Last Tuesday the Tigers were at Cottonwood to play Prairie, one of the better teams in the league, and in a gym where very few Kendrick teams have ever won. Poor officiating hurt Kendrick, but nonetheless they stayed in the game up until the last part of the 4th quarter. Then Prairie hit 10 free throws to put the game out of reach, 57-43. Rex Snyder continued his torrid shooting hitting 12 of 22 shots and 24 points, this coming after he scored 37 in his last game.

Trout Unlimited Boosts Brown Trout Fishing

With the help of Trout Unlimited, anglers can look forward within five years to trying for trophy-sized brown trout in southeastern Idaho's Henny's Fork.

The Idaho Falls Chapter of Trout Unlimited, after months of planning and fun raising activities, was able to purchase 188,000 brown trout eggs from a commercial trout farm in Massachusetts.

They were shipped for air freight to Idaho Falls and from there the eggs were transferred to the Department of Fish and Game's Ashton Hatchery, according to Rod Parker regional conservation educator. He says the eggs will remain at

the hatchery until they reach fingerling size, which improves their chances for survival when they are released this spring.

Plans call for the fish to be placed in several sections of Henny's Fork of the Snake River between Wendell Bridge and Lower Mesa Falls, where department personnel have determined that there is enough

food and cover to support a resident brown trout population. This will be the first release of brown trout in Henny's Fork itself. Some brownies were planted in a Henny's Fork tributary about 10 years ago.

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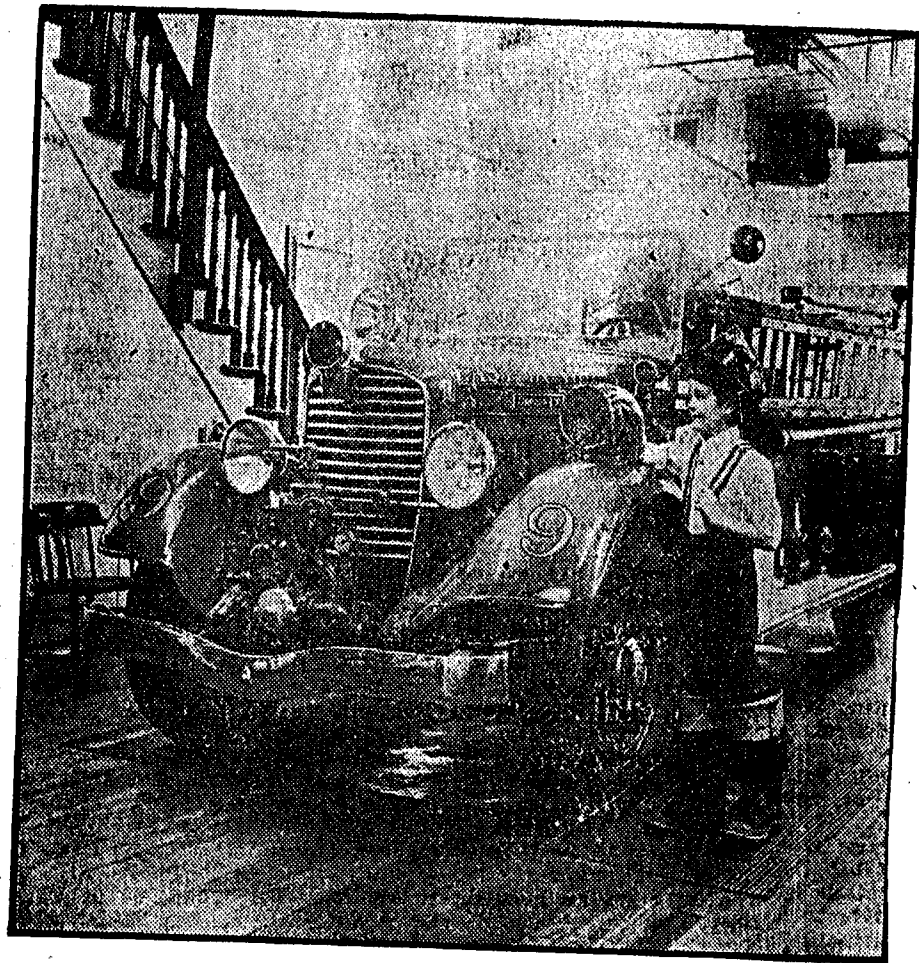

**Wildlife Federation
Bald Eagle Survey**

The National Wildlife Federation has begun its Second Annual Midwinter Bald Eagle Survey. More than 2,600 individuals, including 44 regional coordinators as well as 47 state and 7 federal agencies will be cooperating in the count conducted January 2 through 20 in the "lower 48" states.

During last year's count, 9,793 bald eagles were spotted—nearly twice the number counted in any previous survey of the endangered national bird. According to William S. Clark, director of National Wildlife Federation's Raptor Information Center, which sponsors the survey, more eagles will probably be found this year, due to better coordination, more knowledgeable counters, and more intensive coverage of some areas of the country.

The survey is held in January because eagle movements are at a minimum and more birds are found in the lower 48 states during that time than at any other time of year. "Most of the bald eagles we'll spot will be immigrants, Clark explained. "These birds fly down from Alaska and Canada when cold weather interferes with their hunting and feeding north of the border."

Eagles are counted only in the 48 contiguous states because the birds are plentiful in Alaska and not found in Hawaii. In 1978 the U. S. Interior Department listed the national bird as "endangered" in 43 of the 48 states, and "threatened" in 5 others—Minnesota, Michigan, Wisconsin, Oregon and Washington.

Experts estimate that there is a year-round or "resident" population of about 5,000 bald eagles in the lower 48 states.

