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New Image of 'Well-Fed' Person Coming Into Focus

Moscow—Educators concerned with people's dietary habits are trying to give you a new mental picture of the typical "well-nourished" person. Instead of your visualizing a person who is amply cushioned against the dangers of famine, the educators want you to picture someone who is trim and energetic.

"Fitness is a key concept in nutrition education today. Nutritionists try to help people lead active, satisfying lives, with a minimum of health problems," said Marilyn A. Swenson, UI extension nutritionist.

How physical fitness can be promoted by sensible eating habits will be explained in educational programs throughout Idaho this month, Mrs. Swenson said.

"March is National Nutrition Month and dietetic associations and extension home economists will have special programs emphasizing nutrition. 'To Hit Your Stride . . . Eat Smart' is the theme for the month's activities," she said.

The UI educator pointed to a "growing scientific consensus" concerning the health problems people invite by neglecting sound nutrition. "The recommended dietary guidelines recently released by the U. S. Department of Agriculture are common sense rules for better health," she said.

Mrs. Swenson said the USDA guide lines include these basic rules:

—Eat a variety of foods in order to obtain more than three dozen nutrients your body needs for health and vitality.

—For effective weight control, avoid unneeded calories. The risks of health hazards such as diabetes and heart disease increase if you are overweight.

—Reduce your intake of sugar, salt and fat. Sugar is not a desirable food due to its "low nutritional density" and it is a major cause of tooth decay. The sodium in salt contributes to hypertension in some people. Fat has a high caloric content and has been linked to arteriosclerosis.

To provide adequate starch and fiber in your diet, eat more fruits and vegetables, whole grain breads and cereals, peas, beans and nuts. In

The show is open to the public and an admission fee of \$1.25 will be charged.

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
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


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
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Secondary Mortgage Market Spurs Home Sales

Who owns your home mortgage? It's quite possible that the bank or savings and loan association which lent you the money to buy your home no longer holds that mortgage, having sold it and others to a secondary lender with cash to invest in sound, secured mortgages.

Though little-known and often misunderstood, the secondary mortgage market plays a key role in keeping home loan dollars liquid. Without it, mortgage money would be much harder to find than it currently is.

The term "secondary" should not be confused with second mortgages, which are additional loans made to home buyers, usually for home improvements.

The secondary mortgage investor might be, for example, an insurance company with surplus funds. Lending institutions faced with a dwindling supply of funds to lend home buyers might sell \$1 million worth of mortgages to the insurance company, thus gaining dollars to lend to people shopping for a home.

Knowledgeable, sophisticated Realtors agree that the present "tight money" situation might well be even tighter without this source of needed cash for loans.

In most cases, a home buyer will not even be aware that his mortgage has been sold. Usually the original lending company continues to collect monthly payments, forwarding them to the mortgage buyer.

Lending institutions having access to such secondary sources are better able to make loans for people needing housing and this is particularly helpful to transferring families moving from one community to another.

Course Trains Teachers About Wildlife

Pocatello—A free workshop about wildlife for elementary and secondary school teachers will be held Apr. 17-19 to provide a greater understanding of the ecology and management of wildlife says workshop coordinator Dr. Lewis Nelson Jr.

Nelson, a UI associate professor of wildlife resources, says the workshop will include presentations about the basic principles of ecology and wildlife management.

The workshop, entitled "Wildlife Ecology—Facts and Fallacies of Wildlife Survival," also will focus on individual species including elk, deer, pheasants, waterfowl and mountain goats. Participants will receive one graduate level credit upon completion.

The workshop is sponsored by the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, UI College of Forestry, Wildlife and Range Sciences and UI Office of Continuing Education.

Funding for the workshop was provided by a grant from the US Fish and Wildlife Service and instructors will include employees of the Idaho

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

Game Bird Questionnaires Mailed to License Buyers

The Dept. of Fish and Game's annual questionnaire for upland game and waterfowl hunters is in the mail asking them to report how they made out during 1979 seasons. Hunters are asked to report how many of each species were harvested, how many times they went afield and the counties in which they hunted.

Dick Norell, state game bird manager, says the answers, when they are compiled and analyzed, provide vital information for 1980 season recommendations.

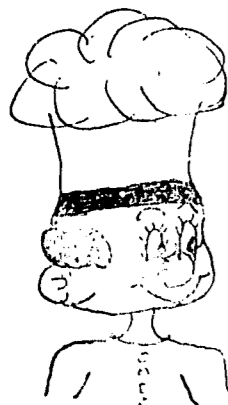
