



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Animals Involved In Interstate Moves

By Hugh Wilson Department of Fish and Game

Twenty-five Merriam's wild turkeys from South Dakota and 11 Rocky Mountain bighorn sheep from Wyoming are checking out new surroundings in Idaho.

Four Idaho pine martens will be settling in the Black Hills of South Dakota and another 36 will eventually join them if all goes well.

ally join them if all goes well.

All of the moving about has resulted in a new turkey flock for Clearwater county some additions to the number of Merriam's in Idaho Couney and continuation of a successful sheep transplant program that goes back to 1963.

South Dakota hopes to use the Idaho pine martens to reintroduce the furbearers in the Black Hills. The trade between the Department of Fish and Game and the South Dako-

ta Wildlife, Parks and Forestry Department teamed up recently to trap the bighorns—four rams and seven ewes—on the Whiskey Mountain Game Range near Dubois, Wyoming, and move them to the Lost River near Mackey.

Two years ago, 17 bighorns were transplanted in the same area. The program began in 1963, when 19 California bighorns were re-located in Owyhee County.

Other transplants were added to the Owyhee herd in 1965 and 1966. In 1969, the department reported at least 80 bighorns in the area and the population was estimated at 200-250 in 1978

Rocky Mountain bighorns have been transplanted during the past 10 years in Hells Canyon areas, the upper Pahsimeroi country, around Blue Dome-Birch Creek in Clark County and in the Lost River Range.

The department's objective is to return the bighorns to their historic

ranges in Idaho.

Employees of the South Dakota agency drove virtually nonstop to deliver the turkeys to the department's Lewiston headquarters about a week ago for their final move to new locations. The first four pine martens were aboard the South Dakota truck on its return trip.

on its return trip.

The Merriam's turkey was introduced to Idaho in 1961, when 17 birds from Colorado were released near Riggins. Later transplants have been made with turkeys from Colorado and Wyoming and from Idaho stock.

A fall hunting season was established in 1967 and a short spring season, limited to male turkeys started in 1974. This year's spring wild turkey season runs from April 26 thru May 4 in 9 management units.

Polar Bears Turn Green
Scientists were puzzled at first when three white polar bears at the San Diego Zoo turned green. A check-up revealed that algae growing in the bears pools had found a safe home inside the bear's hollow hairs, explains the National Wildlife Federation.

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Fish, Wildlife Federal Funds Total \$2.1 Million for Idaho

The Department of Fish and Game has received about \$2.1 million as its share of Fish and Wildlife Restoration funds for the second half of federal fiscal year 1980.

Wildlife restoration and hunter

Wildlife restoration and hunter safety were allotted more than \$1.6 million, plus about \$481,000 for fish restoration, according to the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the administrating agency.

ministering agency.
Funds for wildlife restoration and hunter safety programs come from an 1 percent excise tax on sporting arms and ammunition a 10 percent tax on handguns and an 11 percent tax on archery equipment.
These funds may be used to such

These funds may be used to such projects as the acquisition of land suitable for habitat, development and management of habitat, and research in wildlife management.

Hunter safety funds, distributed according to the relative population of each state, may be used by the state wildlife agencies for hunter education programs, including construction, operation and maintenance of public target ranges.

Or at the state agency's discretion, these funds may also be used for wildlife restoration.

Fish restoration funds come from a 10 percent excise tax on fishing rods, reels, creels and artificial baits, lures and flies. Distribution of the funds is made according to a formula based on the number of fishing license holders and the land area of each state, including coastal and Great Lakes waters.

These funds are used by the state agency to purchase land and water areas for development or rehabilitation of such areas, development of access sites and facilities for fishermen and for research in fishery management.

Sen. Dobler Voices Concern for Teachers

In response to teachers rallying in Boise for increased funding for education, Senator Norma Dobler, D-Moscow, expressed her support and concern for their plight. Idaho's school teachers rank near the bottom in salaries in the nation.

"The 1% and the current state of our economy are not to be blamed totally for the problem," said Dobler. "Our Republican controlled legislature has been giving large amounts of tax relief over the years to income producing properties, large corporations and utilities who were not paying taxes on the same basis as Idaho's homeowners. If we could equalize assessments there would be plenty of money to fund education the way it should be."

"Homeowners have borne the burden of taxation far too long. It is my hope we can get legislation passed this session that will make assessment practices more equitable. The added revenue from this source will shift the burden away from homeowners, providing the relief they need and deserve and still provide the money needed to fund education," stated Dobler.

Senator Dobler commented further on the legislature's action in recent years to take away local property tax authority and replace those property tax dollars with general fund dollars. "This hasn't increased the total amount of money available to public schools. The money has just come from different sources. If we had not insisted on replacing so many mills of property taxes over the past several years, the state would have a greater ability to provide increases in fiscal year '81 and future years," she said.

Dobler added that the Democrats

Dobler added that the Democrats will make every effort to see that state employees are given a fair increase. The Republicans appear to want to cut back, even below the Governor's recommendation. "That recommendation was bare bones in my opinion, and to go below that would be totally unfair," said Dobler The Democrats generally support the
