**U. of I. Vandaleers To Sing December 9**

Moscow: Ushering in the Christmas season, the U/I Vandaleer Choir will present its annual Christmas concert at 8 p. m., Sunday, Dec. 9, in the Administration Bldg. auditorium.

"It is believed that the Magnificat was written for the vesper service on Christmas Day, 1723, in Leipzig, where Bach held the post of cantor," Glen Lockery, professor of music and director of the Vandaleers, said. "The Vandaleers introduced the work to the UI campus in 1955 and this will be the fourth time it has been included in a Vandaleer Christmas concert." He said "The Magnificat" is one of Bach's most significant works and "can well be considered a forerunner of the great Mass in B Minor which was to follow during the next decade."

Vocal soloists for The Magnificat include Catherine Pedersen, soprano, senior music major, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Pedersen, of Dawson Creek, B. C.; Cheryl Hamp-

ton, mezzo-soprano, graduate music student and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Mayer, Genesee; Naomi Marquez, alto, senior music major and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bernardo Marquez, Sagel, and Stephen Walker, tenor, senior music major, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Walker, Troy.

Other works to be performed include "Carol Cantata III" by Robert Bennett; Motets for the Season of Christmas by Francis Poulenc, and Alice Parker and Robert Shaw arrangements of 5 traditional carols.

The Bennett Cantata is based on the traditional Christmas tunes, "The Virgin Mary Had a Baby Boy," "O Come, Emanuel," "Wassail Song," and "Carol of the Bells."

The Poulenc Motets are entitled "O magnum mysterium" or Oh Wondrous Mystery; "Quem vidistis pastores dicite" or Shepherds Tell Us Whom Did you See?; "Videntes stellam" or Behold the Star and "Hodie Christus natus est" or This Day Christ is born.

The carol serenade includes "Joy to the World," "The Holly and the Ivy," "How Unto Bethlehem," "I saw Three Ships," and "Silent Night."

Lockery said the Vandaleers program this year maintains tradition of years past in the singing of well known Christmas carols. The traditional Christmas concert has been performed every year since its origin before World War II, he added.

**WWP Co. Urges Restraint In Christmas Lighting Use**

Because of the prospects for a seriously diminished electric power supply in the Pacific Northwest this winter and spring, the Washington Water Power Company will ask its customers to curtail the use of outdoor Christmas lighting.

P. Rich Bakes, WWP vice president said the company is making this appeal in cooperation with other Northwest electric utilities.

"This is one phase of a voluntary conservation program urged by the Washington Water Power Co. We are hoping our customers will curtail electric usage where reasonably possible because of below average water condition in the regions reservoirs," Bakes pointed out.

The use of indoor Christmas lighting is more acceptable because it provides an opportunity to recover some heat," Bakes said, "If outdoor Christmas lighting is used, customers should attempt to have it replace security lighting, where possible."

Bakes said all classifications of customers, residential, commercial and industrial are urged to eliminate unnecessary uses of electricity. "Our request for curtailment of outdoor Christmas lighting is also appropriate for advertising and display lighting, particularly at times when the business establishments are closed," he said.

The WWP official said the use of Christmas lighting on an individual basis does not consume great amounts of electricity, but collectively, many thousands of kilowatt hours are saved if the practice of curtailment is widespread.

"Approximately 50 percent of the electricity generated by WWP is for residential use, so it is obvious that our greatest savings can come from
