issue in a



#### Studded Tires Legal On Idaho Roads

Boise-The Idaho Transportation Department reminds motorists that studded tires are now legal on Idaho highways between October 1 and April 15. Tires with tungsten carbide studs are prohibited on the state highway between April 16 and Sep-

tember 30. However, surrounding states have different laws covering the use of studded tires. For instance Oregon and Washington do not permit them until November 1; Utah not until October 15. In Montan studded tires are permitted from October 1 through May 31. Nevada and Wyoming have no restrictions on their

The Idaho Transportation Department cautions motorists not to be over confident driving with studded tires. Extensive studies by the U. S. Department of Transportation and extensive damage to highway surand traction ability of studded tires of Ontario, are exaggerated and are not as safe their use. as claimed. In addition to giving drivers an unwarranted feeling of safety, on bare pavement they cause tires on all state vehicles.
