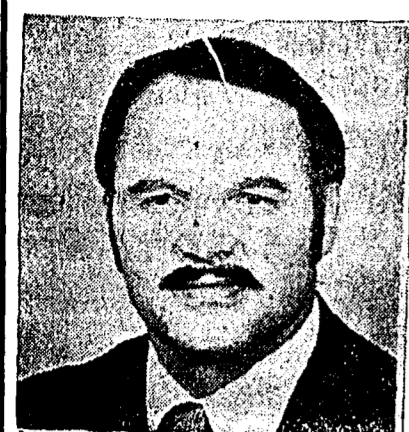

**Changes in 'Circuit-Breaker'
Law Explained by Clemm**

Senator Lester Clemm, D-Troy, said today that because of changes in the circuit breaker law, some people who weren't eligible before will be eligible this year. It's important for people to be aware of this because the deadline for applying for a property tax reduction under the circuit breaker is April 15. You must apply at the office of the county assessor.

Following the recommendation of Gov. Evans, the legislature raised the qualifying income limit to \$8,750, from \$7,500. And, effective in 1981, the income limit will be adjusted year by year to reflect changes in the cost of living.

Those eligible are people who own their own home or mobile home and who are over 65, disabled veterans, widows, fatherless children, veterans of WWI, and the blind. For further information about whether you qualify or how to apply, call the county assessor's office.

Last year, Futter mailed tomato seed orders to customers through-

out the West. One gardener obtained a headstart for his Idaho summer garden by raising tomato transplants at his winter retirement home in Arizona.

The ultra-early tomatoes were developed at the UI by Dr. Arthur A. Boe.

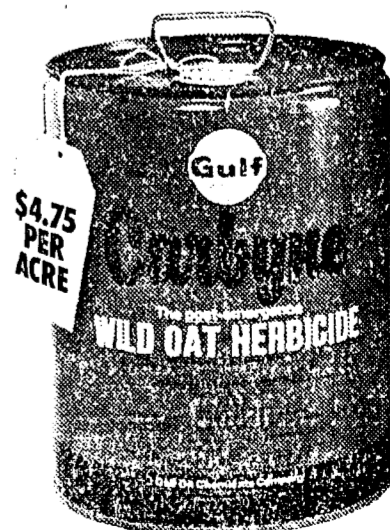

Leroy Carlson, Troy, Announces Candidacy

Leroy Carlson, a Troy farmer, car dealer, and President of the Latah County Property Owners Association has announced his Republican candidacy for the District No. 7 State Senate seat now held by Lester Clemm, D-Troy.

"My initials are all I have in common with the incumbent," said Carlson. "On the issues, we would vote opposite from each other most of the time. Clemm's record has swung so far to the left that even members of his own party are finding it hard to support him."

Carlson said he is extremely disturbed about "those Idahoans the incumbent has apparently forgotten, the law-abiding taxpayer."

"Clemm has voted against every tax relief bill to come along. On top of that he voted in favor of establishing a local income tax. I strongly believe District No. 7 voters want a senator who will fight to lower taxes, not one who votes to take even more of our paychecks."

"I believe my work with the Property Owners Association has proven my dedication to tax relief," said Carlson. "But the only way we can cut taxes is to limit government spending. Here again, the incumbent and I disagree."

Clemm voted against a limit on state spending," he said, "and was one of only eight legislatures in either house to oppose a bill requiring state agencies to prove every year that they are using our tax dollars wisely. And in this time when prices are going through the roof, he voted against a legislative resolution to Congress demanding that they balance the federal budget. His vote just gave those Washington-D. C.

they were giving Idahoans 18 percent inflation.

"We must have a senator who will stand up for the people, who will not try to solve a problem just by throwing our money at it, and who will fight to see that every dollar spent is wisely spent. I will take that stand on behalf of my neighbors," said Carlson.

Carlson said he would also support all legislation designed to make Idaho a safe place to raise our children, a responsibility he said Clemm has ignored.

"The incumbent senator voted against stricter penalties for first-degree murder and kidnapping, and he voted against a mandatory prison sentence for a criminal who uses a gun to commit a felony. Unlike the incumbent, instead of a justice system," said Carlson.

"I also believe it is essential that we fight for a balanced approach to wilderness designation in the state, but Clemm has consistently voted against allowing our own state officials to have a say in the government's policies for managing our resources. As it is, a lot of working people in Idaho are losing their jobs because politicians like Clemm are afraid to stand up to the feds. Again as a senator I would take that stand."

"Someone has got to be willing to," he said, "or we'll continue to suffer through the mess the liberals have gotten us into now. A good example of how Clemm has contributed to the mess is how he voted for two resolutions to Congress from the Idaho legislature. First, he voted against a resolution protesting the give-away of the Panama Canal, which I believe weakened our national defense. His solution to that was to back Carter's plan to draft women, by voting against a resolution from Idaho protesting that plan, American men always risen to defend our country. We should not subject our daughters to the draft. Clemm thinks we should," he said.

"The philosophical and political differences between the incumbent and I are obvious. I believe that it was because those differences were not made plain in 1978 that he was able to win re-election. 