Clark hopes that a comparison of this year's survey results with last year's will help pinpoint winter roosting sites and reveal valuable information about the bald eagle's habitat needs during the winter.

The count for last year's survey was first announced as 9,836 bald eagles; that figure was reduced by 42 when some duplications were found in an analysis of the field reports.

Federal agencies cooperating with the NWF bald eagle survey are the Fish and Wildlife Service, the Bureau of Land Management, the Forest Service, the Corps of Engineers, the Tennessee Valley authority, the National Park Service and the Water and Power Resources Service.

**43rd Observance Features
"Save a Place for Wildlife"**

National Wildlife Week features "Save a Place for Wildlife" as its theme for the annual observance initiated by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1938.

More than 15 million American school children, teachers and conservationists are expected to take part in the celebration March 16 through 22, according to the sponsoring National Wildlife Federation.

Film star Robert Redford has been named honorary chairman.

The importance of preserving wildlife habitat—areas where wild creatures can find food, water, cover and a place to raise their young—will be emphasized this year, says Dr. Frederick R. Seroggin, federation president.

Poster animals this year are two young red foxes. The federation plans to mail more than 800,000 copies of the poster to Wildlife Week participants. Another poster will have color photographs of 18 species of wildlife with information about each animal.

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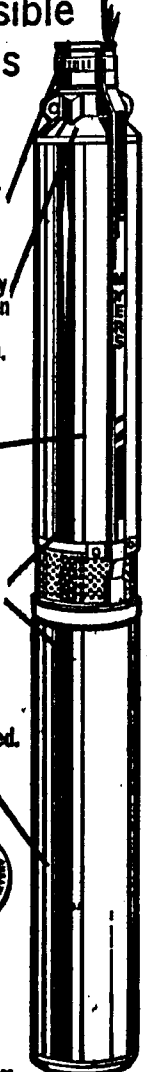

Farm-Size Still Spark Interest of Promoters
 Clifton Anderson
 Associate Agricultural Editor
 Moscow—Now that the government is encouraging on-farm manufacture of fuel alcohol, the farmer who wants to build his own still doesn't have to worry about being raided by the "revenuers". However, Roy Taylor of the U/I thinks the would-be distiller may be in danger of being besieged by get-rich-quick promoters.
 "Almost everyone who wants to earn a buck seems to be interested in building somebody else a fuel alcohol distillery," said Taylor, extension agricultural engineer. He works closely with the Energy-Efficient Practices Project, an educational program sponsored by the U/I Cooperative Extension Service and the Idaho Office of Energy.
 The enthusiastic promoter with an impressive set of blueprints may lack an actual experience in constructing stills, Taylor warned.
 "Most of the companies that are trying to sell farm-size stills have never built one," he pointed out.
 The University of Idaho extension specialist offered these suggestions to farmers who want to purchase an alcohol production package:
 —Make certain you have a performance bond in the contract so you can be sure of getting all the potential alcohol from your feedstock before the supplier gets paid in full for his equipment.
 —Insist that the supplier train you thoroughly in every phase of the alcohol plant's operation and maintenance. For the sake of efficiency and safety, the owner-operator must understand the production process. Making alcohol is no push-button operation!
 —Check carefully so you know your distillery will be operating in compliance with laws regarding health and safety, alcohol tax exemption and protection of the environment.
 Taylor said a farmer can learn

about alcohol stills by building a small experimental model from salvaged junk and inexpensive hardware.
 "Start producing alcohol in a small way, investing some of your time but very little of your money," he advised. "Technological advances in the next five years may make today's distilling methods obsolete."
 Information on basic processes of distilling alcohol is available from the U/I Cooperative Extension Service. Taylor said extension staff members are checking many sources of data concerning new developments in the technology of producing alcohol.
 "We're very much interested in the studies that are being made of new feedstocks. For on-farm stills to be financially successful year-in and year-out, farmers will have to select the right feedstocks," Taylor said.
 The UI agricultural engineer said extension staff members plan to sponsor tours of on-farm distilleries in the state later this year. Several alcohol plants are presently under construction on Idaho farms.
 "Throughout the country, farmers are using good old American ingenuity as they learn how to make their own fuel. At Campo, Colo., Gene Schroder has a farm still that can produce 35 gallons of alcohol per hour. Archie and Alan Zeltamer of Alexandria, Minn., also have a successful plant. For a modest fee, interested people can visit either of these distilleries on designated tour days," Taylor said.

**Teach Nutrition Where
People Buy Food,
Educator Advises**

Moscow—Consumers would pay more attention to facts about nutrition and food buying if they could obtain that information in the stores where they shop, asserts a University of Idaho extension nutrition specialist who recently retired.

Esther H. Wilson says nutrition educators and store managers have been slow in seeing the advantages of in-store teaching and she believes they're missing out in a good bet.

"I think consumers would be very receptive to having reliable, unbiased information at their fingertips, right when they're ready to use it," she stated. "In-store education about nutrition could help many people develop better dietary habits."

Mrs. Wilson retired several months ago after 16 years of helping UI extension home economists provide the state's consumers with accurate and timely nutrition information.

"Cooperative Extension Service specialists in several states cooperated in these programs. Most used computers in grocery stores to show shoppers ways to get good food buys for their money she reported. "Other programs compared the nutritional impact of home versus commercial food preservation methods or gave weight control pointers."

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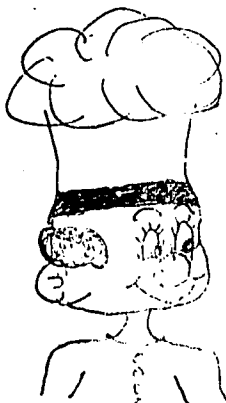
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
