Survivors include his wife at the rural Genesee home; two daughters, Mary Stout of Genesee and Betsy Ritchie of Tigard, Ore.; two sons, Ed Jr. of Genesee and Don of Issaquah, Wn.; four brothers, Dean of Seattle; Oscar and George of Parkland, Wn., and Bob of Genesee; two sisters, Ida Morken and Ricka Nicholas of Parkland, and eight grandchldren.




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

Who owns your home mortgage?

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
